Wash. D. C.—As between Mr. Ballinger and Mr. Pinchot, it is natural to suppose that the President, in case this trouble reaches an acute stage, will stand by Mr. Ballinger. Mr. Ballinger is a man of his own choice. Mr. Pinchot is a relic of the Roosevelt administration. In placing Mr. Ballinger in his cabinet, the President vouched for his standing and ability. On the other hand, he is in no way responsible for Mr. Pinchot, and if he had the original appointment of a forester, it is very much to be questioned whether he would pick Mr. Pinchot for the job. Moreover, Mr. Ballinger is proceeding along the lines of the law; Mr. Pinchot, by his frank confession, at the Irrigation Congress, believes in going beyond the law whenever it is necessary to obtain what he considers a desirable end. This Pinchot method does not coincide with the common understanding of the Taft policy.

The Tribune has ever opposed usurpation by any officer from President down. We prefer the law to Pinchot's dreams, and hence stand by Ballinger.

Supt. M. J. Anderson of the Forestry Service, A. W. Kammel, reforester, and Henry Haefner, assistant technical forester, were in Port Orford last Thursday, on their way down the coast on a tour of inspection. Mr. Anderson is an able officer, enthusiastic as a forester, ought to be, and is a genial man in conversation and manners. He is an earnest advocate of a wagon road down and along Rogue river to intersect our coast road, and believes that we should have, and can obtain, state aid at the next legislature, if we will agitate in conjunction with Southern Oregon, the building of such road from Crater Lake, down the river to the coast.

The Forestry Service will do all that can be done with its limited funds to build this road, and has already spent thousands of dollars on a trail with an easy grade from Galice creek down Rogue river, and will continue the work when funds are available. But it will take years to complete the road by such fragmentary work.

If the state would assist, Congress would feel disposed to grant a liberal appropriation, which would enable the road to be completed in a short time.

Unlike the Crater Lake appropriation which was a "local affair," a road down Rogue river to the sea would be of such general importance, that constitutional objections would be eliminated.

Let us keep the question alive, and see that our next legislative candidates be pledged to secure an appropriation for a Wagon Road from Crater Lake down Rogue river to the Coast Road, and no doubt all the legislators from Southern Oregon will stand solidly for the measure.

CURRENT TOPICS

Editor Tribune—Good morning. As the result of exposures made by the Chicago Daily Socialist, the grand jury has returned indictments against several millionaires. City officials charged with the lowest kind of graft and immorality. And the cry goes up in Chicago as in San Francisco, that prosecution of the sort "hurts business."

The prosecution of Warburton of Appeal to Reason is not likely to bring the fruit expected, to wit, the destruction of the paper. The Slave Power of old is being imitated by the Money Power of today. In the old days opposition presses were destroyed by mob violence and their editors sometimes murdered as in the case of Lovejoy of Alton, Illinois, who was slain by Whig and Democratic business men. Gamaliel Bailey and his wife narrowly escaped lynching in Cincinnati after the press and type had been dumped in the Ohio river by a mob comprised of "business men," Whigs and Democrats.

The difference now is that the press is sought to be muzzled by the money power through the medium of harassing and expensive prosecutions in the Courts.

A glance through Vol. 6 of Mc Master's History of the United States discloses the old method as follows: An anti-slavery meeting at Hay or Hill was broken up by a shower of brick bats.—Page 284.

Thompson narrowly escaped the mob at Concord. Whittier was pelted with mud and stones, and a gallows labeled, "by order of Judge Lynch," and provided with a noose for Thompson and another for Garrison, was erected in the street before Garrison's Boston house.—Page 384.

While one mob was chasing Garrison through the streets of Boston, another was breaking up the anti-slavery convention at Utica.—Page 385.

A political convention of Oneida county, New York, demanded that they close the churches, school rooms, court house and academy to the "defiled men who were kindling the flame of civil strife."—Page 285.

Early in the spring of 1836 Jas. Gillespie Birney began the publication of The Philanthropist at Cincinnati, and had put out but a few weekly numbers when the press room was broken open and the press, type and materials defaced or destroyed.—Page 297.

The anti-slavery society of Ohio, in reply to a request that the publication of The Philanthropist, said in a morning newspaper of Cincinnati that the paper which printed the reply was wrecked.—Page 298.

In 1837 John Quincy Adams, then a member of Congress, introduced a petition from slaves of the district of Columbia asking that slavery be excluded from the district, and it was by a narrow margin that he was saved from impeachment for his hardihood.—Page 294.

When the Massachusetts Anti-Slavery Society was about to hold its meeting in Boston, in 1837, not a meeting house, not a hall of any size, could be obtained, and the members were forced to assemble in a stable attached to one of the hotels.

Reuben Crandell was arrested at Georgetown, Pa., charged with circulating Tappan, Garrison & Co., newspaper, and lodged in the Washington jail.—Page 277.

So, it will be seen that the Slave Power Whigs and Democrats then and the Money Power Republicans and Democrats now, must needs muzzle the press and suppress agitation, because great wrongs dread the light.

