A price of \$16 per cord is being offered for cedar matchwood at Bandon.

Jesse Sutton went to Myrtle Point last week with "Bill" Miller's sheep drive.

Hon. S. P. Peirce and wife were visitors in town Sunday from their Sixes home.

J. F. Hopkins, of the Arizona Inn, was in town Saturday night and attended the dance.

Ray McNair, of the McNair Hardware company at Bandon, was a Port Orford visitor Sunday.

Spring plowing and early seeding is the result among the farmers of the long spell of good weather.

A fund has lately been raised in the Euchre creek neighborhood for the repair of the hall at that place.

E. J. Baker continues to enjoy much better health than he did before his recent trip east for treatment by a specialist.

Mrs. Wm. McPhillamey is recovering nicely from her recent operation at Bandon and will soon be able to return home.

Mr. Neff, who is on the Wm. Sweet place on Elk river, is improving this fine ranch by building a lot of new fence.

Delmar Wright drove the Port Orford-Bandon auto stage for a few days last week while Earl Allred was taking a vacation.

As will be noticed elsewhere in this issue, the stockmen of northern Curry are going to hold a big meeting in Langlois on Feb. 25th.

Gene White and Earl Allred spent two or three days at the E. J. Baker home last week. Mr. White was cruising a timber claim in that vicinity.

R. I. Helm, who for a number of years has been Forest Ranger at Agness, has resigned his position and has been succeeded by J. F. Campbell of Grants Pass.

Clare Dement, of Myrtle Point passed up the coast last week with 40 or 50 head of beef cattle which he and Wm. Miller, of Eugene, had bought in the Rogue river country.

Carl Miller and George and Kyle Lewis, of Gold Beach, went up the coast last week with the hog drive. The work was too slow for horses and so the young men were taking it on foot.

Geo. W. Curry was in town Saturday from his Elk river home. In speaking of the market road that is being surveyed through his place, he says that its building will more than double the income he can make from his ranch.

The dance in Port Orford last Saturday night was largely attended and was a very enjoyable occasion. Whether the recent haul by the officials had anything to do with the sobriety of the occasion is not known, but the absence of intoxicants was conspicuous.

Steve Spoel and Nat Perkins came to town from their home near Corbin for the dance Saturday evening. They thought they housed their auto some two months ago for the winter, but the recent spell of good weather has dried the roads so they found no trouble at all running to town.

A number of our townsmen were comparing Wednesday of last week with Wednesday sixteen years ago. On the 11th of February, 1904, the steamer Fulton broke from her moorings in the harbor and was washed upon the beach. One of the crew was killed in attempting to reach shore. The wind that day was blowing a gale accompanied by a down pour of rain. Last Wednesday was an ideal day—clear, warm and no wind. The Fulton was later floated.

D. Quellen returned Saturday from spending a week visiting at the E. J. Baker home near Corbin. While there Mr. Quellen said he helped butcher three hogs, that fat tened in the oak woods, from which 170 pound of lard was rendered. At the prevailing price of 40 cents per pound, this lard is worth \$68—more than the entire hogs would have brought a few years ago. Mrs. Quellen, who is visiting at the Baker home will not return to town until the last of the week.

Port of Port Orford bonds sold at 2 1/2 per cent premium, while on a \$250,000 issue the Port of Coos Bay is offered \$6,000 below par.

J. B. Curl went to Langlois, Monday, where he bought a soda fountain from C. N. Smith, which he will install in his local confectionery store.

N. L. Manley sold his ranch two miles east of Langlois a few days ago and yesterday passed down the coast in his Ford enroute to San Francisco where he will make his future home.

Mrs. John D. Loucks returned Monday from Coquille where she went last week to attend a Sunday school convention as a delegate from the local Sunday school. Mrs. Loucks reported an enjoyable time and a good convention.

N. H. Larson has been taking an enforced rest during the past week as the result of being struck on the back between his shoulders by a large splinter from one of the saws in his mill. He has, however, about recovered from the sore spot.

Sheriff Tolman has requested the TRIBUNE to state that owing to the tax receipt books being returned to the publishing house, in Portland for alteration, his office will be delayed in sending out tax statements but will mail them as early in March as possible.

