So far they have operated only in the prairie country and have not annoyed those flocks ranging in brush land. Wool prices are high at present and there is big profit in the business. For this reason the sheepmen are hanging on as long as they can.—Western World.

Be It Remembered: That at a special term of the County Court of Curry County, Oregon, begun and held at the Court House, in Gold Beach, Oregon, on Friday the 5th day of November, 1915, that being the time and place set for the convening of said court by virtue of an order made by the Hon. W. A. Wood, County Judge, filed and entered in said Court on the 28th day of October, 1915, ordering that a special term of said County Court be held for the purpose of preparing the annual budget for 1916 and for such other business as might legally come before said Court; at which were present Hon. W. A. Wood, County Judge presiding, Delmer Colegrove and E. B. Sypher, Commissioners, C. E. Bailey, Sheriff, and J. R. Stannard, Clerk, when the following in the matter of the County Budget for the year 1916:

Table listing County Budget for 1916 items: Assessor's Office, Sheriff's Office, Treasurer's Office, School Superintendent, Surveyor, Coroner's Office, County Court, Circuit Court, Justice Court, Current Expenses, Court House Expenses, County Jail, District Attorney, Indigent Board, Insane, Examination of Books, Seal Bond, Widow's Pension, Bridges, Roads and Highways, County Schools, General School Library, Advertising & Printing, etc.

Statement of probable receipts for the year 1916 other than direct taxation upon real and personal property: Fees from County Clerk's Office, \$1250.00; Forest Department, \$200.00; Interest on Deposits, County Funds, \$300.00; Balance on hand in the several funds of Curry County, Nov. 1, 1915: General Fund, \$883.25; General Road Fund, \$877.93; Cannon School Fund, \$498.74.

In the matter of the construction of the Eggell Ferry Road on the South Side of Rogue River: D. M. Moore having completed his contract for the construction of the Road from Gold Beach to Bagnell's Ferry on the south side of Rogue River and the Court having inspected the said Road in a body and being satisfied that he has completed said work in accordance with the terms of his contract, it is hereby ordered that the Clerk draw a warrant in favor of said D. M. Moore for the sum of \$2950.30 the balance due him on his contract, upon said Moore presenting satisfactory evidence that all bills for labor, material, sub-contractors, etc. have been paid in full.

In the matter of the Cheyco Bridge: Whereas it appears to be the action of the court that the bridge across the Cheyco River for the construction of which a contract has heretofore been let to the Bandon Construction Company has now been fully completed according to the terms and specifications of the said contract, and whereas the said Bandon has been inspected and accepted by the court, and whereas the said Bandon has transferred to E. G. Perran all its right and interest in and to the half-undivided said contract for the construction of the said bridge, and whereas the said E. G. Perran is now the legal owner of said claim and is entitled to the payment thereof, it is hereby ordered that the County Clerk shall forthwith draw a warrant upon the Treasurer of Curry County for the sum of SIX THOUSAND TWO HUNDRED FORTY-FIVE AND 47/100 Dollars, the balance due upon the said contract, less three hundred dollars withheld on account of painting, and shall deliver the said warrant to the said E. G. Perran.
