CURRENT TOPICS.

Editor TRIBUNE:—Col. Hofer, editor of the Salem Capital Journal, instigated an "endless chain" of prayer services in Marion county for rain, and along came a copious down pour. At the same time hundreds of farmers in South Central Oregon, who had their total hay crops either in the swath or wind-row, and who, all unconscious of Col. Hofer's enterprise only 200 miles to the north of them, had been praying fervently for continued sunshine, but notwithstanding, Col. Hofer's prayers prevailed and their hay was spoiled.

And what is most remarkable in this behalf is, that Bishop Sudding and Archbishop Christy, while not prepared to endorse the claim that rain can be prayed down, decline to dispute the contention.

It will be remembered that one of the most disastrous droughts that ever struck that section visited Southern California in 1877. I was sojourning down there through it all and well remember that concerted prayer services were invoked all along down from San Jose to San Diego, and yet to no apparent purpose, as crops were ruined, pastures parched, and live stock died almost by the millions.

And now a tariff on coffee is demanded under the specious plea that under the operation of such protection Porto Rico would soon supply the whole American demand! Who is there that has not heard the claim urged in the past, that, with protection against sugar and wool importations this country would speedily be able to supply the whole demand, yet under Dingy very high protection for more than a decade, this country is still obliged to import about one-third of the wool our manufacturers require, and more than that proportion of the sugar we consume.

When Gen. Hancock, when a candidate for President, said, in answer to a correspondent, that the tariff was a "local issue," ignorant and stupid democrats were mortified at the "blunder" and proceeded to apologize and explain, while leading Republicans, if possible more ignorant and stupid, fairly howled in derision. Thomas Nast cartooned poor Hancock, and made him ask, "Who is Tariff for Revenue anyway?"

And lo and behold! Not a Senator in Congress but now insists that the tariff is a local question. And that is not all for it is now the fashion to proclaim that the tariff is not even a party question but no one in the near future will be found who will attempt to gain the point that the tariff is a selfish, sordid question.

When it was suggested to Aldrich by an insurgent Republican that such a tariff as he was insisting on would almost surely result in making the next house Democratic, he laughed outright and said: "You seem to overlook the fact that 18 Democrats including the entire Tammany forces voted to keep Czar Cannon on top in the House," and Aldrich was right, since both old parties have obediently bowed down to the greedy demands of the "Interests."

Enjoin Removal of Pioneer House

Oregon City, Or., June 21—Caleb E. Cross, by his attorney, J. F. Clark, commenced an injunction suit, Saturday, against F. S. Baker, contractor in charge of the removal of the McLoughlin home, E. G. Garfield, president, and E. K. Brodie, secretary of the McLoughlin Memorial association, to restrain them from removing the old building and placing it on the proposed site, at the head of the bluff above town, at the head of the Seventh street steps. This complaint grew out of a petition by property owners in that vicinity, for the passage, by the city council, of an ordinance prohibiting the placing of old buildings on city grounds.

In the complaint asking for the injunction it is alleged that the presence of the old buildings upon the proposed site would cause the value of the property in that vicinity to depreciate. Judge Eakin granted a temporary injunction, as prayed for. Then J. E. Hedges appeared on behalf of the defendants, and succeeded in having the injunction dissolved, so that the work of removal would here go on this morning.

This morning Caleb Cross filed an amended complaint asking for another injunction. He alleges that the proposed site for the old buildings is on block 40, that the land was given to the city for public use, that he, as a citizen and taxpayer of Oregon City owns a part of this block, and that the placing of unsightly and unsanitary structures on it will prevent himself and other citizens of Oregon City from enjoying the use of this block as it was intended to be used. Judge Eakin, after considering the amended complaint, granted a temporary injunction and the old building will stand where it is, until further action is taken in the case.

Loneliness and Health.

A medical journal has of late been discussing on the indigestion of loneliness. By this title is meant to be indicated the disorders of digestion which (taking one's meals in solitary state) the topic is by no means an uninteresting one. Thousands of men and women living alone are compelled to take their meals for the most part without company. Week in and week out they feed themselves without a soul to talk to, and the medical journal devotes its energies to showing that the practice is not one that is likely to be conducive to digestion, to proper bodily nourishment or to health. The solitary man soon tires of merely eating, and if he is not of a literary turn of mind, his tendency is to hurry through his meals to escape from his loneliness into the society of his fellow men. Herein, it is held, lies a danger to health.

Discovery of Coal in Wales.
