Kribs and Smith Win in Contest for Land.

Washington, July 17.—Acting
Secretary of the Interior Pierce to-
day denied the motion of Mossie et
al. to contest scrip locations filed
by Fred Kribs and C. A. Smith on
about 10,000 acres of heavily tim-
bered land in Curry county, Oregon,
thereby reversing the position which
he orally announced several weeks
ago.

This land was originally included
in a state school indemnity selec-
tion which was sold to Kribs and
Smith, but the state base proved to
be invalid, and Kribs and Smith,
under a priority right, secured
through the efforts of Governor
Chamberlain, filed on it with Aztec
Land & Cattle Company scrip.
Mossie and others attacked these
scrip filings, alleging conspiracy.

The Secretary's action sets aside
their protest, and, unless they file
a motion for review, patents will pass
to Kribs and Smith if their scrip,
upon examination, proves to be val-
id.

The land in dispute is reputed to
be extremely valuable.
