Each incident in ex-President Roosevelt's hunting trip in Africa, be it the killing of a fierce lion, or the slaughtering of a timid gazelle, is eagerly sought for and published by the newspapers throughout the land that each young American may engrave in his heart the valorous deeds of this "man of action." The American youth is by nature endowed with a bold and venturesome spirit and Roosevelt's love of athletics and out door life appeals to him with a force and enchantment that is irresistible, but after all does a study of the ex-President's characteristics present to us an ideal that should be held up with pride to young America? True heroism is fearless in battle but tender and considerate to the vanquished, as was the great Abraham Lincoln, whose unflinching courage was manifested on many occasions and whose life was replete with touching ministrations to the helpless. When hunting in this country it has been reported that Roosevelt often shot down game for the sport of it, although the meat was unfit for use, and today when he goes out gunning in Africa if he fails to find big game some smaller and inoffensive animals must pay the penalty. But few incidents in his public life show a tender heart—if any heart at all. Civilization must needs drop back apace if to conquer, vanquish and kill, constitutes all the requirements of a real hero.

Thomas C. Platt when an active political leader used to designate the men who gathered around him for interviews and advice as his Sunday school class. E. H. Harriman likened some twenty odd newspaper men, who called on him by invitation to talk about business prospects, to a graduating class at college. These college boys listened to an interesting discourse, couched in the main in an optimistic view. Mr. Harriman on the eve of leaving home for a stay of three months in Europe, largely for his health, sees good times ahead and congratulates the country. His words about business matters have weight.

CURRENT TOPICS
Editor TRIBUNE.—The election of Boss Simon for Mayor of Portland after having been nominated by the Machine backed by the Oregonian reminds me of old times, when Boss Simon carried the North End vote in his vest pocket, as it were. Poor old Portland is doomed to a "wide-open" career from now on.

But what surprises one is, that the Oregonian now dares the Direct Primaries law in seven languages, after having taken a leading part in the preliminary work looking to its enactment. H. W. Scott was chairman of the Committee appointed to push petitions for the submission of the Constitutional Amendment, and was an active member of the "Direct Nomination League of Oregon." The acting Committee was composed of the following named gentlemen: H. W. Scott, W. M. Ladd, Henry E. McGinn, John C. Young, Thomas G. Green, J. F. Welch, C. S. Jackson, Jonathan Bourne, Jr., L. T. Harris, H. G. Kundret, C. E. Lockwood, T. Geer, A. R. Lawton, Henry Hahn, W. M. Hilleary, G. B. Thomas, John H. Mitchell, C. E. S. Wood, Frank Williams, C. H. Grem and Geo. B. Riddle.

The late strike of over 600 workers at the McCloud saw mills in northern California (a Minnesota corporation) was quickly settled, but not without the usual features of barter abuses. The men struck against low wages and long hours and company store extortions, and though peaceably inclined, the leaders were arrested and jailed. Strike breakers were brought in from other countries and sworn in as deputy Sheriffs flatly in contempt of the law which disqualifies a non-resident for such a position, this in line with the general plan that rich men don't have to respect the law.

The Governor made haste to send up the militia under Adj't Gen. Lauck, who, upon arrival, quarantined himself in the mansion of the President of the lumber corporation, showing that he wanted to hear only the corporation side of the dispute; and yet every one of these men who had a vote had whooped it up for Governor Gillette when he was a candidate. It was this or quit the camp, however. And we are told that this is a country of free men and free ballots.

Wesley Miller, a merchant from Gold Beach, Curry county, was in town last week waiting for some freight from Portland, to be shipped to the mouth of Rogue river.

A number of men who lately went to Curry county, to settle on the Port Orford Orchard orchard tracts, were in town last week on their way to Portland. They were not very enthusiastic regarding the new settlement; in fact their remarks might be classed as being very uncomplimentary.

The gasoline launch Fish arrived Thursday from Rogue river. She sailed from the river on Tuesday, but a strong northwest wind and a head sea caused her to turn back and wait for better weather. She loaded at Marshfield, Friday, with a full cargo of merchandise, most of which was for the Miller store at Gold Beach. She sailed yesterday.

Women over the age of 15 will have to procure a license from the county clerk before they can fish for trout, salmon trout, salmon or bass, with a hook and line common

ly called angling, according to the act passed by the last legislature. They must make application for the license, same as men and boys over 15, and send an affidavit to the county clerk, giving their weight, age, height, complexion and color of hair and eyes; but they need not accompany the affidavit with a dollar, same as men, as the license will be issued to them free. The fine for fishing without a license, except on a person's own property, is from \$25 to \$150.

MARSHFIELD TIMES.
Mrs. R. D. Hume, widow of the late Rogue River salmon king, is said to be arranging for the removal of her husband's body from Rogue River to San Francisco. Shortly prior to his death, Mr. Hume is said to have expressed a desire to be buried on the high promontory at the mouth of Rogue River and overlooking the Pacific. His wish was carried out, but it is stated that among Mr. Hume's documents and letters was a written statement by him that Mrs. Hume should have his body buried in the cemetery near their San Francisco home, especially if the Hume property at Rogue River should pass into other hands.

J. A. Cox, a Curry county pioneer and a native Oregonian, stopped over here today for a short visit with his nephews, Judge Hall and Tom Hall, while en route to Portland to attend the Masonic meetings there. While here, he was introduced to Constable Cox of Justice Pennock's court. The two who are now well advanced in years and who were born and raised in Oregon are cousins but had never met before.

A. H. Powers is now gathering a big crop of strawberries off his ranch on Cunningham creek. Last year, he had 10,000 boxes off the ranch and the crop this year promises to be as bountiful. The bulk of the crop is used in the logging camps and boarding houses of the C. A. Smith Company and the Smith Powers Logging Company.

Marine Phenomena.
Captain Henry E. Morgan of the steamship Mongolia reports to the Hydrographic Office that on the present trip out, in Lat. 30 degrees 49 min; Long. 177 degrees, 41 min; the ship passed through large quantities of pumice stone for about five miles. The sea had a peculiar disturbed appearance. Sounded and found no bottom at 250 fathoms. Pumice stone was in small pieces about the size of hens' eggs. Birds were also observed in this vicinity.
