County Assessor F. S. Moore is just getting around again after a rather severe attack of mumps.

A large number of fishermen from the outside are at Rogue river for the fishing season which opens tomorrow.

A Curry county homesteader reports that he recently saw 45 deer at one time feeding on a small prairie near his cabin.

Phil Pierson, of Bandon, is getting out the Gold Beach Reporter while editor John A. Jura is in Portland being treated by a specialist.

Commissioner Ralph Cope returned to his home near Langlois, Saturday, from attending county court which was in session three days last week.

Delmar and Alva Miller came up from their Cedar Fork home last Friday and are now employed by Chas. Erickson on the Hubbard-Brush creek highway.

Orris Knapp returned to his home in Port Orford last Thursday, having decided to discontinue his studies at O. A. C. following an attack of flu which left him rather below par.

O. J. Mather, of Sixes, attended county court at Gold Beach last week where he went to present the petition asking for a two mile extension of the county road up Sixes river.

Kyle Lewis went to Gold Beach last week for treatment by Dr. Wheeler. Following a carbuncle on his neck, the young man had an abscess in his ear that had to be lanced several times.

C. H. Pearce was in town over Saturday night from his Middle Elk home. Mr. Pearce will come in again next Monday when he and one or two others will start the preliminary work on the wharf.

Frank Gaughell and Wesley Gauntlett, of Gold Beach, the former with a Ford truck and the latter with a touring car, passed down the coast Monday, returning from Bandon, with 15 Chinamen who were coming in from the Columbia river to work in the Macleay cannery at Wedderburn.

A very enjoyable party was held at the Robt. McPhillamey home in Port Orford last Thursday evening. The occasion was the 72nd birthday anniversary of Mrs. McPhillamey. The party was in the nature of a surprise, the visitors, about thirty in number, taking along a large birthday cake and other refreshments.

Miss Pearl Robinson, in honor of her 13th birthday anniversary, entertained a number of her youthful friends at a very pleasant party at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Jas. B. Sutton last Saturday evening. Refreshments were served, and games and other amusements afforded an enjoyable evening for the young folks.

The Osprey, the Peoples company's new boat, made her first trip into Rogue river last week. She arrived at Gold Beach, Thursday, from Eureka with about 30 tons of freight, and sailed the following day for Coos bay. The Osprey carries about 50 tons of freight and is commanded by Capt. John Woodworth. She is well fitted to give the people of Rogue river excellent service, and will call at Port Orford as the occasion requires.

Mr. Ays, representative of the Armo Iron company was in Gold Beach last week trying to sell the county court an elevator which he claimed would load gravel onto trucks or wagons at 10c per yard, which is about half what it now costs to load. The court took the matter under consideration, and will probably buy some kind of a machine for this purpose in the near future.

Born, Friday April 9th, to Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Lindberg at their home in Port Orford, a son. Dr. R. V. Leep, of Bandon, was the attending physician.

A coyote has been working lately on the Robt. Fromm band of sheep on Humboldt mountain. It has killed over 30 lambs and all attempts to catch it have thus far been unsuccessful.

Geo. W. Sutton returned one day last week from a trip to Reedsport where he had been to inspect a gasoline boat that is being fitted up at that place for use by himself and Marion Zumwalt for deep-sea fishing off here this summer.

J. G. Porterfield, who for several weeks has been critically ill with pneumonia at his Eureka creek home, is slowly recovering, although he is still very weak and is far from being a well man. Since Dr. J. A. Tyler returned to Crescent City, Dr. J. S. Wheeler, of Gold Beach, has been in almost daily attendance.

D. M. Moore, of Gold Beach, is just recovering the use of his left hand from the result of a severe cut across the back of it he received when splitting wood about six weeks ago. The ax was dull else the hand would have been severed, and as it was several of the leaders to the fingers were cut. Dr. Wheeler did a nice job in dressing the hand, and it promises to be as good as new again.

State School Superintendent J. A. Churchill will speak here tomorrow night on School Consolidation and the Two Mill Tax, and again in Langlois Friday evening on the same subjects. These are questions of great importance to all the people and northern Curry residents should avail themselves of the opportunity to attend these meetings. Mr. Churchill was to have been in Port Orford tonight, but a change was made in his program which caused his dates in Curry to be set a day later.

