## Local Happenings

Big dance Saturday night.

S. Montague, of Sixes, made a business trip to the county seat during the past week.

Geo. Postal, of the Rogue river section, was a visitor in Port Orford one day last week.

Geo. W. Wilson spent a day or two in town last week from his home on Middle Elk.

H. Sabro and J. Ira Sidwell, Bandon business men, paid Port Orford a short visit Monday.

A white frost marked two nights of last week and the barometer fell to 2 degrees below freezing.

Mrs. Whitworth, of Euchre creek, has been visiting friends in Port Orford during the past week.

C. A. Long treated the front of his grocery store to a fresh coat of paint during the past few days.

The steeple on the local church has been repaired during the past week and it is planned to paint the roof of the building.

The tramp made a short stop in our harbor Sunday while enroute from Rogue river to Coos bay with a load of fish and other freight.

E. L. White made a trip to Corbin with his auto, Saturday, where he met R. L. Macleay and took that gentleman through to Bandon the same day.

Miss Crissie Bersager and Mr. Jesse Miller, two popular young people of the Euchre creek neighborhood were united in marriage at Gold Beach last week.

Roderick L. Macleay passed up the coast Saturday enroute to his Portland home. Mr. Macleay had been at Wedderburn a few weeks for the opening of the fishing season on Rogue river.

Geo. Sutton went to Reedsport, on the Umpqua river, last week and he and Marion Zumwalt are due from that place with a gasoline launch that they will use in deep-sea fishing off Port Orford this summer.

Sunday was the first real summer day of the season, the sun being quite warm. Many took advantage of the occasion to go picnicking and clam digging. The latter found a good tide and had no trouble in getting all the bivalves they wanted.

A special ballot will be printed for the voters of Floras creek precinct at the election May 21st for the purpose of determining whether or not stock shall be allowed to run at large on the public highways of that precinct.

Rev. Cooper, of Coquille who was to have preached in Port Orford last Friday evening, postponed his visit, as his last week date conflicted with the visit of the Red Cross instructor and Mrs. A. W. Cope who came here to organize home nursing classes.

The commissioners of the Port of Port Orford held a regular monthly meeting last Saturday afternoon. All of the material for the building of the wharf has been ordered, and its construction will be pushed as rapidly as weather and other conditions permit.

Wm. Gillings commenced work Monday morning on the garage and store room he is having erected adjoining his hardware store. D. D. McGill is the carpenter in charge. Mr. Gillings' new Chevrolet is in Marshallfield, and he will have it brought down shortly if the weather holds good.

School in the upper grades was closed at Port Orford last Thursday while Prof. F. H. Robinson, an old friend of the family, went to Denmark to conduct the funeral services at the burial of Mrs. Sarah Fitzhugh. These services, owing to the high esteem in which the deceased was held, were largely attended, and many others would have been there had the roads been better.

Work on the approach to the new wharf is now fairly started, several men being employed in concrete work under the direction of C. H. Pearce. Instead of a separate concrete base for each pile, as in the old Home wharf, a solid base the full width of the wharf is being built for each row of piling. This kind of construction is for about 200 feet of the approach where rocks prevent the driving of piling. The laying of the most of this concrete can only be done at extreme low tide.

Rev. Cooper, Episcopal minister from Coquille who last week postponed his visit to Port Orford, will be here next Sunday, May 2nd, and will hold services in the church both morning and evening.

Joe Rocco went to Langlois last week where he leased the Wm. Clarno ranch, of which he will take possession May 1st. Mr. Rocco's lease of the J. D. Loucks place on Elk river has been taken over by C. C. Posting.

At the big dance next Saturday night, given by the Civic Improvement Club, the charge of 10c for ladies to help pay the war tax is for the entire evening, not for each dance as some have been lead to believe.

F. T. McMullen and family of Denmark have moved to Eugene, where they will make their future home. Mr. McMullen having purchased business interests there on a recent trip to the valley. He recently sold his fine Denmark dairy ranch to Kenneth Perkins of Two Mile who moved to his new home some weeks ago. The McMullen family was one of the prominent Northern Curry families and will be missed by their many friends in that section.

Ray Norton was committed to the State Hospital from Gold Beach several days ago. He was met here the first of the week by an attendant from Salem, having been brought this far by S. Montague. It will be remembered that last week the Tribune told of the experience sheriff Tolman had in arresting D. E. Ellis worth on an insanity charge filed by Norton. The two men were neighbors in the Illabe country. Now, it appears that Norton is unbalanced, while the desperate attempt Ellisworth made to escape from the custody of the sheriff does not speak well for his mental poise.

#### Circuit Court Not Convened.

The April term of Circuit Court scheduled to be opened at Gold Beach last Monday, was not convened due to the illness of Judge Coke. As the docket is small, and there are no prisoners held awaiting trial, it has been decided to let the matters that were coming up at this time go over until the regular September term.

#### Dairymen's Meeting at Denmark.

There will be a Dairymen's meeting in the school house at Denmark at 10 o'clock A. M. next Friday, April 30th. This meeting of vital importance to dairymen and all in the Denmark neighborhood are urged to attend.

State Dairy and Food Commissioner, John D. Mickle, and Mr. Hall of the Oregon Dairymen's League, will be present and explain the advantages to the dairymen of cooperation—the many benefits they will derive from joining the Dairymen's League.

