The Osprey lay in our Harbor Friday afternoon, while making her second late trip to Coos bay after supplies for the Wedderburn store.

While hunting agates on the beach near Rocky Point several days ago Mrs. Knapp had the misfortune to lose a \$90 gold watch.

Several of the Coos county schools are organizing track teams, and expect to have a field meet at Coquille or Marshfield some time next month.

Jack Johnson and Stanley Ketchel have signed articles to fight for the heavyweight championship of the world at Colma, California, on October 12th.

The Battle Rock Circle held a regular meeting Saturday night, and after its close they repaired themselves to Nielsen's hall where an enjoyable dance was held.

M. T. Wright writes that he and his family are coming back from California to reside in Port Orford. They expect to be here before July, and will be welcomed by our people.

Charley Crew found a silver five cent piece among the shells on the sand hills just south of the Knapp hotel Monday. The coin is in a fine state of preservation and bears the date of 1836.

Cleve Cox, who had his leg broken in the stage accident of last week, was taken to Dairyville on a stretcher Friday, where he can receive more medical attendance as the injured limb has not been doing as well as might be expected.

Miss Ena McKenzie, who has been taking a course as a trained nurse in San Francisco for the past three years, has graduated with high honors—not falling below ninety in any branch of the work. She is expected home on a visit about the first of June.

The steamer Elizabeth lay in our harbor over Saturday to escape the heavy Northwest wind and wait for the tide to serve on the Bandon bar. One passenger was landed whose destination was Gold Beach. The steamer will make her first call at this place in about two weeks.

Owing to so much copy coming in at the last minute we are compelled to lay a communication from Frank Langlois and the County Court Report over until our next issue. This report should have appeared in the TRIBUNE of last week, but was not received in time.

Dr. Tatom is due to arrive at Port Orford tomorrow on his way to Gold Beach on a professional trip. The loss caused by the burning of the North Bend Ware House some ten days ago is about \$75,000, none of which was covered by insurance. Among the heaviest losers were, The North Bend Sash & Door Factory \$30,000, The Simpson Lumber Co. \$10,000, The Coos Bay Grocery Store, or which Ed Mather and Tom Carey are members, \$8,000, and The Hume estate \$5 tons of freight.

Marvin and his little daughter Evelyn Reber, Jack Reher and his sister Miss Loretto, who have been spending the past six or eight months in Port Orford, were passengers on last Wednesday's stage for Wedderburn. It is their intention to go up Rogue river and do assessment work on some mining claims that they have located near Paradise bar. For some time past Mr. Marvin has been trying to promote a mining enterprise near Sixes river but up to the present time has not met with success.

W. C. Guerin, E. C. Guerin, H. A. Guerin, Alex Hartley and W. W. Dayce, five energetic and excellent young men of Myrtle Point passed through on Wednesday's train for Marshfield where they will embark for Alaska to enter the employ of the United States Geodetic Survey. Their many friends at Myrtle Point and Coquille said their farewells as the train.—Coquille Sentinel.

The Marguerite-Hes Co. will show in Port Orford next Tuesday night, the 27th, while passing down the coast on their way to Crescent City. The Hes Co. have been playing in Coos county for the past two or three years, and will give one of the best performances of any troupe that has ever visited this section. They produce clean, artistic plays, that have won them many friends in Coos, and are deserving of the liberal patronage of our people.

Nathaniel Huptley, one of the pioneers of Curry county, passed away at the home of his son on Rogue river several days ago, after a decline for some months, due to his advanced age. Mr. Hantley in his prime was a man of great strength—one that hardly knew a limit to his power—but his splendid physique has at last fallen a victim before the sickle of Father Time. The deceased leaves several grown children and numerous relatives to mourn his loss.

Frank L. Spaulding, special agent of the General Land Office at Portland, Oregon, spent a couple of days in Port Orford the first of the week looking over the homesteads in the Hubbard's creek survey. Mr. Spaulding is a capable and affable gentleman, and one whose visit will be a help to the bona-fide homesteaders as he has found conditions far different from that which they were represented to be by some of the contesting timber claimants. He says that the amount of timber on the land makes no material difference, but that the settler must show his good faith by residence and cultivation. He was a passenger on yesterday's stage for Gold Beach, where he is to appear for the government in a contest before Clerk Smith.

**Gunder Anderson Drowned.**

While crossing in over the Coos Bay bar at 9 o'clock last Saturday evening, Gunder Anderson was washed from the deck of the Osprey and drowned. According to the accounts received here it seems that Anderson was standing aft of the cabin hanging onto the small boat that was fastened to the davits, and just before reaching the bar the captain turned to him and told him that he had better come inside, but Anderson shook his head and said that he was all right. Shortly afterwards a huge wave broke over the boat causing her to run ahead and sheer, and momentarily he is in danger of swamping. On looking around a minute later the captain saw that the lifeboat with its clinging occupant had been washed overboard. The Osprey was immediately brought to and anchored, and the life saving crew signaled for, which soon arrived on the scene but were unable to find any trace of the missing man or boat.

