Roosevelt is to help Beveridge out in his Indiana campaign for a return to the U. S. Senate. As Beveridge is an insurgent and voted against the Administration Tariff Bill, the action of Roosevelt clearly aligns him with the Insurgents, and sends icy chills into the ranks of the Staud-paters.

He has announced he will attempt to fly out to sea, alight on the surface, rise and fly back to Atlantic City. Curtiss has fitted his biplane with airtight pontoons and is convinced the force of his propellers will lift him out of the water. Brookings, the Wright brothers' plucky aviator is planning a flight of several miles to sea where he proposes to drop notes on the decks of passing coast liners.

Portland, Or., July 12.—Oregon, in addition to an efficient state militia, is to have an organization of Naval Reserves. Steps have already been taken to form an organization which will maintain the same relation to the navy in time of war that the militia does to the army. Ex navy men and others interested formed a temporary organization at Portland during the past week. This will be made permanent as soon as possible.

Gray's Harbor people are talking over the project of building a canal from that waterway through Willapa Harbor to the Columbia River, thus giving a deep water, dependable channel to the sea. One meeting has already been held and the people are considering it seriously. It is said such a project will cost not over \$1,000,000 and in addition to its aid to navigation, will drain a territory covering 10,000 acres of marsh land now practically worthless.

WASHINGTON, June 23.—The first official bulletin issued by the census bureau on the recent census gives this city a population of 331,069. In 1900, the city's population was 259,718.

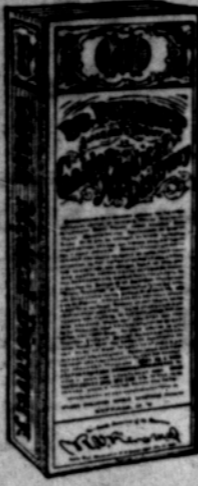

CURRENT TOPICS.

Editor TRIBUNE.—The other day on a public road in Massachusetts, Robert Taft, a son of the President, accompanied by two college chums in an auto which he was driving, ran over and seriously, if not fatally, injured a laborer employed with others improving the highway. The trio dashed up and sounded the danger horn and became hilarious at the haste with which the laborer, all but one, scuttled to safety, the one being hit in his flight and probably fatally hurt as stated above. Bad whiskey and contempt for man who must work to live, were the compelling influences back of this tragedy.

The Omaha Herald, speaking of the late election in Mexico and the Constitutional amendment which allows the butcher Diaz to seek election indefinitely, says: "Since then the form of an election has been gone through with until now, but 'Don Porfirio' has never had any serious opposition at the polls in the last twenty-six years."

The Herald ought to have added that during these years, whoever has proposed to run against him has been promptly arrested by the army and cast into prison dungeons.

A committee of Congress is taking testimony ament the complaint that American officials north of the line are operating under pay of the butcher Diaz harrasing refugees hounded out of Mexico. And the man Lawlor erstwhile U. S. Atty. at Los Angeles has been promoted to the position of Chief Counsel for Ballinger, presumably in recognition of his activity in hounding Mexican refugees who have been so unfortunate as to be "suspected" by him. It has not always been thus. Karl Schurz escaped from Germany with a price on his head, and instead of turning him over to the tender mercies of the Lawlors to be transported to sure death, we gave him a high command in the army and then elected him to the U. S. Senate. Thomas Francis Meagher, the Fenian, who escaped to our shores with a price on his head, we not only protected him against recapture, but gave him a Major General's command in our army and afterwards sent him out as a Territorial Governor of Montana. And there were General Franz Siegel the German patriot, and other Germans and Irishmen whom we protected against the wrath of the despots from whom they had escaped to our shores. And yet with strange inconsistency we round up Mexican and Russian refugees and get our sleuths busy against them on the merest suspicion that they are "wanted." Our Morgans and Hartmans and Rockefeller and Hearsts

demand the sacrifice in return for the large bribes they have received in the way of rich concessions. Senator Beveridge gave voice to a lamentable truth when he said that commercialism and great wealth are always and everywhere essentially unpatriotic.

The Oregonian persists in the foolish iteration and reiteration that in 1908 Democrats registered as Republicans so as to be able to vote for Coker in the Primary to defeat Fulton for the nomination for U. S. Senator, deeming Coker the weaker of the two. As a matter of fact everybody thought Coker was the strongest man, inasmuch as Fulton had to make a defensive campaign throughout, hence to suppose that Democrats supported Coker in the interest of Chamberlain is to suppose them fools, since Fulton would obviously be easier to beat at the general election than Coker. For one particular reason if not for other reasons, Chamberlain desired the defeat of Coker in the primary election, to wit, Coker was a Portland man, and Portland being a Republican stronghold, the outlook for Chamberlain would be dubious indeed against a Portland Republican. However, the Oregonian being engaged in a desperate enterprise, does not hesitate to throw logic and sound reasons to the winds.

The Oregonian is singularly forgetful of historic facts when it says that the late Chief Justice Fuller had been notorious for his sympathies with the Union cause. This is strange logic for a paper that has always insisted that no Democrat could be a loyal citizen. He was a delegate in the National Democratic Convention that nominated McClellan and was a delegate in every National Democratic Convention up to the time he went on the Bench.

That Judge Fuller in all his decisions has been loyal to the money power that placed him on his pedestal possibly may now account for the encomiums bestowed upon him by the organs of Special Interests. It was he that wrote the Income tax decision and later decisions making labor unions amenable to the Sherman anti trust law, a thing never intimated by its author; and joined in the decision legalizing the infamous kidnapping of labor men.