In the afternoon of the same day Meers, Mickle and Hall will attend a similar meeting at Sixes, and it is hoped and expected all the dairymen of northern Curry will take the opportunity of attending these meetings which have been called for the purpose of stabilizing the industry in which they are engaged.

#### Outside Fishing Commences.

Nellies Cove is now the rendezvous for several gasoline boats that are engaged in deep-sea fishing. They are the vanguard of 15 or 20 such boats that will be operated from here this summer. The fish are now being taken fresh to Coos Bay and Reedsport, but as soon as a wharf is completed in the harbor they will be put in cold storage here and held for shipment on larger boats.

In one set last week the crew of the Tiger caught 1,000 pounds of halibut, one of the fish weighing 150 lbs. Halibut bring the fishermen 124 cents per pound. Salmon trolling off the mouths of streams, to gether with the catching of the deep sea fish, promises to make this industry a profitable one for the fishermen.

Port Orford harbor, with no bar to cross and a sheltered cove for the boats to lie, is an ideal location for such an enterprise.

#### Find Big Nugget.

S. Montague was in town yesterday from his home near Sixes exhibiting a gold nugget weighing \$6.25, which he picked up on the bedrock in his mines a few days ago. It is said to be the largest nugget ever found in the placer mines of lower Sixes.

Mr. Montague has a part of what was formerly the Cyrus Madden Blanco Blacksand Mine. The work he has done this winter has proven very satisfactory. Besides considerable platinum, he has shipped over 14 ounces of gold and has another cleanup of several ounces ready for shipment. He will probably not be able to operate any more this summer on account of scarcity of water, but he has the mine opened so that he is confident of making a nice stake out of it next winter.

#### Shoots Himself in Hand.

Daniel Oxley, a young man about 17 years of age, accidentally shot himself with a shotgun last Sunday morning, and was very fortunate in escaping with his life.

The youth had gone on Battle Rock to shoot sea ducks with a double barrel hammer gun. In going down a steep place on the rock he set the butt end of the gun down ahead of him, when he slipped and the hammers of the gun struck with sufficient force to discharge one barrel. The flesh on the under side of the thumb on his left hand was blown away to the bone and the inside of his hand blackened and powder-burned, while one of the No. 4 shot entered his cheek. This shot is still imbedded in the young man's face, but is causing him no trouble other than the natural soreness of the wound. The hand is getting along nicely, and it is expected that the result of the accident, which was very near a fatality, will be nothing more serious than a few weeks enforced idleness.

#### Red Cross Nursing Classes Organized.

Mrs. A. W. Cope, president of the Northern Curry Community Welfare Club, and Miss Dorothy M. Hope, Red Cross nurse from Seattle, came down to Port Orford from Langlois last Thursday for the purpose of organizing Red Cross nursing classes. Mrs. Cope returned home the following day, while Miss Hope remained over and will make Port Orford her headquarters during her northern Curry work.

Three classes, each with a membership of 10 or 12, have been organized at Port Orford, two at Langlois, one at Denmark, and if two or three more ladies can be interested at Sixes a class will also be organized there. These classes meet twice a week and take a course of fifteen lessons. The Port Orford classes received their first instructions last Friday, and will also meet on Monday of each week. One class of ladies meets at 2 P. M., another at 4, and a class of school girls in the evening. The Langlois and Denmark classes will take their first lessons today.

Because of the few physicians here and in appreciation of the war work done, the Red Cross has sent this nurse expressly for the benefit of the people of Curry county. In many places a big price is paid for the privilege of taking these lessons that are being offered to the ladies of Curry county for \$50—the price of an instruction book.

After the northern Curry classes have completed their course, Miss Hope will organize another set of classes in the central and south end of the county.

#### A Letter to Dairymen.

Sixes, Ore., April 23, 1920  
Editor TRIBUNE:

Through your paper I wish to notify all dairymen both large and small on Elk and Sixes rivers of a meeting to be held at our cheese factory on Sixes for the purpose of joining the Oregon Dairymen's Co-operative League. This move means more to the dairymen of Curry county than any other that could possibly come up.

If the dairymen of this section stand together and all of them join with the Coos and Willamette dairymen in one big organization we will have strength enough to accomplish our purpose, which is to hold the price of milk and dairy products high enough to enable us to feed milk feeds, etc., which are necessary, and make a profit or living above that.

At a meeting held in Langlois on April 17th a resolution was passed discontinuing the Coos & Curry Cheese Association. There were probably 20 farmers present, and they unanimously agreed to join the League.

At the meeting next Friday, April 30th, at 2 P. M., there will be able speakers from the Oregon Dairymen's League who will explain all details and answer any questions anyone may ask.

I would like to see every dairyman in this locality present.

Organization will do as much for the dairymen as it did for the fruit growers of California and Oregon. The day is coming when we will be forced to stand together as one man or quit the business.

#### The Breakwater Meets Her Fate.

According to a report received in southern California a few days ago the steamer Breakwater which operated between Coos Bay and Portland for so many years, went ashore on the Mexican coast near Puerto, and has been dashed to pieces by the waves. One man was drowned in the wreck. The Breakwater was the pioneer passenger boat of the Coos Bay run, and many a resident of this county and of Curry, came to this part of Oregon on her. She was a rough riding ship, and one trip on her was enough to make the victim a confirmed resident of this section until the railroad came. During the war the Breakwater, which had been placed on another and longer run, was taken to the Atlantic coast and used in the Gulf of Mexico traffic to release another larger vessel for the transport service. She was wrecked during that period, but was later salvaged, only to again go onto the sands.
