Senator McNary a Progressive.

SALEM, Or., June 1.—Expressing the hope "that all concerned will support Senator McNary in his efforts for the state and the Republican party," Governor Withycombe Tuesday night made formal announcement of his appointment of former Justice Charles L. McNary of Salem as United States senator to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Senator Harry Lane.

Senator McNary is chairman of the Republican state central committee and was formerly a member of the state supreme court by appointment by Governor West. He is preparing to leave for Washington at once and said Tuesday night that he will actively support the president in carrying out his war program.

"I am not a standpatter, I am a progressive," said Senator McNary. "Neither am I a hidebound partisan. I shall support President Wilson in all of his progressive legislation. I shall stand squarely behind him in all matters relating to our war with Germany. I believe in the Oregon

system of government and shall advocate national prohibition and national woman suffrage. I don't intend to pull back in the harness, but will push ahead to help attain those things which the people of Oregon and the people of the nation want."

CURRENT TOPICS.

Under the heading—"The Sunny Side of the Draft"—the S. F. Bulletin says:

"Conscription has certain advantages which it may be just as well to acknowledge, now that the issue is settled. To begin with, it prevents the absurdities of a campaign for what is called voluntary enlistment. No mass meetings, no street orators, no young ladies with white feathers to pin in reluctant lapels, and no fervent appeals from those who are too old to go to those who are just old enough will mark the formation of the new armies. The fact that a man of military age is at large and has a registration card in his pocket will silence the cheap cry of slacker. The responsibility for what each man is doing or not doing will rest upon the government, and though it may be unfortunate that this is so, nevertheless it is patent to every one. Service in the conscript army is by invitation. If a man isn't invited to go to the war it is not his fault. If each candidate of military age has surrendered—as he has—the liberty of personal choice, so far as choice is affected by law, he has gained independence of other sorts of pressure.

Of course it will be said that men over thirty-one or boys under twenty-one may volunteer, and they may, and many of them will, but the fact remains that they are not the material of which the administration wishes to make its army. In itself this comes nearer justice than did the recruiting system in the Civil war, which took boys who were hardly more than children and men with wives and children dependent on them for support.

To concede these advantages in a conscription system does not mean a change of heart on the general question of the right or expediency of forced military service. We would have rejoiced if the same results could have been obtained by voluntary registration. The old time recruiting methods have rightly been discarded, but the selective system and the voluntary principle might have been combined in such a way as to give the good results of both. After the war there will be leisure to attempt this combination to meet whatever military needs then exist."

One unfortunate phase of the whole draft embroglio has been that so many persons have yielded to the necessity with apologies, when in fact the logic of now volunteering ought to and will, finally, vindicate itself upon principle.

Old Blanco Mine Is Soon to be Revived

A new mining enterprise was launched here during the past week by New York interests, represented by L. B. Newby. The latter, in company with John Hays, Jr., of Philadelphia, arrived the latter part of last week and immediately closed a deal whereby they take charge of the Blanco mine, also known as the Madden property.

The Blanco mine is located on the east of the county road near the Coos Curry line, and has been operated by old established methods of placer mining for a number of years at various times in the past.

According to Mr. Newby a concentration plant will be installed capable of handling 500 tons of dirt a day and this may be increased later. Mr. Hays is to have charge and the latter states that eight or ten men will be employed soon in getting the camp started.

Mr. Newby is said to be an experienced mining man who formerly operated in Mexico and Colorado. He left again Monday and expects to return the first of July—Western World.

See For Divorce.

Ella Margaret McLain, of North Bend has filed suit in circuit court for a divorce from Wm. McLain a logger at Alegany, in which she makes sensational charges.

She says they were married in Rainier, Oregon, Nov. 21, 1912, and have two children. In 1914, at Gresham she says he became intoxicated and insulted her in the presence of a crowd at a dance.

Later she says while she was teaching her baby to say "mama" he became enraged, spanked the baby until he was black and blue and threatened to kill the family she alleges. She says she got down on her knees and appealed to be spared.

Later when he went to their old home in Curry county, where she was employed as cook at the Anton Canonica home and she alleges he abused her there.

Still again she charges that while at Roseburg he took some articles not belonging to him and fled to Washington to escape prosecution. That he has consorted with other women is also charged.

She wants \$25 per month alimony for herself and \$30 per month to support the two children—Coos Bay Times.
