Local Happenings

It is your duty as a good citizen to vote.

A supply of gasoline is expected in Bandon, Friday.

Dr. Birch, the Marshfield optician, will be in Port Orford on the 25th of this month.

Supt. and Mrs. W. M. Kent were visitors in Port Orford last Saturday evening from Langlois.

The Earl Allred family moved to Bandon the first of the week, where they will reside in the future. Mr. Allred being employed on the steam Telegraph plying between that place and Coquille.

A heavy shower Sunday night was worth thousands of dollars to the farmers of Curry county. Late crops were drying up, grass and gardens were not growing as they should, and altogether the rain was badly needed.

Rev. Cooper, of Coquille, preached two interesting sermons in the local church last Sunday. Rev. Cooper expects to be in Port Orford again June 16th, and he says that Bishop Walter S. Sumner is planning on visiting this section about the middle of July.

J. R. Hill, Pistol river contractor, spent a day or two in this section during the past week looking over the proposed market road up Elk river. Mr. Hill will bid at the special term of county court on the 29th for the construction of this road.

R. L. Macleay passed down the coast Saturday enroute to his Wedburn holdings. Mr. Macleay went out to Portland not long since from Wedburn and it is understood he has been called back at this time in regard to fixing the price to be paid for salmon at his cannery on Rogue river.

Mrs. R. Davidson went to Bandon one day last week to consult a doctor in regard to her knee on which she was kicked by a horse several months ago. Mrs. Davidson has been getting about with the aid of a crutch ever since the accident, and the injury has not been getting well as it should.

Dr. Douglas and family, who started down the coast last week in their big touring car, had a break down on the mountain south of town and spent several days at the Robt. Fromm home on Brush creek. Dr. Douglas formerly resided in Portland, but is now seeking a ranch on which to retire from his profession.

Robt. Perry and family moved out to Sixes river Sunday where Mr. Perry is employed in building the Case mill. Just now the men are engaged in putting temporary bridges across Sixes at the fords between the mill site and Dry creek so that auto trucks can run up the river with the heavy machinery and other equipment for the mill.

Geo. Sutton and Marion Zumwalt, accompanied by a young man by name of Warren, who is associated with them, returned last week from Reedsport with a gas boat they will use in deep-sea fishing off Port Orford this summer. The boat is 36 feet long and has 16-horse-power engine, and is equipped with complete fishing equipment including a salmon trolling outfit as well as halibut and other gear.

Floyd J. Huntley returned to his Gold Beach home Monday from spending a few days interviewing the voters in this end of the county in behalf of his candidacy for the Republican nomination as sheriff. Mr. Huntley is a capable young man and the opinion prevails at this time that the race between he and sheriff Tolman, who seeks reelection, is going to be a close one.

Henry Johnston and son, Andrew, are engaged in opening the old outlet of Port Orford lake around the bluff to the ocean. In order to do this it is necessary to dig a ditch through the sand about 10 feet deep and 15 or 20 feet wide for a distance of 300 yards. This excavation is being done with a scraper run by a gas engine. Mr. Johnston and son have been working on the big ditch about two weeks and it will take several more to complete it. Since this outlet has been closed the lake has been backing up to an unusual depth and it is being reopened so land along the shores of the lake can be cultivated.

Lester Lucas, Republican candidate for nomination as County Commissioner, passed down the coast Monday returning to his home at Harbor after spending a day in northern Curry in the interests of his candidacy. Although a resident of southern Curry for many years, this was the first time Mr. Lucas has ever been in Port Orford. He thoroughly enjoyed the trip, and made an impression among the voters he met that will secure him much support at the polls.

Superior Judge John L. Childs, of Crescent City, California, passed up the coast Sunday to Denmark, where he visited at the J. S. Capps home and where he met his daughter, Miss Bertha, who in company with Miss Eva Capps, has been attending college at Berkeley, Cal. The young ladies arrived at Denmark recently, having come to Bandon on the steamer Elizabeth. Judge Childs and daughter passed through town yesterday returning home. Mr. Childs who taught school at Gold Beach about 30 years ago, had not visited northern Curry in 15 years and he enjoyed meeting old acquaintances and noting the development of this section since he was last here.