John Hurst returned to Port Orford last week after having spent the past two or three years in the logging camps of Coos county. He says that notwithstanding the high wages being paid nearly all the camps are short handed, and after visiting a while with relatives here he will return to Coos.

The payroll of the condensery at Bandon amounted to \$22,965.57 for the month of December, which is considered the poorest dairy month in the year. Of this amount, over \$18,000 went to the farmers and the rest to the employees of the plant. Due to the slump in foreign exchange, however, the condensery has cut the price paid for milk from \$4 to \$3.75 per 100 pounds.

Capt. Alex Scott, who in company with Chauncey Woodruff, recently placed a line aboard the Chanslor wreck has announced he will defend his claim for salvage in court, if need be. Messrs. Pillsbury & Curtis, of San Francisco, who bought the wreck, hold that it is not subject to salvage, and unless a compromise is effected, the matter will be settled in the courts.

Wm. E. Covey, for several years a resident of this city and engaged in the longhoring business, will go into partnership with W. Stitts and lease the Johnson place of 220 acres on Floras creek, three miles east of Langlois. Mr. Stitts owns a home-stead adjoining the place and the two men will operate the two places jointly. Mr. Covey expects to go down there in about two weeks and get ready for spring work.—Coos Bay Harbor.

The first political gun of the campaign in Curry county is fired by J. F. Hopkins of the Arizona Inn, whose announcement for the Republican nomination as Joint Representative appears in this issue of the TRIBUNE. For the past several years Mr. Hopkins has conducted the Arizona Inn, where he has become acquainted with many of the people of Coos and Curry counties. He comes from an old family of Revolutionary fame, and has two sons who served in the late war with Germany. He says he has no political axe to grind, and should he be elected, would not be controlled by anyone.

Sold New Truck.

S. G. Whitehead today sold a 3 1/2 ton White Truck to Allen Boice of Langlois. The truck will be delivered April first, and will be used on the milk route for the condensery. Last week Mr. Whitehead sold a new Oakland six to David Lee of Spruce Valley.—Western World.

Notice to Northern Curry Stockmen.

A meeting will be held at Langlois, Saturday, February 28th, for the purpose of discussing and giving the farmers and stockmen a chance to join the Curry County Stockmen's Association recently organized at Gold Beach. This is the association you have wanted to see started, so it is up to you to get in and help. A plan will be presented for financing the business. Hatch your ideas and get them in working order; there is always a chance for improvement. Hon. E. A. Bailey, Secretary and Treasurer, and President Delmar Colegrove, will be present; also other members of the association will be on hand.

Wm. Sweet Buys Jas. Hughes Farm.

A big real estate deal took place last week when Wm. Sweet, of Langlois, bought the Jas. Hughes ranch at the mouth of Sixes river. This farm comprises approximately 600 acres, a good part of which is rich bottom land, and is occupied by one of the best farm dwellings in the county.

With the purchase of this ranch Mr. Sweet, who with his brother conducts a general merchandise store at Langlois, becomes the owner of two of northern Curry's best farms, having a few years ago bought the old Joe Nay place on Elk river.

The consideration in this deal or the plans of Mr. and Mrs. Hughes for the future are not known to the TRIBUNE.

F. B. Tichenor Makes Big Raid On Moonshiners.

The TRIBUNE is indebted to Schlier B. Hermann for a late copy of the Portland News which carried an account of a raid upon moonshiners by deputy U. S. Marshal F. B. Tichenor that read in part as follows:

One woman, seven men and three whisky stills, one of the largest yet constructed in Oregon, have been taken by deputy U. S. Marshal F. B. Tichenor and assistants, in a two day raid at Prineville, in the heart of the cattle-raising district. The woman was Mrs. Sarah A. Soderly, 40. She was released on \$500 bail.

The raid was one of the largest made into the moonshining industry of Oregon and netted hundreds of gallons of cornmeal mash. Denver Good, one of the men, was freed on \$1,500 bail, but the others were taken to Portland late Wednesday night and locked in the county jail.

The raids were made on ranches occupied by moonshiners. They had full equipment. Tichenor was assisted by the Prineville sheriff and deputies.

