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ADVERTISING RATES REASONABLE.

The most titanic struggle in the world's history continues to rage at Verdun, with the tide of victory sweeping first one way and then the other. In the meantime the Germans are massing equipment and troops for the supreme effort.

Next week June 12th to 17th, is letter writing week, when everyone is expected to write to their acquaintances and tell them of the good things to be found in the community in which the writer lives. Glad, then the hearts of your friends by letting them hear from you, and you will be amply repaid even if your boasting does not bring results.

The yellow pup that got into court because he became a part of the Tribune force through a subscription swap, came home a few days ago badly scolded. He had evidently gotten in some back yard where he did not belong, but if the wielder of the hot water gets a touch of fire and brimstone in the next world it will not cause us any undue loss of sleep.

The marriage of Sheriff Bailey to Miss Kate Lehnher last week has caused considerable discussion over the technical point as to what name will appear on the ballot this fall for the Democratic nomination as Treasurer, which was won by Miss Lehnher, now Mrs. Bailey, at the late primaries. It is not known here whether she will continue in the race or not, but if she does the situation is an unusual one.

Where a newspaper is published in the district it is now the duty of school boards to publish an estimate of the expenditures for the coming year, and in cases where a paper is not published within the district such estimates are required to be conspicuously posted ten days prior to the annual school meeting. In compliance with the above the budget of the Port Orford school district for the ensuing year appears in this issue. This is a good law, and will probably cause people to take more interest in school meetings. The annual meeting is a week from Monday, June 19th—attend it.

Politician Takes Queer Position.

The band boys have been sending out tickets for the Concert Saturday night to prominent men throughout this section of the state, whom it was believed might have a friendly feeling towards Port Orford and would be willing to help the boys in getting their uniforms by buying one or more of these tickets. Among those at Marshfield who were remembered in this way were Judge John S. Coke, Attorney John C. Kendall and Arthur K. Peck. Mr. Coke responded with a generous check for \$5, while Mr. Kendall bought the two tickets sent him and wrote a very encouraging letter to the boys. Mr. Peck, who defeated Mr. Kendall at the late primaries for the nomination as Representative from Coos county, declined to contribute a cent upon the grounds that the Port Orford Tribune had supported Kendall. The Tribune editor is not even a member of the band, and just why Mr. Peck should hold that organization responsible for an article that appears in these columns is beyond comprehension, and does not speak very highly for the liberality of that gentleman. Mr. Peck expresses the hopes that upon acquaintance the Tribune will form a better opinion of him, but, while we have always heard him highly spoken of in the past and have never said anything derogatory about him in print, yet, at the present time, we must admit that our faith in the broadmindedness of that gentleman has been sadly shaken by the spirit shown in his letter, referred to above.

CURRENT TOPICS.

EDITOR TRIBUNE:

At last Congress has been impelled by pressure from more directions than Big Business apologists in that body cared to antagonize, to order printed the Report of the Walsh Commission on "Industrial Unrest."

All of a sudden when Congress man Lewis of Maryland, a union card man, offered a Joint Resolution providing for the printing of the Report, objection was raised that the cost would be too much. However, all of these objections are on record in support of all the "pork" bills which annually disgrace our American Congress.

One hundred thousand copies of this most important investigation will be printed for free distribution, and this number will not be sufficient to supply all our people who ought to possess and diligently study the conditions they disclose.

President Wilson has ordered 116 men belonging to the Texas organized militia court martialled under the Dick law for refusing to take the additional oath making them Federal recruits.

The jingo press is making much of the alleged 150,000 preparedness parades in New York as proving the popularity of the preparedness hysteria. But nothing is proved by that parade worked up and paid for by Big Business. How many of that 150,000 has since enlisted? will furnish a correct test, as there has been an insistent call for enlistments for months past. Boston and also Chicago now propose to capitalize parades.

In this connection it may be profitable to note the fact that, notwithstanding the backwardness of enlistments under the late call for men, nearly six thousand of those who did offer themselves were, upon the regulation examination, rejected for physical unfitness, an echo of a past of underfed and poorly housed existence inseparable from the curse of low wages and unemployment. Big Business rich and respectables should hang their heads in shame in contemplation of such an exhibit.

Besides the Portland Oregonian, Telegram, forty three inland Republican papers, organized by the Withycombe-Big Business contingent at Salem and Portland, made vigorous war on poor Oloott, yet it seems as if the victim of this formidable conspiracy has carried every county in Oregon. He carried Multnomah, the home county of his opponent, victim of Withycombe-Oregonian intrigue; by a majority approaching ten thousand votes.

