



## TOWN RUNS TO SEED.

INHABITANTS OF MATTANIS CONTIS NUMBER ONLY SO.

Although Once Very Prosperous, Maine Village Is Now in Danger of Becoming a Plantation-

People All Belated. Augusta, Me .- The story of the average backwoods town in Maine is much like the history of a star, as each begins its career in a nebulous condition reaches a stage of heated activity and

finally burns itself out. This winter Representative Mulles, of Bangor, has introduced an act in the Maine legislature permitting the town of Mattamiscontis, 44 miles northeast from Hangor, to surrender its town organization and lapse back into a plantation so as to escape the support of its paupers and the payment of county and state taxes.

Mattamiscontis was incorporated as a town, being a slice taken from How-land, on March 8, 1839. At that time the valuation of the town was \$60,000 and its population was 82. The residents had every prospect of getting rich rapidly. The town grew and

On March 4, 1904, the entire population of Mattamiscontis was 28, of whom 11 were voters, and every one in town was either a Sawyer or a Roberts. There were one Sawyer and two Roberts' on the board of assessors, two Sawyers and one Roberts were overseers of the poor, a Sawyer was collector of taxes and treasurer, three Sawyers were serving as selectmen, a berts was superintendent of schools, Miss Maud Sawyer and Miss Agnes Roberts taught the two schools, a Sawyer was justice of the peace, a Rob-erts was under contract to furnish wood for the schoolhouses and a Sawyer broke out the spowy highways and Sircuit Court meets Fourth Monday in carried the children to and from school, Everybody was related to every

else. The entire community was no more than a family affair. There was no post office, no clergyman, no lawyer and no doctor in the whole town. The entife assets of the municipality were of an appraised valuation of \$19,286 and a weed-grown cemetery, in which there had been no interment for six

Under the laws of Maine when person is ultable to support himself and becomes a public charge while re-siding on a plantation the cost of his maintenance falls upon the adjoining town which has been organized for the longest time. Mattamisconti has four paupers who have been supported at a cost of \$750 a year. By becoming a plantation the community can compel

Howland to care for them. In addition to getting rid of this bill the plantation will have to pay no taxes, except for common schools and repairing the highways. The change from a town to a plantation form of government will be a profitable investment for the Sawyers and Roberts

Library to the Ancient Monastery.

The librarian was sworp into office on the holy gospels, at became one whose duty it is to furnish to those who have need the "food" and "weapons" of the soul -for so they used to call books. "Books are the nourishment of the soul," says one abbot, speaking of the library of his convent; and another says: "As the armory is to the castle, so the library is to the monastery." The very name librarian, "armarius," derived as it is from the press, cupboard or almeric in which the books are kept, is precisely the modern word almoner -as the almoner serves from his cupboard food and drink for the needy, so the librarian deals out books, which are the food and drink of the soul, says Harper's Magazine.

In the beginning the librarian was, curiously enough as it sounds at first, the precentor or choirmaster, but the explanation of this is, in fact, simple enough; since the first books were the service books kept in the apsecupboard in the church, the precentor was naturally charged with their care, and when the collection grew by the addition of other books he kept charge until the growth made subdivision of labor necessary.

The ordinary duties of librarians are often laid down with great minuteness in monastic rules; they differ greatly in detail but not much in essence from those of the modern; he must take charge of the books, "keep and know under their separate titles," frequently examine carefully to prevent damage from damp, dust, mice and "moth worms," and repair them when damaged. He must lend books to the brethren, enter such loan carefully in his register, and see that a sufficient deposit is left for its return, or proper bond given.