On the Warner ranch was found a still with a daily capacity of more than 100 gallons of mash. A curious phase of the moonshine situation in Central Oregon is the hostility Tichenor says he encountered from the big cattle owners.

This hostility manifested itself in many ways. During the early stage of his investigation it was borne in upon Tichenor that the cattlemen were giving him no help and were even drawing red herrings across the trails that led to the moonshine stills in the desert and mountains.

It was not until after the raids had been made that the cattlemen enlightened the deputy marshal.

The seven men and one woman arrested are thought to be members of a well organized gang, which, in the days before prohibition, carried on cattle stealing on a large scale.

On the advent of prohibition the gang found whisky making more profitable. The cattlemen fear that if the stills are broken up the gang will return to rustling.

Judge J. F. Hall To Run For Judge.

Judge John F. Hall, who made such an excellent county judge before becoming district attorney, said last night that, although he did not consult his own wishes in the matter, he had decided to make the race for county judge this year.

Judge Hall is probably the strongest man politically in Coos county and is highly regarded by republicans and democrats alike. Judge Hall has been importuned right and left to make the race and consented to do so only after a large number of people had gone to him and requested him to announce himself as a candidate.—Marshfield Record.

The Hog Drive.

The much advertised hog drive passed through Port Orford last week enroute from Gold Beach to Myrtle Point, from which latter place the porkers will be shipped by train to Eugene and there held a while and then sent to the Portland market.

There were 397 hogs in the band at this place, but more were bargained for along the road and it was expected the band would number close to 400 when Myrtle Point was reached. The hogs were traveling 8 or 10 miles a day, and the feed for that length of time was costing between \$30 and \$40. Three or four were lost in the wash along the road between Gold Beach and Port Orford. Some of the hogs were large and some small, but as a whole they were an excellent lot and in fine condition.

Wm. Miller, of the Eugene Live stock association, in speaking of present day prices, said that in years gone by he had bought hogs in this section at 2 1/2 cents per lb. on foot, and had been importuned by the farmers to take them at that low figure. For the band he now has he gave 10 and 11 cents, and had to do a lot of rustling to get them at that.

Besides the hogs, Mr. Miller was driving cattle and sheep out of the county. Of cattle he had but about one car load, but he had several hundred head of sheep when here and had bought others enroute, among them the Jas. Hughes band at Sixes.

Federal Loans Temporarily Suspended.

The following letter has been received by C. H. Buffington, secretary and treasurer of the Southern Curry National Farm Loan Association:

THE FEDERAL LAND BANK
Spokane, Wash., Feb. 4, 1920.

Dear Sir:

Your attention has no doubt been called to the fact that a suit was brought about six months ago in the United States Court at Kansas City, Mo., at the instance of the farm mortgage bankers, (the old line mortgage men) attacking the Federal Farm Loan Act generally, and its provision in reference to farm loan bonds especially. The District Court promptly decided the suit against the mortgage men, who immediately appealed to the Supreme court of the United States, where the case was heard on Jan. 6, 1920.

Neither the officers of this bank nor, we are advised, the Farm Loan Board, have ever had the slightest doubt as to the legal sufficiency of the act, and no apprehension is felt as to the final result of the litigation. This confidence in the act has been shared by the investing public as shown by their ready investments heretofore in farm loan bonds. Investors, however, naturally hesitate to purchase a security the legality of which is being questioned in court. Under these circumstances it is inadvisable for Federal Land Banks to offer farm loan bonds for sale while the litigation is pending.

Federal Land Banks have no loanable funds beyond their capital except such as they derive from the sale of farm loan bonds. This bank has now in hand all the applications it can safely undertake to close without selling more bonds. While we regret to suggest any halting in our business, we feel it necessary and just to applicants that you take no more applications until the litigation has been ended, except that the closing of the loan must await the decision of the pending case. As the court has announced that it will not reconvene until March 1st, it is evident a decision will not be rendered before that date, and may, of course, be deferred several weeks thereafter, and it should be made clear to new applicants that their loans will not be closed until the decision has been rendered; that the time is uncertain, and that if their needs are such they cannot risk delay, they should make other arrangements.

Trusting that this will work no serious disappointment, and believing in any event it is much better to state the facts frankly than to encourage applicants to expect loans which may not be closed at the time they need the money, I am
