Bourne's speech in the Senate on Civil Government, has created a sensation all over our country, and the demand for it is so great that 400,000 extra copies have been printed. Mammoth Buildings.

The cities of the West from Seattle to Los Angeles, think they are doing big things in the way of building, and whenever a structure of from fourteen to sixteen stories is projected, a great deal of bragging is engaged in. In New York city they are now engaged in tearing down a nine-story steel structure one of the most substantial in that city which was built only five or six years ago and in its place is going up an edifice of forty stories, or to be exact, thirty-nine stories and a balcony.

This great building is being put up on one of the most valuable pieces of real estate in the world, the location being on the northwest corner of Nassau and Wall streets.

Across from it to the east is the sub-treasury, and diagonally across the bank of J. P. Morgan & Co. Practically adjoining is the Equitable building, covering more ground than any building in that vicinity, one block away at the corner of Wall and Broadway is the First National Bank and opposite that is Trinity Church.

The site of the new building is worth, according to sales recently made in that vicinity, about two thousand dollars a square foot, or ten millions of dollars for a lot of 50x100 feet.—EX.

The Oregonian confesses that the delegate "assembly" is the equivalent of the delegate convention, but insists that the submitting of the names of the nominees of the "assembly" to the primary election for ratification complies with the primary law. Nevertheless that paper declines to answer my question, viz: "What the devil is the sense of nominating the same candidates twice, first by delegate convention and then again at the primary election?" The bosses will have gotten in their work as of old, and Ex Judge McGinn explains in a lucid manner how that had generally been done.

Washington, May 31.—The power of the Inter State Commerce Commission to enforce railway rates of its own making was affirmed today in an opinion handed down by justice McKenna, of the Supreme Court. The rate making power of the Commission was questioned by the railroads, and a number of cases were filed to test the point. The objection to the law empowered the commission to fix rates was based on the ground that the law authorizing the rate making power of the commission was a delegation of legislative power vested in congress by the constitution, and therefore invalid.
