The Knapp hotel is being thoroughly renovated, painted, varnished and papered where needed.

A couple of commercial travelers passed up the coast one day last week by private conveyance.

We were visited last Saturday by another refreshing rain, and late crops of all kinds are doing fine.

Mrs. Wm. Hurst was in from Elk river last week with a nice lot of logan berries and cherries for sale.

There was a one-man show in town Saturday night, and those attending did not speak very highly of the performance.

If mines are not struck in the mountains of Curry this summer it will be no fault of our boys, who are scouring the country in all directions.

Jas. Ellis was a business visitor to town the first of the week. He has thrown up his lease on the Walker place at Langlois, and returned to his Elk river home.

Rufus King, wife and baby, came up from Ophir one day last week on their way to Denmark, where they go to look at Dr. Tyler's ranch with a view of purchasing.

W. A. Marvin returned from near Sixes a few days ago, where he had been looking over several mining propositions that he expects his company to take hold of in the near future.

Mr. McCullom and wife, of North Bend, arrived in town Monday evening by private conveyance. Mrs. McCullom remained a guest at the Knapp hotel, while her husband went down on business to Gold Beach.

Rev. Neal held services in the Port Orford church as scheduled last Sunday. Mr. Neal will reside here during the summer where he will hold services two Sundays in the month, going to Gold Beach on the other two.

Judge W. R. Willis Succumbs to Old Age.

Roseburg, Or., June 24.—Following his 84th birthday by one day, death yesterday afternoon claimed Judge William R. Willis, at his home in this city. He was one of the best known early lawyers in South western Oregon, and a former vice president of the Oregon Bar Association. Death was due to a complication of ill attending old age, from which Judge Willis had been a sufferer since his retirement from the practice of law, five years ago.

Judge Willis served three years as the Mayor of Roseburg. Previously he had been Commissioner and County Judge. He was admitted to the bar in 1860, while serving in Roseburg as the first Justice of Peace in Douglas county. He was a native of Illinois. In early manhood he taught school in Ohio, and later became a steamboat pilot on the Mississippi River. In 1853 he immigrated to this country and engaged in livestock business until he began the study of law.

Judge Willis was well known in Curry county, having attended court at Gold Beach many times. He is survived by a widow and three grown daughters.

(COOS BAY NEWS)

The Smith-Powers' logging road, near the head of Isthmus slough, is bringing to tide water about 200,000 feet of logs per day.

Considerable quantities of chittim bark are arriving at Portland from Oregon and Washington points. Dealers are paying 50 per pound for it.

R. A. Church, who has the Luse farm on South Coos river rented, delivered milk from fifty cows at the Coos Bay Creamery for the month of May, which brought him, delivered at the creamery, \$706.50.
