Town and County.

Going to the wires being down, election returns have been very slow in reaching Curry county.

Mrs. Wood and child are spending the winter in Port Orford with Mrs. Wood's mother, Mrs. M. A. Nielsen.

There will be a Thanksgiving shooting match for turkeys in Port Orford, and the town boys invite the country boys in to take a few pointers in target work.

N. H. Larson has been confined to his room for the past few days by a severe wrench of the muscles of his back. As soon as he is able he will go to Bandon for treatment.

The Aubury Bros. lost over 200 salmon by having their fish-boxes wash away during the raise in Sixes river last week. The high water Saturday will probably put a stop to further fishing in both Elk and Sixes.

The Socialist vote in Curry county was a disappointment to the members of that party. One thing that hurt it in Northern Curry was that they put up candidates for Port Commissioners, a non political office, thereby causing the defeat of the Republican Commissioners in favor of the Port.

Eugene White was up from Corbin yesterday fixing up the telephone wire which was broken in many places by the blow last Saturday. He says that considerable timber was blown in the road, and that he believes it was the hardest wind that has swept this section in several years.

The body of Capt. Jacobson, who was drowned on the Osprey, was washed up on the beach about eight miles north of Coos Bay where it was found by the mail carrier. It was identified by men who knew him, and buried in Marshfield. The bodies of the other four victims have not been recovered.

The Port Orford Furniture & Hardware Store was a popular place for a couple of days following election. A purse was raised and as the reports came flashing in over the wire, John Gillings caught the news in shorthand and ran it off on a typewriter for the bulletin board. It was the only systematic report of the election kept in Curry county.

C. H. Marsh, right-of-way agent for the Willamette Pacific R.R., and Addison Bennett, special staff writer for the Oregonian, were in Port Orford Monday and Tuesday on their way down the coast following the proposed line of the railroad from Eugene to Eureka. Mr. Bennett, who is one of Oregon's best known writers, will write a series of articles which will appear in the Oregonian describing the country and its resources along the route of the proposed railroad.

A Mr. Owen and his aunt, Mrs. Warren, from Seattle, arrived in Port Orford on the stage at 9:30 last evening, having come in via Roseburg. They report the roads in bad condition, and say that they have had sufficient staging experience to satisfy them for some time to come. They went out to Hon. J. D. Loucks' home on Elk river this morning, they being old acquaintances of Mr. and Mrs. Loucks. Mr. Owens also contemplates purchasing the "Dean" ranch from Mr. Loucks.

Mr. Chas. McRae delivered the Election supplies to Eckley precinct last Monday traversing the lonely trail on foot, midst a continuous down pour of rain. While going along the wildest portion of the trail he occasionally caught a glimpse of an animal ahead of him which he supposed was a deer. It kept ahead of him for a mile and a half, when it stopped and looked back and he discovered that it was an enormous Cougar. He had his 32 high power rifle with him, and firing at his eyes he literally tore off the top of its head. He says it gave an unearthly yell and tore the ground fearfully in its dying struggles. It was an old male eleven feet six inches from tip to tip—the largest one killed in this county in many years. He expects a tender bounty from the county and ten dollars from the state and a good price for its skin which he carefully preserved. The settlers say this Cougar has terrorized that section for many years by his slaughtering of domestic animals and by his thrashing out the dogs that tried to tree him.

Every precinct in Curry county voted "dry."

The Socialists polled a heavy vote in Coos county, carrying several precincts.

Taft's vote was the most stinging rebuke ever given the administration of an American President.

During the heaviest storm last week a steamer was heard blowing distress whistles off Port Orford.

Will and George Colebrook passed through town the first of the week on their way from Portland to Eureka creek.

The allied forces are about to take Constantinople, and the Turks have commenced the massacre of all Christians. Europe is about to become involved.

Wm. and John Gillings returned last night from fixing the telephone wire between Port Orford and Langlois, which they found broken in 35 or 40 places.

Mr. and Mrs. Catterlin of the Star Ranch on Flores Creek, in company with Addison Bennett and Mr. C. H. Marsh, made the TUBANE office a visit last Monday which we greatly enjoyed. They were delighted at the display of F. A. Stewart's cut and uncut agates.

Not for years has Nov. come in with such hard gales and steady rainfalls as has characterized the opening days of this month. Sunday was a passably fair day, but Monday the gales came up from the south again and the rains fell, and what is ahead of us the weather expert can only guess at, but can not foretell.

Election day was one of the stormiest days of the season. A heavy wind, accompanied by a driving rain came from the south during the day, yet despite this and the further fact that many of the voters had to travel 15 or 18 miles to get to a polling place, the number of votes cast in Curry county reached the high water mark. It speaks well for the public spirit of the citizens of the county.

The Bane sawmill on Sixes has been shut down for the past week or ten days owing to trouble over the wages of the men. Liens have been filed with the County Clerk on 15000 feet of clear cedar at the mill and also on a few thousand feet that is on the wharf awaiting shipment. Last week Atty. Topping and an agent for the Estabrook company at Bandon, came down and tried a case in Justice Wright's court involving an injunction against the lumber on the wharf, and the injunction was dismissed. In the meantime the lumber was delayed from shipment until liens could be filed against it in the County Court. Bills aggregating \$1800 or \$1800 have been filed for collection. It seems that the trouble has been caused by those who were to back Mr. Bane going back on their promises. The working men are all high in their praise of the manner in which Mr. Bane has acted and the way he has tried to protect them from loss. It is probable that the matter will be adjusted and the mill start up again in the near future.