Marshfield, Or., Aug. 19.—Recent

acquirements of valuable water frontage on Coos bay and timber and mining properties by purchasers whose identities are carefully masked, tend to confirm the belief that James J. Hill is seeking a coast terminus at Coos bay for his Deschutes railroad. Right of way agents have been negotiating for several months for land between Coos bay and Gardiner, 40 miles up the coast from Coos bay, on the Umpqua river.

Statements from railroad men, whose names are withheld from publication, are to the effect that a continuous route from Coos bay to Gardiner has been acquired, and that the purchasers are active rivals of the Harriman interests. Upon good authority it is stated that John F. Stevens will be on Coos bay within the next few weeks; that he will make the trip by an auto via the route recently bought up from Coos bay to Florence.—Journal.

James H. Back of Deschutes Railroad.

Portland Oregonian: Uncertainty as to the actual force behind the Oregon Trunk was removed yesterday when John F. Stevens made the announcement that he had acquired a controlling interest in the project, which, in its execution, is to be financed by J. J. Hill, personally. The acquisition of this property by Mr. Stevens and his associates and the identification of Mr. Hill with it are of major importance to the railroad situation in this state. It is regarded as the initial step by Hill in his invasion of Central Oregon and the eventual building of a railroad to San Francisco. Subsequent developments resulting from Hill's invasion of Oregon are expected materially to alter the railroad map of the state.

"I have acquired a controlling interest in the project, have all necessary financial arrangements completed, and the road will be built as fast as it can be reasonably done with men and money," said Mr. Stevens yesterday. "The matter is a personal one, and I have no objections to saying that J. J. Hill, as an individual, is financially interested to any extent necessary to carry the road through to successful completion."

Plans in detail are not fully developed, but will become apparent from time to time, as conditions may seem to require. It may be said, however, that the Oregon Trunk proposes to provide as quickly as practicable a northern outlet for Central Oregon, regardless of the designs of any other transportation company.

Having made this announcement, Mr. Stevens refused to budge an inch, explaining that he was not in a position to disclose further information as to the plans of himself and his associates.

Construction of a lateral line from some point in Central Oregon into the Coos Bay country is also included among the possibilities of the Hill invasion of Oregon. Returning from his trip through Central Oregon, Stevens also spent considerable time in the Coos Bay district, which is regarded as an attractive field for building a railroad.

Some Charming Recollections of Edward Everett Hale.

Edward Everett Hale's later literary life was intimately associated with Woman's Home Companion, to which he was a regular contributor in the last years of his life. The August issue of this magazine contains a number of charming anecdotes about Dr. Hale. His secretary, writing about Dr. Hale, says: "He loved out of doors, and this was written mornings as we sat on what he called his quarter deck, at the back of the house, overlooking the garden. So many times he would stop in the middle of a sentence to say, 'This is the kingdom of heaven,' or, 'Isn't this as nice as they make it?' or some such phrase which showed his joy in life. I all ways had to make him stop dictating. And he would so often beg, 'Just one more and then I'll be as good as you wish.'"

The house in Roxbury which was his home for so many years was, like himself, built upon generous lines. It is a wide, double house with stately pillars at the front. At the rear, on the first floor, was

his commodious library, full to overflowing with all sorts of "books which are books." In one of his poems Tennyson describes his garden on the Isle of Wight as a "careless-order'd garden." Hale's library was a careless-order'd library, apparently responding to what his friend Star King would have called a law of disorder. What a captivating retreat it was—especially when its master sat and discoursed in it. He said to me one day when I was in Roxbury, "I'll tell you how I came to get this house. I advertised for it, and put in the advertisement, 'modern improvements no object.'"

Changes in Paper Money.

Washington, Aug. 10.—Several important changes in the designs of the paper money of the country are to take place soon. Secretary MacVeagh, Assistant Secretary Norton and Director Ralph of the Bureau of Engraving and Printing have under consideration a general scheme for systemizing the designs of all issues of paper money in such a manner that the same portraits and emblems will appear on all notes of the same denomination. It can be stated on good authority that the portrait of the late Grover Cleveland soon is to appear on all ten-dollar bills.

Distinctive designs for one dollar, five dollar, twenty dollar and fifty-dollar bills, and perhaps those of even higher denominations, have been prepared. The two-dollar bills may be abolished, it is reported. If the two-dollar bill is retained, it is certain that its design will be such as to make it stand out from a pile of one dollar and five-dollar bills with a prominence that will permit of no mistake in its handling.

Some Treasury officials are inclined to favor even a more radical change, and recommend that paper money be reduced to about the size of French and Italian notes of smaller denominations. These notes are about three-fifths the size of the American kind and are more convenient to handle.

Eugene, Or., Aug. 19.—John F. Stevens, Hill's chief engineer, is in the McKenzie valley east of Eugene, viewing out a route for a railroad from the proposed Deschutes road across the Cascades down the McKenzie valley, through Eugene, thence to Coos Bay. Stevens and his party passed through Eugene from Portland a few days ago.

It is reported here that Hill agents are negotiating with the Welch interests, who own and operate the local street railway system, and also a line from here to Springfield and right of way for a line from Eugene to the upper McKenzie valley, including valuable water power sites.—Journal.