Gunder Anderson has been an esteemed resident of Curry County for many years, having resided at Wedderburn for the past 12 or 15 years where he engaged in fishing for the late R. D. Hume. He leaves a wife and six children, who in their sad bereavement, have the deep sympathy of many friends.

**Mrs. Leonard Cox Dead.**

Mrs. Mildred Wave Cox, nee Billings, died April 12, 1909, at the hospital at North Bend from tuberculosis, aged 20 years, 9 months and 29 days. The body was brought over from North Bend Wednesday and the funeral was held from the Brethren church in the afternoon, Rev. Thos. Barklow officiating. Interment was in the Myrtle Point cemetery. Mrs. Cox has been sick for some time, and during the last few weeks had received the care of her sister, who is a nurse in the Mercy hospital.

Mrs. Cox was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Steve Billings, and was married to D. Leonard Cox at the home of her parents on December 24, 1904. She is survived by her husband and three small children, two of them being twin boys three and one-half years of age, and the other a baby daughter of five months. Her father and mother, three brothers and six sisters also survive to mourn her loss. Mr. and Mrs. Cox have recently resided at Port Orford, in Curry county. She was baptized during her last sickness.—Myrtle Point Enterprise.

The infant child was taken by its grandmother while the two older little ones will find a home and good care with their Aunt Della.

**M'Bride to Succeed Bean.**

Salem, April 15.—On receipt of the news that Justice R. S. Bean has been appointed to the federal bench, Governor Benson this morning announced the appointment of Judge Thomas A. M'Bride to succeed Justice Bean on the supreme bench. Judge M'Bride is circuit judge in the Fifth judicial district, which includes Washington, Clackamas, Clatsop and Columbia counties.

Simultaneously with the announcement of the promotion of Judge M'Bride to the supreme bench came the announcement of the appointment of Representative J. U. Campbell of Oregon City to succeed Judge M'Bride in the Fifth district.

The new appointees will be sworn in immediately upon confirmation of Justice Bean's nomination.

After May 23 the Fifth district will be divided. The new judge, James U'Ren Campbell will preside in Washington and Clackamas counties, and the new judge, to be selected by the governor, will preside in the other two counties of the old Fifth district, Clatsop and Columbia.

The killing occurred last summer. At the time some thought that it was the beginning of serious trouble on the sheep range in the Stein mountain country. Ramos was the aggressor, and the killing was done in self-defense.

The attorneys, both for the defense and state, submitted the evidence without argument.

Washington, April 15.—Ex Senator Charles W. Fulton will not go to China as ambassador extraordinary and minister plenipotentiary. According to information received here today, which is not official, but is nevertheless considered reliable in every way. Senator Fulton has informed President Taft that he will not accept the appointment as Chinese ambassador.

It is understood the senator has decided not to accept the proffered appointment owing to his desire to remain in Oregon and practice his profession, the law. He has decided that he cannot afford to accept the appointment and allow his law business to further lapse from lack of personal care and attention.

**Excitement in Georgia.**

There is great excitement in Georgia says a dispatch. The storm center is Atlanta. A federal judge and his auto ran over a negro and nearly killed him. That was some time ago. The negro, after escaping from the jaws of death by the auto route, sued the honorable justice for damages. He won, and on the judgment that issued the negro's lawyers, after failure of the defendant to pay the amount, levied on the judge's home and contents. That is the cause of the excitement. A special meeting of the Atlanta Bar association has been called to consider means of disciplining the negro's lawyers and forcing reparation to the judge," adds the dispatch.

Of course, the negro is wrong. He ought not to complain at being run over by an auto. Besides, was not the auto driven by "the judge"? What if one or two of his limbs were broken and a few joints disconnected, wasn't it a judge that did it? Indeed, "did the negro not really owe "the judge" an apology for being in the way of the speeding auto? And, in truth, ought he not to feel honored to know that he has had a few ribs broken and a row or two of teeth knocked out by a judge?

Here, indeed is a negro with but little sense of propriety. Instead of being grateful that he escaped with his life, he has had the audacity to sue the judge, get damages and levy on his household effects to collect the claim. No wonder the Atlanta bar association is aroused and great excitement in Georgia.

Of course the judge, as all judges do, has doubtless issued decrees for levying on other people's household effects for satisfying judgments. The Atlanta lawyers have many times staid in securing such judgments. But it is different when the chicken comes home to roost. Lord Dundreary suffered greatly with the crick in his own back.
