Isom Walker passed through town yesterday with a band of young cattle which he is driving to Humboldt Co., California.

Mrs. Lindberg started for a visit to Marshfield last Thursday, and will spend some time visiting her relatives before returning.

Mrs. Alice Zumwalt is again living in her nice Port Orford home, having spent most of the spring and summer cooking at Jamieson's sawmill on Sixes.

Wm. Nordberg is now living in Port Orford at the home of his son-in-law M. T. Wright, having never fully recovered from his illness of a few months ago.

The Fish, Capt. George Forty, dropped into Port Orford Wednesday night, on her way from Coos Bay to Rogue river, for which port she left next morning.

Julius Koch, Port Orford's young octogenarian—the spryest man in Oregon for his age, left here by Tuesday's stage to take in the fun at the Marshfield Carnival.

Walton Miller came up Monday with his father's team with which he will haul lumber to his homestead, to be used to flume water to his house, and also to H. T. Stewart's home.

Newt and Ed Divilbiss were in town Friday with their teams after supplies. Mining interests on Sixes are looking brighter, they say, and people are generally prosperous along the river.

Doug Cook brought us a box of fine Italian prunes last week as a present from Mr. and Mrs. Frank Cook of Sixes river. It is a waste of words to say that they were appreciated with thanks.

Mr. Thompson of Portland, who cruised the Hume timber in this county for Geo. Finley of Portland, arrived in Port Orford on Monday's stage and will look at some timber in this section before returning.

Grouse and native pheasants can be legally killed between the 15th day of October and the 15th day of November. Not more than five can be killed in one day, nor more than ten in seven consecutive days.

Everything indicates that an electric railroad will be built in the next two years from Roseburg to Coos Bay, provided that a right does not originate with the Boise railroad scheme, which will delay both, and may kill either.

A match base ball game came off Sunday at Gold Beach, between the home team and Pistol river, resulting in a victory for the latter by a score of 18 to 12—Delmar Colegrove pitching for the winners and Will Bailey for Gold Beach.

Mrs. N. O. Neilsen drove up to Bandon Sunday in her buggy. She was accompanied by Mrs. F. A. Stewart and her grand daughter, Dorothy, who will spend some weeks visiting Mrs. T. L. Carey of North Bend who is Mrs. Stewart's daughter.

J. W. Ludwig, chief of the Cape Blanco Wireless Station, and Mr. Marr, Light House Assistant were in Port Orford Saturday on business. Mr. Marr informs us that he has sent his daughter and son to Florence on the Siuslaw to school for the winter.

All our exchanges in Southern Oregon and Northern California are teeming with railroad news. The coast line is to be built at once, and many short lines are to reach the coast from several interior points. Certainly some of them will materialize, and the signs are favorable for several. The greatest forests in the world are on the immediate Pacific coast, and rival railroad kings know these forests and want to haul the lumber they will furnish. With railroads actually building, a short time will usher in such a boom all along the coast, as our country never before experienced.

It is said that there are more Jews in New York, than there ever was in Jerusalem—every fifth person in New York being a Jew.

Eighty per cent of the mines at Butte, Montana, are closed as the result of a strike by ten thousand, or more miners. Trouble is expected and bad feeling prevails.

The greatest dirigible air ship of France exploded last week when 500 feet in the air, and the four men aboard of her were all killed. Air ships may yet prove to be as dangerous as automobiles.

The rain Thursday night was much heavier than any recent one, thoroughly soaking the ground, and laying the dust for "keeps." All mountain fires are put out, and our skies are Italian blue.

More than a thousand salmon were caught in Rogue river last week in one haul so one of the boys informs us. Unless high water occurs from heavy rains, October has always been the best month for fall fishing.

Theron Fromm and Will Colebrook were in town Thursday night on business. Mr. Fromm has leased the Colebrook stock farm for a term of years and will take possession at once. The Colebrooks may locate in Bandon.

The Coast came down from Coos Bay Friday, with a full load of merchandise for Port Orford, and, although a fresh south wind was blowing she lay at the wharf and readily discharged her cargo. She returned to the Bay taking about a ton of wool.

Mr. Deans was in town Thursday on his way to Rogue river from a business trip to Marshfield. Mr. Deans, discovered and owns a most promising copper mine on the Illinois river near its mouth, which he has bonded to a company from Swansea, Wales.

The Rogue River Courier of Oct. 1st published a lengthy, well written article on Curry county, from the pen of Forest Supt. Anderson of Grants Pass, who made an extended tour of the county during the summer, and gathered data with experienced eyes.

The Wireless Station, one day last week, was in communication with the Sandwich Islands for the first time. The TRIBUNE expects hereafter to get many important news items, by the Cape Blanco Station, which ought to be connected with Port Orford by telephone.

Negro Dan who has been a county charge at Gold Beach, and is no doubt a consumptive, spent a couple of nights in Port Orford last week and went on to "Myrtle Point by stage where he says he has friends. He is an object of pity and should be taken care of somewhere as the law provides.

We have received a copy of the "Independent," published in Boone, Iowa, which contains an interesting article by Hon. J. H. Upton of Curry county, Oregon, full of reminiscences of men and events of the early days of that section, where Mr. Upton spent many of his younger days. The article is a wonderful exemplar of his retentive memory.

The Alliance was fumigated while at Portland last week, and on a search being made in the hold for dead rats a rattlesnake, three feet long was discovered. How or when the reptile got on board the vessel is not known, but it is said that a snake charmer took passage on the steamer lately, and it is supposed that he smuggled some snakes aboard and that during the voyage the one in question escaped.

