The flu has been lifted in Bandon last Thursday. The disease has not at any time been bad in that town, and it is believed the few cases still there can be guarded so it will not break out again.

Monday night was the coldest of the season in Port Orford, the water pipes about town being frozen up the first time. The nearby mountains are covered with snow, and until this is gone it is not likely that the weather will moderate very much.

Mrs. Linnie Lockwood, of Denmark, has been in Marshfield the past two weeks where she went to be at the bedside of her daughter, Mrs. Lux, who died with influenza, and while the father also died, yet Mrs. Lockwood nursed the baby of her daughter through an attack of the disease that made an orphan of it.

**Curry Getting Good Mail Service.**

Curry county residents are getting the best winter mail service they have ever had. In fact northern Curry is getting her mail several hours earlier than during the summer. This is due to a change in the train schedule between Portland and Coos Bay. The same mail that left Bandon for Port Orford during the summer months in the afternoon now leaves there in the morning and arrives here about 2:30 instead of 5:30 P. M.

Coos county is complaining very much about the new schedule and is trying to get it changed or get increased train service, but Curry is quite satisfied as it is bringing her winter mail through quicker than it was ever brought through before.

## Examination For Postmaster at Wedderburn.

The new officers will take charge of the county's affairs at Gold Beach this week. Two of the old officers, Judge Wood and Sheriff Tolman, were reelected and will continue to serve, while Myrtle Cooley as Clerk, and Oleta Walker as Treasurer, will be the first two members of the fair sex that have ever held down an official position at the county seat. Curry has had a woman for Superintendent of Schools, but never more than that until this year. Both Miss Cooley and Mrs. Walker are well qualified to discharge the duties of the offices they are in, and will make good without a doubt. The clerk's office has been quite a lounging place in the past, and while the cuspidor and smoky atmosphere will no doubt disappear yet we rather opine that the number of chairs will have to be increased.

## Husband Also Fin Victim.

Mathias Lux, the death of whose wife we chronicled last week, died in Marshfield with influenza a few days after the passing of Mrs. Lux, and was buried at the Bandon cemetery.

The deceased was 24 years of age, and came to Bandon from Nebraska in 1912. He was married in that town to Miss Bessie Jensen, and the young couple moved to the Jensen ranch at Denmark, going from there to Marshfield where Mr. Lux was employed in the Chandler hotel until a few months ago when he went to work in the ship yards.

The deceased was a steady, industrious young man who was very highly spoken of by his acquaintances, and the death of himself and young wife so close together, leaving a 5-months-old baby, is one of the saddest tragedies this dreaded disease has exacted in Coos county.

Mr. Lux is survived by two sisters and five brothers.

## Finds Cache of Flour.

Hon. J. D. Loucks accidentally discovered last Sunday that he was far better supplied with flour than he had any idea.

Near his residence Mr. Loucks has a small buggy shed, or barn, with a loft overhead. He was not using the building, and had not been in the loft during the more than a year that he has owned the property until Sunday when the cold weather caused him to investigate, for his goat, a little boy that had been lying in a corner for two or three years. His surprise can be imagined when he uncovered five sacks of flour. Being the same brand and two of the sacks having been wet on one end, was proof that it was part of the flour that was stolen when the Della went on the beach about two weeks ago.

Mr. Loucks lives in less than 200 yards of where the Della grounded, and so this unused loft was a convenient place for the flour thief to make a cache until the danger from a search warrant had blown over, and but for the merest chance it would have proven a good hiding place. As fourteen sacks were stolen, nine are still missing.

## Child Drowns When Auto Leaps Into River.

Mrs. R. G. McKenzie, who had been visiting a few weeks with her aunt, Miss Anna Sorenson at Winlock, Wash., while recuperating from an operation for appendicitis, returned to her home in Port Orford last evening.

Mr. and Mrs. Henry Axtell and two little daughters, Anita and Dorothy riding in a six cylinder Studebaker automobile, plunged into the icy waters of the Coquille river at Bullards ferry at about 5 o'clock Sunday evening. The accident caused the death of one of the children, Anita, who was six years old, the rest of the family being rescued by Ferryman Wilson assisted by several others.

Mr. Axtell was driving from Camp Day, the mining camp owned by Dr. David T. Day at Whiskey Run of which Mr. Axtell is Supt., to Bandon. When driving onto the ferry at the north side of the river and while pressing his foot down on one of the levers, the heel of his shoe came in contact with the foot throttle. The car suddenly sprang forth and before it could be halted had dashed across the ferry, snapped the chain guard in two, and plunged into the river. The water was about 24 feet deep and the car quickly settled down and completely disappeared.

After several moments Mrs. Axtell, clutching the four-year-old child whom she had been holding on her lap, came to the surface. Their clothing kept them afloat while the swift outgoing tide carried them down the stream until Mr. Wilson in a power boat came to the rescue. In the meantime Mr. Axtell came to the surface. He swam enough to keep afloat until the rescue boat reached him. The current was so swift that it would probably have been impossible for any of them to have reached shore without assistance.

There was a top on the car and the four occupants were in one seat which made it difficult for them to get out while under the water. The six-year old child who lost her life, apparently clutched the steering wheel and hung on. Her little hands were still stuck fast when the car was raised and her body was removed. Eye witnesses say that when the smaller girl came to the surface with her mother, she struck out to swim and was paddling bravely when rescued although the mother had not let go of her.

Captain Robert Johnson and members of the Coast Guard crew went to the scene as soon as word reached here. They made the trip in the power boat. The crew, assisted by men from Bullards and Prosper, succeeded in raising the submerged car after attempts by crew of the Steamer May and others who had previously worked more than an hour in attempting to bring the machine to the surface.

The body of the child was brought to Bandon and private burial was held Tuesday.

Mr. Axtell states that the automobile with which the accident happened was somewhat defective in the foot levers. It had been driven to Bandon from Washington D. C. and had not since been overhauled.