Coming down from Bandon last Saturday night R. Davidson's loaded truck stopped on one of the hills near Denmark. When Mr. Davidson got out to crank it, the brakes slipped and it started backwards. Before he could get it stopped it had backed into Walter McGill's Ford truck that was following close behind and smashed its radiator and battered its front end up generally. The two men came to town in the Davidson truck and returned the following day with another radiator and the Ford came through all right.

County Attorney Upheld in Sealion Case.

For some time Wm. Hunter, formerly of Gold Beach, has been trying to collect \$3,339 from Curry county, which sum he alleges is due him for bounty on 1113 sealion scalps.

Mr. Hunter's last move in the matter was to bring mandamus proceedings against county clerk Myrtle Cooley to compel her to draw a warrant in his favor for the payment of the claim. To these proceedings County Attorney C. H. Buffington filed a demurrer with Circuit Judge John S. Coke. In a decision rendered last week Judge Coke upheld the demurrer.

What other steps, if any, Mr. Hunter will take in his endeavor to collect his claim are not known.

Broom Released.

Wm. Broom who was committed to the State Hospital from Port Orford on the 5th of last January, has been released from that institution. He was given his liberty on the promise of a friend to look after him and be responsible for his actions.

Prior to Broom's commitment he had terrorized the Eckley community for several months, where he held mining claims which he was said to have acquired from their original owner at the point of a gun. Numerous threats against local people, and an unenviable record, caused Broom to be regarded as an unbalanced and dangerous man. Some conjecture was expressed at the time as to which institution in Salem Broom belonged.

It is reported that Broom has returned to the Eckley neighborhood, and despite the friend that has vouched for him, some uneasiness is felt as to what may happen.

Joe Ellis came down from Norway, Coos county, yesterday on a visit to his brother Andy at Sixes.

Atty. Finn, of Portland, attended County Court last week in the interest of S. R. Haworth who is trying to clear the title to the original Lakeport holdings—a big undertaking.

E. I. Porterfield was in town last night while enroute to Myrtle Point where he is employed. The young man had been called to his home at Eureka creek by the serious illness of his father who is now convalescing from an attack of pneumonia.

Mrs. R. Leutwyler gave a party at her home last evening for Ray Dean, it being his 13th birthday anniversary. The young folks spent from 7 until 10 o'clock in having what they said was a "tip top" time. After playing games of various kinds, the youthful revelers were served with refreshments of: sand wiches, cake, cocoa and fruit.

The grown son of Jas. P. Olsen, formerly of Langlois, committed suicide in Coquille last week. The young man took poison in a fit of despondency. The Olsen family lived a number of years at Langlois. The husband and wife separated a few years ago, the latter dying recently in Portland. Mrs. Olsen was formerly Miss Lydia Colvin of Gold Beach.

Will Build Sixes Road.

The county court last week granted the petition sent in from this section asking for a two-mile extension of the road up Sixes. The road to be built will run from the old Divilbiss place up past the W. O. Corbin ranch. It is understood that bids for its construction will be let at the special term of court in May.

This road will not only open up several ranches in that section, but it will tap the Sixes timber belt where W. C. Case is now making preparations to build a mill. Mr. Case owns a fine tract of cedar, and the proposed road, when completed, will make it possible for him to truck this lumber to Port Orford for shipment.

Gold Beach Has Good Business Buildings.

A visitor to Gold Beach is now impressed by the stability and convenience of the two business buildings that have gone up there this winter—the Macleay store and the Curry County bank.

Both of these buildings are built of brick and are excellently arranged as well as having ample room. There is at least some merit to the claim that the store is the best building of its kind between Marshfield and Eureka. It has been completed for the past month or two, while the bank building is just about ready for occupancy.

These buildings add much to the appearance of the county seat, and speak well of the spirit that prompted their erection.

County Clerk Resigns.

Miss Myrtle Cooley resigned her position as County Clerk last week, and the court appointed Arthur Walker to complete her unexpired term.

Miss Cooley's resignation was made so she might live with and be company and assistance to her aunt, Mrs. Nettie Scott of Smith River, California, who recently lost her husband, and also because the confining office hours were telling on her health. Miss Cooley has been a competent and obliging official, and while serving in that position has made many friends who will regret the necessity that has caused her to resign.

In Arthur Walker the court appointed a capable young man to conduct the affairs of that office, and from present indications he will be elected without opposition to succeed himself.
