Last Thursday morning was the coldest of the season, ice being an eighth of an inch thick, but the day was sunny, warm and windless.

Asher Post was in Port Orford last Saturday. He is guardian of the Keller children, and came down to settle with the Administrator.

Mrs. Marvin of Port Orford made a business trip to Roseburg last week via Myrtle Point, and no doubt will never forget the arduous trip.

Coast mariners are notified that beginning about Dec. 20, 1908, the big fog bell at Trinidad will be discontinued for two months, while undergoing repairs.

Mrs. John Fromm of Brush creek, Mrs. Jamieson of Sixes and Misses Belle and Florence McKenzie, were ladies from abroad who attended the Circle meeting Saturday night.

Wednesday, Thursday and Friday nights of last week were the coldest ones experienced here in several years, but Saturday a south wind came up and drove the Frost King to regions hyperborean.

The many friends of Max Langevilo's daughter's Lilly and Mabel, who are nieces of Mr. Hume, will be pleased to learn that they each are to receive \$5,000 and probably 5 shares each of the Oregon property.

Venezuela is having strenuous times. The Dutch ships are capturing her ships, and blockading her harbors. President Castro has fled to Europe with sixty millions in cash, and riot and rebellion are in evidence in the streets of Caracas.

A report is current that a company has bought out Prof. Capps, Jo Engelman and the old Lorentzen place at Denmark in northern Curry, and that George Fitzhugh is now surveying a townsite for the company.

We were wrongly informed last week that Port Orford merchants were out of flour, and are glad to find that they not only have on hand a good stock of flour, but all other essential groceries as well as the best assortment of Christmas goods ever seen in town.

The witnesses who went to Roseburg last week on land contests have returned. The evidence in these cases could have been taken in this county before a commissioner or notary public had one people know it, thus avoiding the hard trip and heavy expense.

The scheme to set Coos and Curry into a Judicial District is a logical one, and one that will be eventually done, because of similarity of interests and geographical situation. It is a matter however, in which our people are not yet much interested, because the times may not be ripe for the change because of lack of wealth, business and population.

Edwin H. Duncan, a brother of Mrs. Hume, is now at Wedderburn in charge of all the property of the Executor. Arthur Duncan, another brother, who grew up in the business at Rogue river and under stands every detail of it, is now there to assist his brother but can only remain temporarily because of his own business.

County Surveyor Wilson came up last week to run a line between the adjoining lands of James Curry and Joel Bond who objected to the survey to the extent of stopping it with a dangerous weapon. A warrant was sworn out before Judge Bailey and Sheriff Tyler came up Tuesday and took Mr. Bond to Gold Beach, upon a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon.

The steel steamer Winnebago arrived Thursday to load lumber at the Smith mill. She was built at St. Clair, Mich., in 1903, and her gross tonnage is 1,091. Her cargo consisted of 1,000,000 feet of wet lumber direct from the saw, though it is claimed she can carry 200,000 feet more of dry lumber, and when she passed down the bay yesterday she was drawing nearly 17 feet of water.

Mr. Lynch, a Marshfield man, has opened a barber shop in the Haagenen building opposite the Pioneer Hotel.

Geo. Guerin was the highest bidder when the old school house was sold, his bid being \$35.25. We understand George intends using it for a residence.

"Rome may sit on her seven hills and howl," London gazette in supercilious disdain through her mantle of flimsy fog, New York, from her lofty skyscrapers glare in utter contempt; nevertheless out of the smoldering ashes of numerous forest fires, from a land long dormant because of its unfruitfulness, shall there rise a new and beautiful city, a new Chicago, a City wondrous to behold. We see Post Orford and Langlois fade into nothingness, but before we go we wish the new city the greatest success. We bow to the inevitable.

Hon. R. D. Hume's Will.

Hon. John S. Coke of Marshfield, who is the Attorney for Mrs. Hume, she being sole administrator of her deceased husband's property in Oregon, was in Port Orford Monday night on his return home from Gold Beach where he filed the will and Petition for Probate in the office of the county clerk, Dec. 19th, 1908.

The will is dated at San Francisco, California, July 2nd, 1908, and names Mary A. Hume and Charles H. Warner as Executor and Executor, but Warner cannot act on property outside of California, and thus Mrs. Hume becomes sole administrator of all Oregon property, and her friends here congratulate her that such is the case, for there can be no division of authority that is equal without danger of trouble.

It is not deemed proper to publish the entire will in advance of its proof, but Mr. Coke kindly gave as the following summary of its general provisions, without specifying the names of all the beneficiaries.

To his wife, Mary A. Hume, he bequeathed the lots at the corner of Chestnut and Francisco streets in San Francisco, and all furniture situated in the residences at San Francisco and Piedmont, California; also all stocks and bonds belonging to deceased at the time of his death; also \$20,000 in cash.

To Herbert Hume and other nephews and nieces, \$5,000 each; also various other bequests.

The residue of his property is to be divided up into 100 shares and numerous of his nephews and nieces are to receive from 5 to 7 shares each, and Mrs. Hume 16 shares.

During a late storm, seven gas-line fishing boats were caught off Humboldt bar, and were unable to cross in. They have no landing places there the same as we have here in the vicinity of Cape Arago, and the crews had to remain in the open boats, at anchor, without food, for many hours until a passing steamer gave them provisions and water. A tug finally crossed the bar and brought the men in, and four days faster six of the boats were saved; but the seventh had dragged her anchor and was lost. The boats were owned by Italian fishermen.—Ex.

Washington, Dec. 15.—Asking that the government prosecute Joseph Pulitzer, owner of the New York World, for libel on the good name of the United States in connection with charges of fraud in the purchase of the Panama canal, President Roosevelt today sent a vigorously worded special message to congress, with which he transmitted all the records and papers concerning the deal.

Grant Ames, a highly respected citizen of Bandon while riding along the beach Monday in company with Jimmie Current was suddenly knocked off his horse by a great breaker, which swooped in upon him carrying the horse off its feet and throwing him into the ocean where he was carried by the waves until Mr. Current could get him out. Just how it happened is a mystery that will probably never be solved, but it was a horrifying accident.

Mr. Current rushed to the assistance of the prostrate man as soon as he could but before he could get him out of the water Ames had apparently ceased to breathe. Current worked with him a while until he could get word to the lookout and from there the life saving station was notified and the entire crew went at once to his assistance, but owing to the long distance it was perhaps forty five minutes before they reached the place.
