Thomas Lane and family are visiting at his mother's, Mrs. P. J. Lindberg in Port Orford, and shaking hands with his old boyhood friends.

Taylor Dement of Myrtle Point, was in Port Orford Sunday night on his return from the southern end of the county where he had been buying beef cattle.

John Haagenen and wife passed up the coast several days ago on their return from Gold Beach, where they have been visiting at the home of Geo. W. Smith.

We are indebted to Messdames Lindberg and Masterson, who gave the dance supper Saturday night, for samples of cake, and they were good, if we are capable of judging. Thank you, ladies.

Mrs. Woodruff, widow of the late Delos Woodruff, of Eneche creek, has been afflicted with heart trouble for some time, and it is thought she can survive but a short time. Mrs. Tyler and Schliemann have been in attendance.

There is more mining talk in Port Orford now than there has been for many years. Our idle men will soon be in the mountains prospecting, and we hope they will all be lucky. Copper is now the chief magnet, with gold a close second.

This shows that the immense copper deposits found in southern Curry extend through the entire county in a northerly direction, and yet we occasionally meet a "know-all" who says there are no large mineral deposits in Curry county.

Mrs. Eva Crockett, with her two youngest children, was in Port Orford Wednesday night. Mrs. Crockett will leave her children with her sister, Mrs. Jensen at Bandon, and will go to Dr. Horsfall's hospital at Marshfield where she will undergo a serious operation for cancer of the breast. Her many relatives and friends will anxiously await results and hope for the best.

Later—Mrs. Crockett and children returned from Coos Bay and were passengers on yesterday's stage for Rogue river. Mrs. C. now contemplates going to Smith River, Calif. to have the operation performed by Dr. Tyler.

Joseph Simon was elected mayor of Portland on the 9th inst., by a large majority.

Ransom Rackleff was in Port Orford last night, returning to his home at Langlois this morning.

The Gerald C. is tied up in the harbor this morning as we go to press. She is on her way from Coos Bay to Rogue river.

W. H. Crow was in town last night, returning to his mine on Lobster creek after having made a short visit with his family at Bandon.

Sometimes, though seldom, a N. E. wind comes howling down our mountains. It is not disagreeable like our north-wester, but it can outblow any wind that ever blew for the size of it.

Jack and August Farley dropped into our harbor last Saturday on their way from Coos Bay to Rogue river with their boat, and spent Sunday here waiting for the wind to jull. They are going to the Rogue to engage in fishing.

Foster will soon be out for the 4th of July celebration at Dairyville. Our northern neighbors are going to pull a whole bunch of feathers out of the eagle's tail, and make him scream his loudest. They are not going to let Gold Beach have all the fun.

The ball Saturday night was one of the best and largest that has been held in Port Orford for many months. The music by the Langlois orchestra was fine and was appreciated by the dancers, while the midnight supper by Messdames Masterson and Lindberg was excellent. The attendance from abroad was too large to specify names.

The steamer Elizabeth called in here last week on her down trip and took fifty thousand feet of clear cedar from Jamieson's mill, and landed a lot of supplies for our merchants. If she would call regularly here every two weeks on her up and down trips passengers and freight would accumulate in surprising quantities. As it is now none can depend on her.

The county road south of here is now in excellent condition, the road scraper having done good work. The road north of here is also in good condition, with the exception of the new road from Sixes to Denmark, a greater portion of which is rough and will continue to be so unless gravel or something similar is hauled on it. Several miles of this road has been corduroyed, which if left as it is, will make a miserable highway both winter and summer.

We made a trip to A. B. Carey's place near Corbin one day last week, and we were royally entertained, returning in the evening with several gallons of strawberries. Asa has a patch of about 500 plants from which he has gathered as high as 35 gallons at one picking. Mr. Carey has made considerable improvements on his place during the past winter in the way of fencing and cutting brush, and has as fine a band of goats as we have seen in the county, and he says they are a great thing to keep land clear after it has once been cut off.

Bounties will be paid in the clerk's office upon all scalps enumerated in the law, taken on and after February 1st, 1909. In order to receive the bounty the person claiming same must appear before the County Clerk with one witness bringing with him the entire skin of the animal. The clerk removes the scalp and both front paws and returns the balance of the skin to the claimant. A warrant is then drawn on the general fund of the county in payment of the bounty. Bounties have been received by the County Clerk from the Secretary of State and everything is now in readiness for the payment of bounties.

The TRIBUNE has just received the May number of the State University Bulletin which announces the University summer school to be held from June 28th to August 6th. The announcement is important to the teachers of Oregon, in that the summer session is conducted practically free of charge in their interest at a time when it is possible for them to attend. In the past the larger part of those attending have been teachers. The University believes that it can extend its advantages of library, laboratory equipment, and teaching force in no better way than through the summer school. The courses offered for teachers cover the greater number of the subjects required in the State examinations.

A Tragic Death.

We are informed that Lester Lucas of Lone Ranch, has leased the Crumius and Lauf ranch at the ferry, two miles north of Harbor.

The late rains in this section have caused the farmers to smile. The rain would have been better if it had come earlier, but better late than never.

H. A. Phillips, the prosperous Crescent City merchant, visited Hog Hollow last Sunday on important business, and departed on his return Monday.

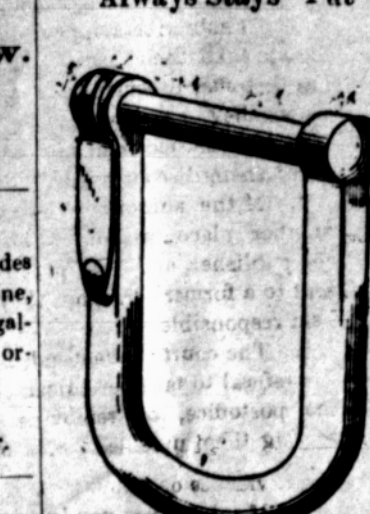
