There is less excuse for protect-
ing sugar than for protecting any
other article in the tariff schedule,
but it always has been about the
most strongly fortified article on
the list.

The Senate after three months
wrestling with the tariff bill, has
at last passed one with hundreds
of amendments and sent the crazy
patch-work to the House where its
opening was like the opening of Pan-
dora's box.

Senator Bourne's speech in favor
of taxing the corporations is a very
able presentation of the arguments
in favor of the proposition, and has
been complimented in strong terms
by many of our leading papers. He
is more nearly than any other man
the leader in the fight, and has
doubtless furnished the arguments
that secured the President's advoca-
cy of the measure.

The growth of our country, the
building of a creditable navy, and
the completion of the Panama canal
are demanded by our people, and
he is but a poor patriot who equals
because a little deficit in revenue
appears. Don't kick because of a
legitimate deficit, but kick like fury
if our government sells Bonds, in-
stead of issuing full Legal Tender
Paper Dollars to pay her debts. This
is the only honest, sensible way.

Articles of incorporation for a
railroad, gasoline or electric line to
connect Port Orford and Bandon
were filed at Salem Tuesday. The
incorporators are Steve Gallier, R.
H. Rosa, S. D. Henderson, O. A.
Jamieson and Elbert Dyer. The
capital is \$5,000 divided into 50
equal shares. The principal place
of business is given as Bandon.

We congratulate the wisdom of
the long-headed men who organized
the above incorporation and bid
them "God speed." They have se-
lected the best terminals, and what
will eventually be one of the very
richest routes along the Pacific
ocean, of vast susceptibilities, and
unrivaled in infinite attractions that
tourists travel to see, and all people
enjoy. Port Orford is not only the
deepest harbor on our coast, but it
is the most beautiful, and a half
million dollars will make it a safe
one against our worst winter storms.

The recent address of Vice-Presi-
dent Sherman, at Utica, eulogistic
of this country's moral and indus-
trial greatness, has attracted much
attention through the press. Among
other things he said: "We have
twice as much life insurance as the
rest of the world and one-half as
much money on deposit in our
savings banks as all the rest of
the world. One third of all the
revenues collected by governments
is ours, while our debt is but one
thirtieth of the debt of the world.
We have enrolled in our schools 20,
000,000 students, 17,000,000 being
in our public schools alone, for
which we pay annually \$200,000,000
which is more than is spent by five
greater countries in Europe, includ-
ing Great Britain. The country is
not retrograding. Ambition as
well as patriotism is indigenous to
our soil. Ambition is inspired in
opportunity. Ambition and opportu-
nity have inspired and developed
genius. Genius has produced in-
vention. Invention has enlarged
opportunity and increased by
bounds American production, Amer-
ican wealth and American power.

Scandals have again broken out
in French army circles, and high
officials are accused of selling offices
and promotions. That custom,
which prevailed under the Bour-
bons, was suppressed by Napoleon,
but became prevalent again under
the last empire. So general did
this barter and sale of army appoint-
ments become under Louis Napoleon
that it was one of the main causes of
the disastrous overthrow of the
French in their war with Germany.
The first Napoleon's success was
largely due to the fact that army
promotions were won by merit only.
The French government has taken
cognizance of the current changes,
and a thorough house cleaning of
its military establishment may be
expected.

CURRENT TOPICS.

Editor TRIBUNE:—The death of
the late Congressman Cushman of
Washington was preceded by an un-
usually long illness among hungry
politicians for the vacant seat in
expectancy.

When the greatest Governor
Washington ever had (in the per-
son of John R. Rogers) died, tele-
grams of congratulations poured in
on Lieut. Gov. McBride before he
had assumed his position as Gover-
nor. This was unbecomingly and
congratulations at such a time could
only have proceeded from hungry
politicians in hopes to gain the ear
of the Governor to be in the hope of
appointive favors to come.

A last request of Congressman
Cushman was, that his remains be
not accompanied to his home by a
junker composed of brother mem-
bers, which showed that the de-
ceased statesman was decent and sen-
sible to the last.

