Wood and iron gives Del Norte county credit for shipping to San Francisco for the past ten months ending October 1, a total of 14,262,887 feet. Death of Joseph B. Gilbert.
Joseph B. Gilbert, an old and highly respected pioneer of Empire, died Saturday after a comparatively short illness. Mr. Gilbert was born in Albany, N. Y., on Oct. 24, 1833. He moved to Iowa when a young man, and on Nov. 10, 1861, enlisted in Co. K, 14th Iowa Infantry to serve three years, or during the war. He was made quartermaster sergeant a few days after his enlistment, and on April 8th, 1863, was promoted to the rank of 2d Lieutenant, same regiment. He was discharged Nov. 16, 1864, at Davenport Iowa.—After the war, Mr. Gilbert came to the Pacific and remained in California until 1868, when he came to Coos Bay where he followed the business of contractor and builder for many years before retiring from active life. The Arago hotel at Empire,

now the property of the Southern Oregon Co., was built by him for W. A. Luse, and other buildings built by him are still in evidence.

—After retiring from business, he purchased an interest in some property at South slough, and lived there for a while, returning again to Empire. This property he still owned at the time of his death, which, together with a moderate sum saved for his old age, comprised his possessions.—His only known relative is a sister, Mrs. Eliza Douglas, living in Lyons Iowa.

We doubt if "Joe" Gilbert as he was familiarly known to the early settlers of the bay, ever incurred the enmity of anyone. He was quiet and unassuming; of a genial disposition; sincere in his friendship; one who bore the good will and respect of all who knew him. His circle of intimate friends at Empire, where he had made his home for forty years, will miss his pleasant words and kindly greetings, and all will unite in the simple but sincere tribute to his memory, that a good man has gone.—Coos Bay News
