CURRENT TOPICS.

Editor TRIBUNE: It is by no means certain that the much kissed Richard Pearson Hobson late Naval Constructor but now member of Congress from Alabama, is not in the pay of the steel trust. His demands for a bigger and yet bigger navy amounts to a species of fanaticism.

Pressure is being brought to bear to induce President Taft to name Governor Hughes for the vacancy on the Supreme Bench occasioned by the death of Justice Brewer.

This effort to shunt Charles E. Hughes to one side, calls to mind the corrupt agreement of Grover Cleveland, in consideration of big trust contributions, to take the great Judge Walter C. Gresham into his cabinet so as to relieve the railroads of his presence on the Federal Bench.

Cardinal Gibbons intimated that the late flood in Paris was sent as a rebuke from Heaven because France had been guilty of sacrilege of State and Church separation!

The Oregonian, although it formerly pictured Mr. Simon a monster of political and civil turpitude, is now daily besnatching him with praises of the most servile sort; and in the same issue that carried a very elaborate account of the doings at a banquet in honor of the 87th anniversary of the birth of George H. Williams that paper said editorially that Simon was incomparably the best Mayor Portland had ever had.

It is unfortunate that the President can be honestly no doubt, misled by the bankers. They have persuaded him that they had been bound into investing in 2 per cent bonds, whereas as a matter of fact Congress had been buncoed by the bankers all along.

So completely has Mr. Taft been bamboozled by the "interests" that he argues that the deposits in the proposed Postal Savings Banks shall be used to take up these 2 per cent bonds that he has been persuaded the banks had been "buncoed" into buying. In the discussion of this feature of the problem

Senator Dolliver made a masterly speech, during the delivery of which Senator Owen interrupted him to say:

"Mr. President, I was connected with one of these banks, and am still, and I have a great interest in it. We telegraphed our correspondent, just after the act passed, purchasing \$250,000 of these bonds. The currency against these bonds, issued as the currency of this particular bank, was used to pay for the purchase of the bonds, less a small item of premium; and thereafter and since that time this bank has been receiving 2 per cent on the bonds substantially without any investment whatever. The bonds yield about one and a half per cent, and as the national banks are getting the interest on over seven hundred millions of bonds which cost the banks nothing or a negligible amount, they have abused the confidence of their friends in claiming to be buncoed."

Mr. Dolliver. It is calculated to bring tears to anybody's eyes after he thoroughly understands it. Mr. Owen. The substantial fact is that from twelve to fourteen millions per annum are paid to the banks without consideration, as interests on these bonds bought by the banks with their own notes.

This, then, said Mr. La Follette, "little bunco game" that was played—not on the banks, but on the people of the United States—because the people it is who pay this \$12,000,000 annually of interests on no investment! Is it any wonder that Senator DOLLIVER, in spite of his well known regard for proper similes and the deference due to the Chief Executive of the nation, was moved, in the face of these facts, to declare, of the President's intimation that the government had buncoed the banks, "My friends, we are come upon a time of amateurs in our national affairs!"

And the proposition to use postal savings deposits to purchase these bonds is in direct conflict with an early clause in the bill which provides that such deposits shall be re-deposited in banks in the vicinity whence such deposits have been gathered; that to protect the country against local stringency in money matters. But the banks at the east know what they want and why they want it, and they have been in the habit of having their way. Borah's amendment scotched the scheme for the present. But just wait!
