Laws to Protect Newspapers.

We publish below some extracts from the late protective newspaper law, believing that it will be interesting to our readers, especially to those who let their account run along for several years and then try to evade payment by having the postmaster order it discontinued. The gist of the law is as follows:

1. Subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary are considered as wishing to continue their subscriptions.
2. If subscribers order the discontinuance of their periodicals the publisher may continue to send them until all arrearages are paid.
3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their periodical from the postoffice to which they are directed they are responsible until they have settled their bills and ordered them discontinued.
4. If the subscriber moves to another place without informing the publisher, and the papers are sent to a former direction they are held responsible.
5. The courts have decided that the refusal to take periodicals from the postoffice, or removing and leaving them uncollected, is prima facie evidence of fraud.
6. If subscribers pay in advance they are bound to give notice to the publishers at the end of their time if they do not wish to continue taking it, otherwise the publisher is authorized to send it and the subscriber will be responsible until an express notice, with payment of arrearages, is sent to the publisher.
7. The latest postal laws are such that newspaper publishers can arrest any one for fraud who takes a paper and refuses to pay for it. Under the law the man who allows his subscription to run along for some time unpaid and then orders the postmaster to mark it "refused" and have a card sent notifying the publisher, lays himself liable to arrest and fine, the same as theft.

I am moved to these vagrant reflections by having read in the S. F. Call query column the question: "Were there any Democrats in the Union army during the Rebellion?"

\$5,000,000 Office Building for U. S. Senators.

Five million dollars for an office building! Who is spending it? The most liberal spender in the world—the United States. This is not something planned for a future date, because there is no object of immediate expenditure, but a reality of the present. A palace of offices has been constructed for the use of United States senators at Washington. It was opened and occupied in part a few weeks ago, but it is not yet fully completed. The actual cost to date is \$4,672,500, and there is more expense to come, rounding out in all probability the \$5,000,000. There are ninety-two Senators in Congress, but the building is large enough for a thousand. It would cover several blocks in some cities. It is one of the most beautiful buildings in Washington. It stands diagonally across from the senate wing of the capitol. Although near at hand, it is too magnificent for august Senators to approach by walking, so a beautiful subway has been built connecting it with the senate wing. Storage battery automobiles, each of which will carry ten persons, go whizzing through the passageway like the wind, and no Senator walks. The interior architecture of the building is grand in magnificence and proportions. An enormous marble rotunda rivals if it does not surpass that of the capitol itself. The individual offices are palatial in construction and equipment.—The Bookkeeper.

Junction City, Or., June 5.—For several years Southern Pacific freight cars have been broken into and looted at this place. The robberies have generally been charged to tramps, but from recent developments it is shown the railroad company has been robbed by its own employees. Railroad detective Reiley has been camping among the freight cars for some time and as a result of his vigilance he found two sets of hangers in the rooms of one of the brakemen, which had been stolen from a car. One of the brakemen made a confession of the robbery, and he implicates 27 others in the gang. It seems that there was a regular organized gang among certain railroad men. Their names are now known to the railroad detectives and it is only a question of time when the entire gang will be brought to justice.
