



SENATOR CHAMBERLAIN.

Chamberlain has announced his candidacy for reelection, and it looks as though he is due for one of the hardest fights in his long political career if he is to hold his seat in the United States Senate. The demand for berry juice is increasing rapidly, and it is claimed by those in a position to know that an over-production is impossible. This is why purchasers are willing to sign long-time contracts at a minimum price giving growers the benefit of a advance in the market.

Bandon Coast Guard Station Under Investigation.

February Driest Month.

It seems quite likely that February will make a new record for dryness, and as it follows a dry month in January, is going to work a hardship upon many farming sections in the United States. Because of lack of rain and snow in the mountains California is facing a serious drought and many parts of the east are facing similar conditions.

The Oregonian of the 19th speaks of the month as follows:

Thus far it has been, the driest February on record, reported the United States weather bureau yesterday. In the first 18 days there has been but one day with a measurably amount of rain, the amount having been 0.16 of an inch. The normal rainfall for this period, February 1 to 18, inclusive is 5.87 inches.

The nearest approach to the present record was in 1899 when the first 18 days of February had only 0.20 of rain.