It will be remembered that when
Senator George Hearst died in
Washington, and despite the en-
treaties of Mrs. Hearst that her hus-
band's remains be quietly shipped to
the Pacific Coast, a Senatorial
junker was sent along with the body,
and whose drunken orgies enroute
and on their return was a sensa-
tional scandal.

President Taft is to meet and
confer with the despot Diaz of Mex-
ico on the International Bridge on
the south boundary of Texas dur-
ing the summer. Mr. Taft visited
that other bloody despot, the Czar
of Russia at his palace in St. Peters-
burg, and, whether or not, there
was any argument on the subject
of the extradition treaty that Gro-
ver Cleveland foisted on this coun-
try in liquidation of obligations to
the Standard Oil Co., it is certain
that soon after Mr. Taft's return, the
Pinkertons got busy pulling in
Russian patriots who had escaped to
this Land of the Free and Home
of the Brave. Three million Amer-
ican patriots have petitioned for
the abrogation of that infamous, one-
sided treaty.

Practical Education in Demand.

President Hadley, of Yale, regrets
that the American does not care to
have its sons give the time necessary
for the effective use of the Greek
language as a means of competition
and discipline. Likewise, that
"colleges cannot teach a thing to a
public that does not want to study it."
One result is the outcome of the
other. The world is growing wiser
and more practical. It is not edu-
cation but the uses made of it that
counts. If a young man puts in
four years in a literary course at a
university and then forgets all
about it, there is here distinct loss
which the superficial graces will not
compensate for. If a man becomes
proficient in Greek and it is simply
used for his own pleasure or as evi-
dence of his superiority as a scholar,
indeed, the time is rapidly coming
when all the literary colleges will

be on trial, and some, if not most
of them discovering that they cannot
teach what the public does not
want to learn. We are getting to a
practical stage where we are begin-
ning to realize that entirely too
much time is being wasted by too
many people in learning things that
are of no practical value to them
when they get into the world and
begin to make the bread and butter
fight which is the over-haunting
fight of life. Most of our so called
education is a delusion. It leads
nowhere and amounts to nothing.
The problem before each boy and
girl on emerging from school is the
educational equipment which will
fit them to earn a living. In the
most essential things they find them-
selves very poorly provided. The
trade school, manual training, the
technical school, the school of do-
mestic science, all these, when
taught side by side with the mental
exercises which expand and illu-
minate them, tend to develop self-
supporting boys and girls and there-
fore achieve the highest results at-
tainable. The public is rapidly be-
ginning to realize all this; it is be-
coming less inclined to foot the bills
that pay for more ginger bread edu-
cation and it is beginning to more
seriously demand that the tendency
of education be in the direction of
fitting the children for the great
problem of life, which is the making
of a decent and honest living.—Tele-
gram.

Chinese Government, Prohib-
iting Opium, Begins With
Higher Ups.

Peking.—Through the opium
prohibition laws just promulgated
the imperial government has estab-
lished a governmental precedent in
making the common people a privi-
leged class, which exceeds the
dreams of the world's most radical
democrats.

Under the provisions of the im-
perial edict, the official classes be-
come amenable to the prohibitory
laws at once and any official found
guilty of hitting the pipe is subject
to punishment ranging from two
years' imprisonment to strangula-
tion.

Within one year the gentry come
under the law designed to free the
empire from the opium curse, but
not until the third year of Hsuan
Tung, which is three years hence,
can the prohibitory laws, except in
the employment of restraint in ag-
gravated cases, be invoked against
the coolie classes.

In explanation of the graduated
provisions of the law it is set forth
that the official classes are supposed
to be possessed of superior intelli-
gence and should obey all laws in
letter and spirit so as to create re-
spect for the government through
their example. No excuse, it is set
forth, exists for official disobedience
of the law.

The gentry, being removed in a
measure from active participation
in the government, are given a year
in which to acquaint themselves
with the new law, after which they
will be as vigorously prosecuted as
offending officials.

The coolie classes, it is set forth
are composed of ignorant people
and are recommended to the law's
patience, so it is ordered that they
shall not be amenable to the pro-
hibitory laws for three years, during
which period all officials are or-
dered to employ measures to acquaint
the lower classes with the law's pro-
visions.
