for Harbor Aid.**

F. B. Tichenor left Marshfield the
latter part of last week for Wash-
ington, D. C., where he will take up
with the War Department the mat-
ter of improving Port Orford Har-
bor as a port of refuge and a naval
supply base, by the building of a
breakwater which will shelter the
harbor from the winter storms that
come from the south.

When Mr. Tichenor left Port Or-
ford some ten days ago he said
nothing to his friends about making
the Washington trip, and it is prob-
ably something that developed since
he reached Coos bay that decided
him to do so. However, for some
time he has been working with the
Oregon delegation at Washington
for recognition of Port Orford har-
bor, and has been keeping close
watch of the development of Pacific
coast harbors, and now that the
government has decided to estab-
lish a naval base somewhere along
the coast, he has no doubt, decided
to strike while the iron is hot.

Mr. Tichenor is armed with the
government reports on the harbor,
and has all the available data nec-
essary to put up a strong plea to the
department showing why the pro-
posed improvements should be made
at Port Orford. He has always op-
posed the building of any small
breakwaters in the bay, on the
grounds that some day the building
of the big jetty would be inevitable
and that any inside improvements
would only be wasted and delay the
larger improvement.

Mr. Tichenor will return from
Washington in time to attend the
Oregon Legislature, of which he was
elected a member at the late elec-
tion.

The dance in the Spurgeon hall
was attended by a number of the
young folks from Langlois and Port

M. L. Spurgeon & sons are finishing
up a fair sized building, with the
dance hall on the second floor and
a store room underneath. They
have a small stock of goods at the
present time, but intend to increase
its size now that their new building
is about completed.

Have Cleared Much Land.

When paying his respects to the
Tribune in a substantial manner a
few days ago, Henry Adolphsen an-
nounced that he and Robt. McKen-
zie Jr. had just completed clearing
a 12 acre field for the plow on the
big McKenzie dairy farm at the
mouth of Elk river. In conversa-
tion with Mr. Adolphsen we learned
that this makes 90 acres of rich bot-
tom land that has been put under
cultivation on this ranch within the
past three years. The land had
at one time been covered with large
spruce trees, and was cleared with
the aid of a donkey engine.

Just across the river from the Mc-
Kenzie farm is the dairy ranch of
L. Knapp, and in the past 3 years
many changes have been made here.
Considerable new land has been
broken to the plow and long ditch-
es have been run to drain low lands.
Mr. Knapp has spent several thou-
sand dollars improving the place,
and is going to continue the work.
At the present time he is building a
barn to take the place of the one
lately burned down.

Adjoining these two farms further
up the river is the old Joe Nay
place, now owned by Mr. Sweet
late postmaster of Bandon. Some
land has been cleared recently, and
it is understood that extensive im-
provements are planned for the fu-
ture.

These three adjoining places con-
tain approximately 1000 acres each
and are among Curry county's very
best farms.

Forest Notes.

During the forest fire season, For-
est Service lookout men stationed on
high peaks, look over practically all
the National Forest land in the
State of Oregon.

Special use permits for 75 sum-
mer homesites on the National For-
ests of Oregon, Washington, and
Alaska have been issued since Jan-
uary 1, 1916.

The timber and grazing resources
in the National Forests of Oregon,
Washington, and Alaska have an
estimated value of \$233,000,000.

The National Forests contain the
most extensive public playgrounds
in the world, and are open to the
people.

Lightning caused 274 percent of
the 1081 forest fires suppressed by
the Forest Service in Oregon, Wash-
ington, and Alaska during the season
of 1916.
