mother.

Mrs. Sarah C. Wilson, of Empire,
a highly respected pioneer of the
bay, died Saturday after a protract-
ed illness, aged 84 years. She leaves
a son, George Wilson, and two
daughters, Mrs. Chas. Getty and
Mrs. Rozell, besides numerous
friends by whom she was highly es-
teemed.

A fine specimen of the arctic or
snow owl, as it is sometimes called,
was killed by Henry Wickman.
Quite a number of these birds have
been killed on the bay at intervals,
during unusually cold winters in the
north. During the severe frost in
the winter of 1887-8, these birds
were numerous, and several of them
remained in this section until early
spring.

Frank V. Vincent of Smith River
has resigned as postmaster and a
petition has gone on to Washington

Being pursued by a farmer and
his three sons after being caught in
the chicken yard, a young colored
person had just made up his mind
that he was not eluding his follow-
ers as quickly as he might be when
a long-eared jack rabbit jumped up
from the roadside and started down
the road ahead of him. The would-
be chicken thief had run a few hun-
dred feet further when the farmer
and his boys were astonished to
hear the negro shout, in a voice
that quavered with fright, though
unrestrained: "Say, for de Lord
sake, you rabbit, get out ob de way
and let some one run who can run."

The chemists of the United States
department of agriculture have at
last solved the problem of how to
turn into paper the millions of tons
of cornstalks wasted annually. Af-
ter years of experiment the depart-
ment now reports that the vast
quantity of material heretofore con-
sidered valueless and destroyed ev-
ery year by the farmers of the coun-
try can be utilized, thus saving much
of the remaining wood reserve of
the United States, and bringing
about the manufacture of paper
from an annual crop.

The belief is freely expressed by
the scientists who have been con-
ducting these experiments that
when proper machinery is brought
out, and the farmers grow cornstalks
in localities where they can be moved
cheaply to the mill, the cost will
be fully 50 per cent less than paper
now manufactured from wood. No
special growth of corn is required.
—Scientific American.

Rogue River Flood.

The Rogue River bridge on Sixth
street has been a place of popular
resort this week on account of the
high water. From 150 to 250 peo-
ple went down to the river each day
and reported on the conditions of
the flood. The bridge builders aban-
doned their work and the river rose
eight feet twice during the week, but
no damage was done. The writer,
during one of his usual morning
walks, met an old timer who has a
distinct recollection of high water
experiences. He pointed to an ob-
ject near the top of the river bank
and said: "In February, 1890 we
had a flood that was exceptional.
There was a big rain and then spring
weather followed all in a day. The
meadow larks were singing, buds
were swelling, blossoms bursting and
the grass put on a refreshing look
after the rain. Some one said the
river was rising rapidly and I walked
down there to see. I found the wa-
ter nearly to the top of the bank; it
reached to the place I have pointed
out. That was a real flood and
don't you forget it."—Courier.

The Value of Gems.

There is a popular belief that the
diamond is the most valuable of
precious stones, but the belief is a
mistaken one, under ordinary cir-
cumstances. The relative commer-
cial value of the finer stones is about
as follows: Rating an emerald of a
certain size as worth \$100, a dia-
mond of the same size would be
worth \$150, a sapphire \$300 and a
ruby \$450. You see therefore, that
the sapphire and ruby are both more
valuable than the diamond. Per-
haps it might interest you to know
of what the principal precious stones
are composed. The diamond, as
you already know, is pure carbon,
crystallized. Sapphires—which term
includes the true sapphire and the
oriental ruby, emerald, topaz and
amethyst—are pure alumina, colored
by the rust of different metals. The
opal, the red amethyst and the
agates are silica. Among the
agates are included the carnelian,
the chalcedony, the onyx, the sar-
donyx and the blood-stone. The
true emerald and the true topaz,
which are different from the orient
emerald and the oriental topaz, are
formed partly of alumina and part-
ly of silica. The term "oriental,"
as applied to precious stones, does
not refer to the east, but is only a
technical word meaning "very fine."

Boston, Jan. 11.—Outdoors Bow-
bank, a New England wizard, How-
ard S. Hill, of Gardner, Mass., has
produced a vegetable that is a cross
between the cucumber and the or-
ange. It is fine grained, said to be
of delicious taste, and is yellow.

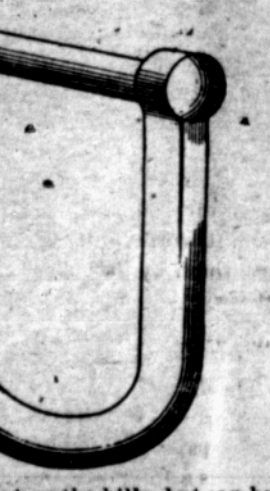
