The O. A. C. Extension Service School at Langlois and Denmark a Success.

The 3 day millinery school held at Langlois and Denmark on April 15, 16 and 17 was attended by a most enthusiastic group of women. Miss Lydia Doolittle, of O. A. C., a specialist in the art of millinery, conducted the classes. Her methods of securing results were practical and efficient, and under her skillful guidance the women created, or recreated, as the case might be, up to date hats for themselves for less than a third of what would have to be paid at the present high prices of millinery goods. Fifty-nine hats were renovated and remade to look like new. Materials were cleaned and colored; flowers and foliage that had been discarded were retinted and laquered and used again. The average actual cost of each finished hat was 76 cents, and the average value of each finished hat, estimated at present prices, was \$7. \$316 represents the total saving on the 59 hats. Hats ranging in value from \$1.50 to \$15 were included in these.

The Northern Curry Community Welfare Club, under whose auspices the school was held, are more than pleased with the interest manifested by the community, and the results. The club feels that several things have been accomplished. Among them are: 1st. By actually constructing their hats, women learned the little arts of millinery which distinguish a milliner's hat from a home made hat. 2nd. They have successfully combated the H. C. L. in one way at least. 3rd, and most important; The community has actually experienced the service of the Extension Department of O. A. C. This is the first school O. A. C. has had an opportunity to hold in Curry, and from the interest shown by the people it will not be the last.

The Langlois and Denmark communities appreciate the work done by Miss Kalbus of O. A. C., Coos Co. Home Demonstration Agent, earlier in the season and feel greatly indebted to her for her assistance in organizing the Club.

Another extension school is scheduled for May or June concerning which information will be given later.

This is necessary because the chilly rains and cold spells of winter and past few weeks in particular have stunted the growth of grass. He says that the grass is not as good as last year at this time by any means.

Grants Pass Sportsmen Are Much Dissatisfied.

Grants Pass, Or., April 9—Grants Pass sportsmen and business organizations protest the alleged secret agreement between certain Medford citizens and Roderick Macieay in regard to Rogue river fishing, as unsatisfactory to the majority and favor closing the river to commercial fishing for a definite period. Telegrams to this effect have been sent out by the Josephine sportsmen league, Wilford Allen president, and by the Grants Pass Chamber of Commerce, F. S. Bramwell president.

Third Trial Comes Up Next Month.

"The Howell murder trial, under present plans, will come up in May when Judge Coke will have impaneled a new jury, none of whom have served on juries who heard the former trials," says the North Bend Harbor in a write up on the case. The Harbor continues:

"Harold Howell is the boy who is facing trial on the charge of murdering Lillian Leubold, the little girl of about the same age, both residents of Bandon. This is his third trial, the two former resulting in a disagreement, with the vote of the jury men favoring conviction. "Under orders of Judge Coke the sheriff has given orders to the jailer in charge not to admit visitors but once a week, and only then those of the immediate family and who have to do with the boy. People who may be attracted by morbid curiosity are excluded entirely by the courts order.

"The boy is strong and healthy and spends much of his time amusing himself with a clarinet on which he manages to play sufficiently well to create an interest in the effort he occupies a double cell on the east side of the jail and is entirely removed from association with those who may occupy cells in the west corridor of the jail.

"The next trial will be a hard fought legal battle, the defense having been strengthened by additional counsel as has the prosecution. The outcome is a theme for general speculation, but it is admitted by nearly everyone that no matter what the verdict is, this will without doubt be the last trial."
