A chief drawback to overpowering party majorities was illustrated in the case of the candidacy of one C. M. Hurlburt nominated by the Republicans for Joint Representative for Multnomah and Clatsop counties.

Upon exposure of his unfitness, and after he had been brought by the central committee of each county to get off the ticket Hurlburt left the state prior Nov. 3, but his name being on the ballot, he was elected, thanks to Multnomah's invincible Republican majority.

Roscoe P. Hurst, Democrat, was the opposing candidate, who intended to claim the seat in default of Hurlburt's presence in the State, but had penny like, the latter, returns, and defies all comers, and says he will be on deck all right at the proper time.
