Get the Boosting Spirit.

Nearly all the cities and towns throughout Oregon are "boosting" and using printers ink as they have never done before, and the effect is already made manifest in many ways. Commercial and various boosting clubs are formed, publicity funds are raised, and the town is cleaned up and the stranger made welcome.

Tons of literature, descriptive of our great state and its climatic attractions, are pouring out over the country from these organizations.

The Willamette valley towns, especially Eugene, have done wonders in the past year or two, and now Roseburg is going to have paved streets and has raised an advertising fund of \$5000 a year. The spirit has also struck Coos bay, where the Port Bill was voted in by a five to one majority, and the Coquille country is not asleep. Myrtle Point has her boosting club; Coquille is to have electric lights and street cars within three years, and the enterprising people of Bandon have been encouraging capital and industry to their town for several years, which has resulted in a steady and healthy growth. But what of Curry? The man who boosts down here is in danger of having the finger of suspicion pointed at his upper story, like the Columbus of old. Money was once appropriated to commence work improving the Port Orford harbor, but it has since sunk into an unknown grave. An act passed congress to build a life-saving station at this place, and it was reported in the papers that the station was ordered built, but it too, went down to oblivion. A little collective work by our citizens is needed. Why not do it?

CURRENT TOPICS

Editor TRIBUNE—The citizenship papers of Emma Goldman's husband were lately revoked by a U. S. Court, whereupon it is alleged that she, being a foreigner in consequence can be deported. Although she is a harmless lunatic, she is yet capable of making a nuisance of herself, wherefore the Socialists whom she hates will shed no tears if she is sent out of the country.

In Mexico a thing is lawful or unlawful according to the whim of the bloody tyrant Diaz. He will suffer only one political party (the Diaz party) to exist in his realm. A liberal party was organized down there whose leaders are now rotting in dungeons or are in exile still hounded by the old despot's minions. And fitly enough, that other bloody minded monster, the Czar of Russia, has a petition before the Mexican "Cabinet" for permission to "decorate" Diaz and his Secretary of State. The proffered baubles are said to be "richly incrustated with diamonds and rubies."

Only the other day the monster Diaz ordered 14 men lined up against a wall and shot for the crime of attempting to march in some sort of religious procession, and immediately such of the "graft papers" in this country as are owned or controlled by Harriman and other millionaires who work concessions down there, contain articles and dispatches complimentary of the swift and complete justice administered in Mexico.

And American and English manufacturers in that bloody despotism as an inducement for the purchase of shares in manufacturing concerns, advertise that labor is plentiful and extraordinarily cheap, and that the workers, under the laws of Mexico

DARE NOT STRIKE! This is why Diaz is proclaimed the greatest "ruler" Mexico ever had! And this is why some capitalist Courts in this country are swift to run down and imprison political refugees from over the border. And how very strange! Diaz himself had been all his adult life, a rebel and revolutionist, and often a refugee on this side of the line; but those were the days when we were true to our historic mission, when Irish and German refugees by hundreds of thousands found safe and secure asylum among us. And Madame Modjeska, the great historic actress lately deceased in California, was, with her husband, brothers and other relatives, refugees from Austria Poland, all of whom were safe from arrest under our flag as soon as they touched our shores.

And who will figure the loss to this country had we been craven enough to turn John Boyle, O'Riley, Carl Shrag, John Mitchell and Madame Modjeska and her people over to man-hunters to be tormented and imprisoned in fortress dungeons without hopes of relief or escape. But, then, Capitalism has neither mercy nor conscience, and that is all there is to it.

Mr. Roosevelt says that the economic pretensions of Socialism are absurd. Well to this it may safely be replied that the economic pretensions of Capitalism are impossible. Of this fact the recurrent panics and consequent distress furnish ample proof. Capitalism demanded high protection and the gold standard and promised that panics thereafter would be impossible, and what do we behold under the high est "protection" and the much vaunted single standard of gold? Simply one of the most crushing panics of the century, which, though not so much felt out here, counts unemployed victims at the east by millions, with commercial and banking failures going on apace. And this is Capitalism. So, it will finally occur to the minds of sensible people that they have all to gain and nothing to lose by trying some other plan.

The late Jefferson Memorial feast at the east brought together some genuine Jeffersonian disciples, flanked by such choice examples of the democracy as Richard Crocker, Pat Mc Caran, et al., who practically bisected the mention of Mr. Bryan's name, because they knew that Bryan is, in truth, a true Jeffersonian, and one who if in power, would never take orders from the "interests," as did Grover Cleveland, when J. P. Morgan and August Belmont rigged the secret issue of Bonds deal, out of which they cleaned up \$18,000,000 of profits inside of two months, and it is a fact of some interest, that, at the Cleveland birthday banquet last month, nearly all of the active participants were Republican politicians, most of whom are beneficiaries of Special Interests. Not one avowed Republican however showed up at the Jefferson banquet, although in the better days of the party even Abraham Lincoln was proud to be one among other Republicans who honored the memory of the author of the great Declaration of Independence, and of Religious Liberty in this country, by the dissolution of the "Church and State" regime.

It is now stated by a Normal School Bourbon that the late Legislature of Idaho appropriated \$160,000 in support of the State Normal School, but the fact is studiously withheld that the Idaho institution is a part of the State University, and that said appropriation was to support the university which includes a Normal chair.

The \$125,000 per annum extra endowment of our State University at the expense of the tax payers seems to have attracted to that institution a gang of uncivilized brutal bullies, as witness the late hanging of a young man into the insane asylum, and the dire penalty inflicted on the savage barbarians was the suspension of each for the period of two weeks! This is notice to the public that only bullies and bullies carrying along shots and bullets can safely enter that institution as students if they hope to escape maiming and insult and unspeakable indignities.

Upon petition of the Port Orford Orchard Tracts Co. by its attorney J. H. Huntley, asking for a continuation of its application to file a town plat, is granted.

Upon complaint of A. S. Miller that the Baguett Ferry is in unsafe condition, the court orders citation to issue citing the licensee to appear and show cause, if any, why his license should not be revoked.

The resignation of Delmer Colegrove as supervisor of road No. 2, is accepted and J. R. Hill is appointed supervisor.

Bids for the construction of bridge across Dry Gulch are examined and rejected.

It is ordered that road improvements in the various districts of the county be under the control of the members of the County Court as follows: Districts 7, 8, 9 and 10 E. B. Sypher; districts 4, 6, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 20, 21 and 22 E. A. Bailey; 1, 2, 3, 15, 17 and 19, Otto Ismert.

The entire School District Boundary Board are requested to be present at July term of Court.

The petition of legal voters of School districts No. 1 and 24 is considered by the Court and said petition is granted and district established as prayed for in petition.

It is ordered that Geo. W. Smith, County Clerk be authorized to draw a warrant in payment for county safe when same arrives.

It is ordered that 80 per cent of the General Road & Bridge Funds now on hand be apportioned to the several road districts according to their respective assessed valuation.

The bill of Sheriff of Del Norte county, Arrest & Bail Brothers, was continued and referred to district attorney. Amount of bill \$30.00.

Whereupon court adjourned for the term.
