Fred Bauer, of Gold Beach, has thrown the first political bomb of the campaign in Curry, as will be seen by his announcement in this issue. As a special agent appointed by Governor Withycombe Mr. Bauer has shown that he would enforce the prohibition law, and if elected Sheriff he would doubtless make an efficient and capable officer.

POLITICAL TALK

The political situation is coming to a head slowly in Curry county. Candidates seem to be holding back to see what the "other fellow" is going to do. And while the Tarpuws has confidence that the voters will use good judgment in selecting the best men for the various offices, yet a few of these selections are of so much importance to the general welfare of the county that we cannot refrain from commenting upon them.

First of all in importance comes the office of County Judge, as among other issues, the good roads question is going to be a momentous one for our section within the next few years. Undoubtedly Judge Wood has this subject so well in hand that it would be a serious loss to the county to see him go out of office at this particular time.

To get the best results a Judge must have capable and intelligent Commissioners working with him. As explained in one of our former issues, Port Orford has a man eminently fitted for this position in the person of A. J. Marsh. Not only does Mr. Marsh's work in behalf of good roads and his rare qualifications for the place, entitle him to the office, but there's other important reasons why the incoming Commissioner should reside in this neighborhood. Under the present system the Judge and Commissioners each has supervision of the roads in his particular district. Just now there is developing around Port Orford by far the greatest traffic that will go over the roads in any portion of the county. N. H. Latham is putting a truck to haul logs from Six; besides an increased business for their large tin and pole industry the Pyle-Walker company is building a mill north of Sixes the output from which will be hauled here for shipment; contracts have been let for cutting out of Middle Elm that as soon as the road there is completed will be hauled to Port Orford and much lumber and other material will probably come from this same section. This immense traffic that the roads of this neighborhood are going to be called upon to bear, is reason why the Commissioner from northern Curry should be a thoroughly competent road man and it is further reason why he should reside in this locality where the heaviest demand upon our thoroughfares will come under his constant and personal supervision. A. J. Marsh is the right man in the right place.

Other features of the political situation, as well as the fishing industry on Rogue river, will be discussed by the Tarpuws as the campaign develops.

A recent issue of the Oregon Yearly publishes the official statement of the county Librarian, in which it is stated that Curry county is indebted with subscriptions of nearly 17 per cent of her quota.

In commenting upon this fact County Attorney Bullington, of Gold Beach, makes the following statement: "This failure to give us proper credit seems to be due to the fact that all the subscriptions from Rogue river north were turned in through the Bandon banks and found their way into the One county column on the final accounting, and that all the subscriptions in the Brookings and Harbor neighborhoods were turned into the Brookings bank and were sent by them to the corresponding bank in San Francisco and apparently credited to San Francisco."

Another Librarian's report is to be published March 1st, and Mr. Bullington very opportunely calls attention to the fact that steps should be taken to see that Curry gets full credit for her subscriptions. Each neighborhood should take the matter up with those in charge of the campaign in their locality. It is not right that Curry should over-subscribe her quota and then get credit for raising only 17 per cent of it!
