(COOS BAY NEWS)

Arrangements are being made for a race meet at the Marshfield track July 1st, to 5th, inclusive. A number of good horses will be here and some fine sport is anticipated.

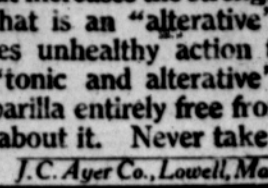
