There is more mining activity of the right kind in this section at present than there has been for a number of years past. Four out of five companies are starting up operations on an apparently legitimate basis. Our mining and other undeveloped resources, have suffered much in the past from stock selling schemes, and the speculator with bona-fide intentions is a most welcome change. The mineral resources of Curry are boundless, and they will some day place among the foremost of the wealth producing counties of the state.

The Initiative and Referendum places the power of directing a government in the hands of its people, and is the logical outcome of a government "by the people and for the people," yet we sometimes wonder if there is not something in the cry of "intelligent direction." In Multnomah county there was 1000 defective presidential ballots cast, while in this precinct out of the 63 votes, 15 were defective, 5 of which were wholly unintelligible. "Are a people competent, as a whole, to have a voice in the intricate workings of a great nation, in making its laws and guiding its wheel of fortune, who do not take interest enough in the welfare of their country to inform themselves sufficiently to make known their choice of the man to fill the highest position in the land?"

The Tribune believes in the people ruling, and yet fears for this rule unless an educational qualification eliminates the class who can not read nor write from the polls. The Initiative and Referendum reminds us of Socialism—the latter is an ideal government, but an ideal government should have an ideal people and that is something that evolution alone can bring to pass.

Severe Sentences in Land Fraud Case.

The parties from California who were convicted and those from Curry county who plead guilty in the land fraud case at Portland, were sentenced by Judge Wolverton at Portland last Friday as follows:
 William H. Smith of San Francisco, \$5000 and two years in Multnomah county jail.
 Dr. A. H. Hedderly of Los Angeles, \$5000 and six months in jail.
 Richard Hynes of Los Angeles, \$2000 and 90 days in jail.
 William T. Kerr, \$2000 fine.
 Frank A. Stewart, \$1000 fine.
 John R. Miller, \$1000 fine.
 Ames S. Johnston, \$500 fine.

In sentencing Stewart and Miller the court said that both knew of the purpose of the company when they entered connection with it. This, as the editor of the TRIBUNE is in a position to know, is false, and we opine that these gentlemen who admitted to a technical guilt where no real guilt existed, and were handed such a large lemon, feel like taking a kick at themselves for trusting their fate to such a far-sighted and magnanimous Judge!

CURRENT TOPICS.

Editor TRIBUNE:—The election is over and past and the result has been what I predicted in your columns frequently during the campaign, and one who has made a study of political economic problems must stand amazed at the childlike faith of Mr. Bryan in supposing that he could successfully pit a conscience against the Money Powers, National and International.

Another thing that greatly mitigated against Mr. Bryan was his insistence, loud and prolonged, that our country return to Medieval methods of competitive industry, being utterly incapable of realizing that the Trust is a fixture in our national economy. Indeed it was only in the anti-trust feature of the Denver platform that document differed in any essential respect from the Republican platform.

The Socialist party only has a clear perception of the economic absurdity of warring on the Trusts, called, realizing that they are a development and the inevitable outcome of progress, and a milestone on the road to the common ownership and Democratic management of industry.

What seems to dumbfound many people was the phenomenal popular vote received by Mr. Taft, especially in the light of the obvious fact that fully 8 tenths of the labor vote and a large proportion of the colored vote went to either Bryan or Debs, yet this result was foreseen and predicted by Mr. Debs nearly twelve months prior to the inception of the campaign. He reasoned from cause to effect intelligently. He pointed out that Mr. Taft had gone to Rome and, in the guise of seeking a settlement to the Friar question in the Philippines, had paid the Catholic Hierarchy Seven Million Dollars for the "Friar lands" so called notwithstanding the fact that the United States had already paid Spain \$20,000,000 for all of her claims in the Islands including these same Friar lands, for he understood that it was an afterthought on the part of the Hierarchy to claim these lands and the Church property scattered about the archipelago. And, who shall blame the Pope who, finding us so easy a mark, for subsequently setting up a claim for \$750,000 for use and abuse of church buildings by our army during the brief war! But it is a curious fact that he actually did receive \$470,000 on this very claim.

In view of all these facts it will not appear remarkable that Mr. Taft received practically the solid Catholic vote of this country, but the timidity, stupidity and cowardice of the Democratic management in not turning these facts to its advantage will seem remarkable enough. But who the Gods would destroy they first make mad.

And if it be questioned that Debs' forecast was prophetic, the indubitable evidence will be found in Taft's astonishing large vote in all the great centers of Catholic population like greater New York, (which he carried by 15,000) St. Louis, Baltimore and Kansas City.

The Republican National Committee promises to make public campaign contributions, but these will not include James J. Hill's expenses who undertook the care of Minnesota and the Dakotas in his own way, and the sums used by the hierarchy which did not pass through the hands of the campaign treasurer; and let it not be forgotten that E. H. Harriman publicly claimed that the \$260,000 he raised near the close of the 1904 campaign changed 50,000 votes in New York. Money talks.

Skepticism will make you indifferent and errors will lead you astray, so that man with his heaven erected face, who breathes the breath of a living God, shall find the straight path to walk in.