Eugene White, a brother of W. T. White, and for many years a resident of San Rafael, arrived in Port Orford Friday, having come to Bandon by the steamer Elizabeth. He was accompanied by his nephew Eugene White who went down from here about a month ago to meet his uncle and escort him to this place, where he proposes to make his home in the future with his brother. He is well along in the seventies, but is strong and spry, and like his brother, and all sensible men, he likes wit, fun and knowledge, and prefers to be classed as an "older boy," rather than as an "older has been." We welcome him to Curry county, and feel sure that he will like our hospitable people and matchless climate. Mr. White, once had a family, but his wife and two children crossed the great divide leaving him alone in old age, but for other loving relatives.

#### Another Pioneer Passed Away.

Davis L. Moore, who was stricken with paralysis about a year ago, died at his home on Euchre creek in Curry county, Oregon, Sept. 30th, 1909.

Mr. Moore was born in Knox county, Illinois, Feb. 17th, 1844, and crossed the plains to Oregon in 1850, his parents settling in the Willamette valley, where he grew up to manhood, and married Miss Mary L. Cook, whose parents settled in the Long Tom country near Eugene in 1854. In 1869, he came with his wife to Curry county, locating on Rogue river, but afterward settled at the mouth of Euchre creek, and developed a fine stock farm on which he died, making a success of life, rearing a fine family of six sons, and having the respect of all who knew him. He was a kind neighbor, a trusted friend, a useful citizen in all ways, and a loving husband and father. He took a deep interest in the district school and road matters, and was a member of the Masonic fraternity.

He was buried Sunday in the cemetery at Gold Beach in the presence of a large concourse of people. To his widow and sorrowing relatives the TRIBUNE extends its heart sympathy and condolence and hopes they will bear bravely the cross that all must bear.

J. H. Thompson, who recently purchased the Crescent City News plant, returned this week from a trip up the Klamath and Trinity rivers. He made us a pleasant call on Monday and stated that he would assume the editorship and management of the News on October 1st. October 4th will be the last day for the payment of the second installment of taxes, and all taxes unpaid by that date will become delinquent. Those who paid only half of their taxes last spring will do well to keep October in mind and pay at any time on or before that day.

After October 4th, certificates of delinquency will be issued to anyone who pays taxes on property that has been neglected or overlooked by the owner. This certificate bears interest at 15 per cent until redeemed by the owner, and unless redeemed within three years, the holder of the certificate becomes entitled to a deed.

#### Forged Checks.

Chas. Neal, known as "Coonekin Charlie" a former resident of this vicinity, has been placed under arrest at Yellowstone, Mont., charged with passing worthless and forged checks. Extradition papers will be asked of the governor of Montana and Sheriff Gage will go after Neal and bring him here for trial. Neal was a trapper on the Coquille for a number of years, but left here about nine years ago. He returned this summer and while here secured check books on two Myrtle Point banks. The checks commenced to come in in various amounts with the names of local people signed to them. The first bunch gave the bankers a hint of what was going on and they at once made arrangements for his apprehension. When he was here he appeared at the county clerk's office at Coquille with six coyote scalps, claiming to have caught the animals in this valley, but it is now thought that he brought them in with him. He had a pocket full of gold when he was here and it is believed that he had been using questionable methods of obtaining money for some time. The names signed to the checks were those of L. A. Roberts, W. A. Neil and Geo. Martin.

The story is recalled in this connection of the time Schiller Hermann grubstaked Neil for a season of trapping. Neil was to pay in hides as they ran. The account dragged on for many months and finally Mr. Hermann, who was in the general merchandise business here, asked him about the hides.

"You were to take them as they ran?" suggested Neil. "Yes," acquiesced Hermann. "Well," said Neil, "the last I saw of them they were running like —." This is the time thought that Neil was taken as he ran, and his career as phony-trapper will probably be closed for some little time.—Myrtle Point Enterprise.

#### Coast Fortifications.

Projects for land defense on the Pacific coast are receiving a great deal of attention lately. Lieutenant Park of the engineering corps, with a detachment from Vancouver, has made a survey of the Pacific coast from Grays Harbor to Coos Bay, and has prepared an elaborate system of defense, including charts and specifications for the necessary materials.

Another engineering party has been in the field, surveying a military road down the Columbia river, which is intended to serve the forts at the mouth and other coast points.

Major Wm. G. Ham, Fort Wadsworth New York, has been ordered to the Pacific coast to inspect and revise the various land defense systems in the departments of Puget sound, the Columbia, San Francisco, etc.

News was received from Ashland, Oregon, last week, announcing the death of Thos. Buckman, which occurred at his home there on the 25th. Mr. Buckman was formerly a resident of Eastside, and was elected a member of the legislature from Coos county on the Populist ticket. He was 3 years old.

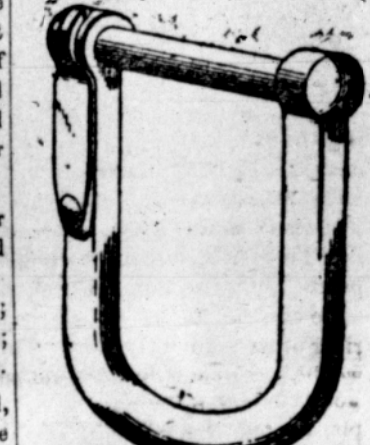