The "kept" papers are making a great noise over the result of a referendum vote by the U. S. Chamber of Commerce, Big Business organization, on "preparedness" carrying the proposition by 121 to 1, or 970 votes in favor to 8 votes against. But what does this result argue, and who had any doubt as to the way that conglomeration of graft and special privilege would vote on a proposition that promises great profits for a few at the expense of the rest of us?

And to illustrate what the U. S. Chamber of Commerce thinks of the said "rest of us," I submit the following late telegram printed in the Portland Journal of May 30:

New York, May 27.—"Anyone can live in perfect health on \$5 a week," declared A. B. Farquhar, vice president of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States. "The minimum wage is an economic absurdity," he said. "We should spend more time teaching thrift and industry to workers and less time giving them minimum wages and such things. We are the most wasteful people on earth."

"I wanted to see whether one could live on \$5 a week, so I tried it. I could have kept it up forever. I found I needed \$3 a week for food and \$2 a week for everything else."

A. B. Farquhar is a millionaire banker and stock jobber, as well as Vice President of the aforesaid United States Chamber of Commerce. He is in receipt also of dividends from commercial and manufacturing ventures in which he holds shares based 50 per cent on "water" that is, over capitalization.

Recent investigations of wages and cost of living make him tired.

And Mr. Farquhar's claim that \$5 a week is ample for all purposes of health, security and comfort, will not bear analysis or close scrutiny.

Five dollars a week amounts to \$260 for the 52 weeks composing the year, supposing there to occur no lay offs on account of sickness, accidents or account of "dull trade." The late O'Hara Commission, in Chicago deduced from the evidence in the case that operatives in factories are laid off on an average one-fourth of the year. This, then will reduce the average income of the worker to \$187 per year, not as much by half as Mr. Farquhar's wife pays for her dinner gown. Yet, if workmen and workingwomen must persist in carrying torches in the Old Party processions, there will always be Farquhars to belittle them.

Mr. Farquhar may or may not be one of the thousands liable to income tax payments who are charged with evasions and perjury in their returns, yet one is inclined to include him in the bunch because of his niggardly stand against the toilers. Be that as it may, Big Business has been discovered cheating the Government out of millions, through methods of concealments and evasion; and these people clamor in chorus for preparedness and compulsory army service.

And are there those who wonder if these hysterical clamors for compulsory military service and sacrifice are not fearful that they themselves may be caught in the net of their own weaving? Not a bit of it, since they themselves make the law, directly and by indirection. It was their kind that made our draft law in 1863 which precipitated the most violent and destructive riots the world had, up to that time; witnessed this because of the provision which exempted any one and every one who could raise \$300 in greenbacks from shouldering the knapsack. Precious few wage earners thus discriminated against could command \$300 ready money, wherefore it happened that such and all friends of fair play and justice made common cause, irrespective of politics or religion, though the false claim was later set up that only "copperheads" participated in the riots.

The Dick militia law was slyly engineered through Congress about 15 years since with a view to a possible general draft in the not distant future. This law subjects every member of the National Guard to the call of the President, no matter what the condition of his business or his family, and to the pains and penalties of court martial for treason against all who might refuse to respond. It was later denied that the Dick law contained this feature, to mislead men who objected to being enrolled with the militia because of that law. But now comes President Wilson and orders Gen. Funston to assemble a court martial under the said same law to try and convict and punish 116 militiamen down in Texas who had, for one and another reason, refused to come out under his call.

In order to dupe the greatest possible number into the organized militia Congress enacted a bribe of eight million dollars a year in its support, with rifles and blue uniforms, a trick which shows that the enemies of liberty never sleep.

Dick was a Senator from Ohio when his militia bill conspiracy was conceived, though let it be said to their credit, his people dispensed with his services on the very first opportunity.

Mr. Roosevelt made a speech in Kansas the other day, and was, of course, strong for preparedness, and deplored the fact that the American navy compares to about no navy at all. Well, he ought not to be allowed to forget in his bursts of denunciation of President Wilson that he himself had been for eight years not so long since, at the Presidential wheel, and had bequeathed the "no navy at all" which now gives so much pain, to Taft, his successor, and he to Wilson, the same old "no navy at all" yet he and Roosevelt had, during each year of their terms, spent larger appropriations intended for the navy than had Germany during the same years, yet it is the German navy that Mr. Roosevelt and co-jingoes are in such holy dread of.

Gov. Withycombe promises loyal support to Oloott from now on to November. What the devil can Oloott want of the Governor's help, now that he will have no opposition in November?
