Our section is being visited by many distinguished looking strangers, and if they do not let their business be known, we class them as railroad spies, or prospectors of the future state. There's something in the wind! And Hope's expectant wing is beating upon the air to let in a gleam of light on "sombre omens yet unexplained."

That Harriman's "dog in the manger" policy is being broken up in Oregon causes universal rejoicing. He has been a "sleeping giant" in Oregon, and if he has overslept like a sluggard to the injury of our state, and has let his wily rivals steal a march on him, he is entitled to no sympathy. If he should be rooted out of the state altogether, we prefer the hog that roots, to the one that won't root!

The fight between Ballinger and Pinchot is so hot that an explosion must follow, and it looks like one of them will have to lay down his official tottery. It is said that Taft is with Ballinger, but Pinchot and his backers are making the most noise, as is always the case in a weak cause. We never look upon a map of the Forest Reserve in this county, without calling it "Pinchot's Curse upon Curry!" How preposterous to preach "Conservation of Nature" in a region where over six feet of rainfall falls every year, thus making forest growth spontaneous and indestructible, as every old-timer knows! Curry county is robbed of one half of its wealth for future taxation at the whim of an Eastern Crank. People once had some liberty on the public domain which belonged to them. Let a settler go upon it now, and a "Pinchot Guard," strutting in Russianized authority will watch his every step and order him around—and this in Free America! We have never believed that Congress can give the President and his officers control of the public domain, to such an extent that they own it, and can kick our citizens, either on it or off of it! Congress, and not the President, has control of our public lands, and all "Proclamation Reserves" are unlawful.

Deceptive Figures.

It appears that some of the apparently reduced rates are deceptive, that the tariff makers are tricksters trying to fool a majority of the people all the time. In one of the last debates on the lumber schedule, Clark (Dem.) declared that the duty on rough lumber was not to be reduced to \$1.25 per thousand, as one would suppose from a casual examination of the bill, and from the reports. He said it was reduced to \$1.25 plus 25 per cent of its value. Mann (Rep.) confirmed this, saying the duty would be \$1.25, plus 25 per cent of the value of the lumber abroad, about \$10 per thousand, making the total duty \$2.50. The country was led to suppose that the total tariff was to be \$1.25, whereas it is to be twice that. Is it thinkable to designate such petty trickery as this as statesmanship?

Another specimen of deceptive manipulation of figures appears in Aldrich's statement that there was a greater "duty decrease" than "duty increase," but it turns out on examination that in one case he used figures 400 per cent greater than those representing the facts, simply multiplied—or divided—the true figures by four, or whatever number suited his purpose, and so brought out the amount desired. And this is a sample of modern plutocratic, predatory statesmanship, Journal.

Developments in the Port Orford Tracts Company.

Walter Lyon, former secretary of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce, is arranging to get out a booster pamphlet on Coos and Curry counties. The Marshfield Chamber of Commerce today subscribed for \$200 worth of them.—Times.

The line of survey for the Bandon Port Orford railroad is about completed now and the work of securing the right of way is proceeding rapidly and is practically all secured between Bandon and Two Mile. Actual construction work will begin about September 15.

The big dredge built by W. N. McKay at the Price shipyards was taken up the river Monday where it is now operating in the Fat Elk country. This is one of the biggest drainage propositions ever attempted in this part of Oregon. There will be nine miles of ditch of various dimensions when the work is completed and will drain about 2,200 acres of the most productive land on the Pacific coast.

Lieut. J. C. Tyndall with a corps of surveyors is camped in the Cathlamet grove where they expect to remain for about three weeks. Lieut. Tyndall's corps is one of six detachments who are making a topographical and military survey of the coast.

He is very much pleased with conditions in Coos county and thinks there is quite a future for this locality. Lieut. Tyndall also spoke of the Coquille river and the Bandon beach as being exceedingly beautiful.

Circuit court will be held at Gold Beach, Curry county, commencing August 23. Judge J. S. Cooke, of Marshfield, will preside.

Dr. R. H. Walter, Tom Johnson and Henry Johnson returned Saturday from a hunting trip to Sixes. They saw 64 deer and killed ten.

There is said to be a good deal of inquiry throughout Oregon and Washington for chittim bark, and that the supply is short, nevertheless it is quoted in the Portland market at 5 cents per pound, which is a rather low figure if reports of shortage are true.

The first regular issue of the revived Daily Coast Mail made its appearance yesterday. P. C. Levar is editor and O. W. Briggs is city editor. Both are old newspaper men, practical printers and good writers and will no doubt make the Mail popular with its readers and profitable to its advertisers.

A young man named Melau was seriously injured at the Smith-Power's camp, on the Isthmus, at noon on Friday. He was working on the landing, when a log started down the incline, and when he noticed it he had no time to get out of the way. The log rolled over him, crushing him horribly, breaking several bones and fracturing his skull. He was taken to the Mercy hospital.

Judge Coke returned from Medford, Thursday evening, where he heard a special case for which court was convened. It seems that the city of Medford wanted to cross the property of a man named Hanley with a water pipe, to supply the city with water. Hanley was offered \$2,000 for right-of-way, but demanded \$25,000. The case was tried by jury and a price of \$600 was set. It is said that Hanley will appeal.

World's Deepest Mines.

As our readers are aware, the deepest gold mine in the Victoria Quartz, at Bendigo, in Australia; this mine has a vertical shaft that has been sunk to 4,300 feet and a winze that is 225 feet deeper, making the total 4,525 feet. In these deepest workings a "saddle reef" has been cut, but it does not carry pay ore; in fact, the Victoria Quartz Company has asked the Government of Victoria for a grant of £10,000, and the minister of mines has replied that he would provide the money if the company would agree to sink another 100 feet.

In California the main shaft of the North Star mine at Grass Valley is down 5,400 feet on the vein, which has a dip of 28 degrees, so that the maximum vertical depth is only 2,086 feet. The neighboring Empire mine has an incline shaft that is down 3,500 feet on the vein, but only 1,570 feet vertically below the surface.

The Kennedy, on the mother lode, in Amador County, is one of the famous mines of California. The maximum depth attained is 2,000 to 3,000 feet.

On the Comstock, the deepest mining now in progress is on the 2,300-foot level of the Ophir, which is 2,552 feet below the Gould & Curry outcrop. It will be remembered the greatest depth attained on the Comstock was in a winze in the Mexican mine, which, before the flooding of the workings in 1884, reached down to 3,308 feet, or 3,554 feet below the Gould & Curry outcrop.

On the Rand shaft of the Clin derella Deep is down to 4,200 feet and that of the Jupiter to 4,230 feet. Johannesburg, before long, will have many deep mines. In Brazil, the Morro Velho shaft of the St. John del Rey has reached a depth of 4,264 feet.

But the deepest metal mines are still in the Lake Superior copper region. There the Red Jacket shaft of the Calumet & Hecla mine is 4,920 feet vertical; while the Tamarack has two shafts over 5,000 feet deep, namely, No. 5, which is 5,180 feet, and No. 3, which is 5,230 feet vertical. These Tamarack shafts cut a ledge having a dip of 38 degrees at a vertical depth of 4,660 feet.—Mining and Scientific Press.