Agate Carnival Cups Have Arrived.

Four cups for the 1913 Agate Carnival at Port Orford are now in the hands of the Secretary of the Commercial Club. Three of the cups were donated by Frank B. Tichenor, and the third by a Portland jeweler. The Grand Prize stands 15 inches high and is engraved with the following words: "Tichenor Trophy. Best Display Polished Agates, 1913. Port Orford's Third Annual Agate Carnival." The other cups are similarly engraved, except that one is for unpolished agates, one for Oregon Indian Curios, and the third, the "Staples Trophy" is for Sea Mosses. These latter cups are 12, 10 and 8 inches high respectively.

These cups will soon be on display for a short time at least, at Gillings' Hardware Store. They are works of art that are well worth the effort it will take to win them, and their donors are entitled to the gratitude of the people of this place. Increasing in size and momentum as it goes, the ball which has already been started rolling for Port Orford's 1913 Carnival promises to sweep everything before it and bring together the largest crowd ever seen in Curry county.

Obituary.

I. J. Johnson, an old soldier of the Civil War, died at his home on Sixes river last Saturday, and was buried Sunday at the Port Orford cemetery. He leaves an aged widow, three sons and two daughters to mourn his loss.

Isaac Jerome Johnson was born Jan. 1, 1831, at Marret, Ohio, and died Nov. 9, 1912, at Port Orford, Or. He enlisted during the Civil War in Co. D, 94th Ill. Volunteers; served three years and was mustered out at the close of war with honorable discharge. He united with the United Brethren church when a small boy and still retained his membership.

Mr. Johnson came to Curry county, with his family, a little more than a year ago and bought the Frank P. Cook place on Sixes, where he died.

Election Notes.

Latest returns give Taft 3 States, Roosevelt 6, and Wilson the rest—the greatest Democratic landslide in the history of the country. Oregon went Democratic for the first time, and California has gone Bull Moose by a very narrow margin.

Lane has defeated Selling for U. S. Senator by approximately 1500, with Bourne a bad third.

Hawley has been elected Congressman by a large majority, as was Ben Olcott for Secretary of State.

Woman Suffrage has carried in the state by 1000 or more.

The bill to abolish capital punishment was defeated by a two to one vote.

Single tax was defeated in Oregon, but carried in Coos county.

Balkan Complications.

London, Nov. 9.—Though the end of the Balkan war apparently is in sight, an even greater conflict threatened Europe today.

The powers forming the triple alliance (Germany, Austria-Hungary and Italy) and those composing the triple entente (France, Great Britain and Russia) are divided into two distinct camps as to the policy to be followed when peace between Turkey and the Balkan allies has been brought about.

Absolutely ignoring the threat of Austria-Hungary that she will not tolerate the Serbian occupation of Albania or of a port on the Adriatic Sea, King Peter's armies continue their advance through the country they were practically forbidden to enter.

Equal Suffrage Wins in Four out of Five States.

New York, Nov. 6.—Advocates of Woman Suffrage were delirious with joy today. Four out of five states carried yesterday for the amendments, striking the word "male" out of the state constitutions, was considered sufficient cause and it was stated that Saturday's night parade up fashionable Fifth avenue, to be participated in by thousands of men and women, representing every state in the union, would be a record breaker.

One state—Wisconsin—rejected suffrage yesterday. Four approved—Arizona, Oregon, Kansas and Michigan—bringing the total of states where women have all the rights of men up to 10. It was agreed by the leaders that the real reason for the defeat of the suffrage amendment in Wisconsin was the fight made against the Socialists, who made suffrage a preferred cause. In addition, it was opposed by the liquor interests.

Bandon is to have another weekly paper in the near future. It will be called the Western World.

No bodies have been recovered of those lost when the Osprey was wrecked, though it is claimed that a body with life preserver attached was seen floating Sunday evening in the surf on the north beach.

The Eugene Guard says that within a very few years Roseburg may boast a woman lawyer. Such represents the ambition of Miss Helen J. Hamilton, daughter of Judge J. W. Hamilton, of Roseburg, one of the university's most attractive co-eds in the sophomore class.

Capt. Peter Olson, of the gas schooner Rustler, arrived last week from the Suislaw. He informed us that the bar had much improved of late; that the channel runs straight to sea, and that he found 11 feet of water on the bar two hours before high tide. It is his intention to keep the Rustler in the Coos Bay-Suislaw trade so long as the freight offerings justify.

The steam schooner Washington, drawing a little over 16 feet of water crossed out Thursday, shortly after noon, on the first of the flood tide. The vessel struck three times while crossing, but it was thought she was not injured, and Capt. Lee continued on his course down the coast. After going a few miles it was ascertained that the vessel was leaking badly, and it was decided to return to port. She crossed in three or four hours later without experiencing any trouble, and docked at North Bend to await instructions from the owners. The Washington, while ashore at the mouth of the Columbia river last year, was badly strained and is generally regarded by seamen as being pretty tender.

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
