Monday, with Prof. P. H. Robinson

overlaid in the daily paper

A sudden storm Saturday night

and Sunday morning broke away

Monday into a beautiful fall day.

Tillamook Club tomorrow evening,

which all members are urgently re-

quested to attend.

Duck shooting has been good on

Garrison Lake the past week, some

of the hunters bringing home as

high as 18 and 20 at a time.

J. U. Campbell advertised his candi-

didity in both the Tausung and Re-

porter and received one vote in Cur-

ry county for Supreme Judge. His

election would have come high at

that rate.

Mrs. P. J. Lindberg, who has been

staying at the John Langlois house

in Bandon taking medical treatment

for the past several weeks, continues

in poor health and friends fear she

is not going to be able to return

to her home in Port Orford.

The steamer Bandon was com-

pelled to pull out of her port last

Saturday morning on account of a

south storm coming up. The two

days previous to her departure she

had been loading from 7 o'clock in

the morning until midnight, and

had her cargo nearly completed

when she was forced to leave.

The local draft board at Gold

Beach sent the questionnaires out

last week to all the registrants in

the county between the ages of 18

and 45. The government will no

doubt get some valuable informa-

tion from these to file as statistics,

even though the closing of the war

has done away with their military

value.

County Attorney Collier H. Buff-

ington, of Gold Beach, passed

through town the latter part of last

week enroute to Portland. The mill

in which Mr. Buffington is interest-

ed in at Bechre creek has met with

delay in getting a contract signed

with the government for outfitting

airplane material and he decided to

go out and see Col. Diagne about it.

N. H. Larson, the local egg-mill

man made a short business trip to

Cocoa Bay last week. Mr. Larson's

contract with the government for

sawing airplane material runs for

over a year yet, but he does not

know what effect the closing of the

war will have upon the work. An

inspector will be down from the bay

this week to examine two carloads

of the material he now has ready for

shipment.

Monday, R. G. McKenna and Hen-

ry Adolphsen, who are fishing at

the mouth of Elk river caught 124

salmon. Their high catch for the

season was made last week when

they took 150 salmon one day. They

take the fish to Bandon each day

by auto, and while they have been

handicapped by unusually low wa-

ter in the river, yet they have av-

eraged 40 or 50 salmon a day since

the season opened.

of Mr. and Mrs. N. C. Divisibles,

writes to the TRIBUNE as follows:

"We are all out here at Hillsboro,

a nice town of about 3500, and I am

writing you to have the address of

our paper changed from Port Orford

to here. We are about 20 miles from

Portland on the electric car line, and

fine. Haven't had much rain yet,

but think it's a little colder out here

than down there. We have a nice

place. Papa just bought a big bun-

gale in town, so I think we are here

to stay. Hope to see the Tausung

out here soon."