Former Langlois Man Locates in the Imperial Valley.

In writing to have the TRIBUNE sent to him at El Centro, California, Bert True, who for a number of years kept a confectionery store at Langlois, has the following to say:

"I have sold out in Long Beach and will try the Imperial Valley. It gets very hot here—125 in the shade at times, but it has been nice weather during the three weeks I have been here being from 90 to 102. This place is 19 feet below sea level, but is a very prosperous locality. They will start shipping cantaloupes in about two weeks and expect to ship ten or twelve thousand car loads. I have bought a soft drink stand here and am doing well so far and expect to do a great deal better when hot weather comes."

Speaks For Hiram Johnson.

Judge John L. Childs of Crescent City spoke in Port Orford Monday night on Hiram Johnson for President. A goodly crowd turned out to hear the speaker, all the business houses in town closing for the occasion except the W. H. Bennett store. Judge Childs who is a forceful and witty speaker, presented many reasons why the people of the west, especially, should support Hiram Johnson for president. He told in detail of the things that Hiram Johnson, as Governor, had done for the state of California—how he not only put the Southern Pacific out of politics in that state, but all other of the big vested interests; how he secured homes and funds for the poor, dependent children of his state so they might be cared for and educated; how he drafted a workmen's compensation that has been copied by states all over the union; how he prevented the domain of his state from being gobbled up by Japs and other foreigners who could not be come American citizens. These, and other similar acts in behalf of the common people, declared the speaker, accounted for the popularity of Hiram Johnson in his own native state. The explanation by the speaker of Mr. Johnson's stand on the League of Nations was greeted with applause. Judge Childs said it was safe to say that 99 per cent of the American people believed in the League of Nations when it was first started, but that now when its provisions were fully understood largely through the work of Hiram Johnson, scarcely a person could be found who believed in adopting it without reservations.

Judge Childs made an able presentation of his subject and won friends, and no doubt votes, for Mr. Johnson. He spoke in Gold Beach last evening and will speak in Brookings tonight on the same subject.

Harold Howell Freed.

After being out 17 hours the jury in the third trial of Harold Howell for the murder of Lillian Leuthold at Bandon July 27th, returned a verdict of not guilty.

At first they stood seven for conviction and five for acquittal and the balloting continued unchanged until toward the last when those who were for conviction went over to the other side.

The bullet, which killed the Leuthold girl, was said to be the main point of evidence, which led to the belief of some of the jurors that the boy was guilty. They thought the bullet had been fired from Howell's gun, but finally admitted that it had not been shown that Howell fired the gun or killed the girl.

It Lightens The Burden.

While the country newspaper does a lot of gratuitous work for its community from which it never expects any returns, especially in the way of words of appreciation for the services rendered yet when these words do come, either from home or abroad, they make the way a little brighter for the editor and encourage him to renewed efforts in behalf of an oft times unappreciative public. Along the above line is the following kindly mention of the TRIBUNE's recent 29th birthday anniversary:

The Port Orford Tribune is 29 years old and The Record congratulates the people of Port Orford on having as good a weekly as they have, better than the patronage the paper gets warrants. Editor Stewart does a whole lot for the community and, for that matter, for the entire coast section.—Marshfield Record.

The Tribune at Port Orford is now on its 30th year and Editor Stewart remarks that the patronage accorded has been sufficient to pay operating expenses and leave a fair portion of profit. The Tribune is the pioneer paper of Curry county, and Editor Stewart is one of the best country newspaper men we know. The Tribune is an invaluable aid to the town of Port Orford and Curry county, and the people may well extend support to this most worthy institution, for through the columns of the paper is reflected the true conditions of affairs that invariably shows up well to the outsiders.—Coos Bay Harbor.

The Teacher Crisis.

The American public schools are in the midst of a teacher-crisis.

Not only is there an alarming shortage of trained teachers, necessitating the employment of many thousands of very inadequately prepared teachers in order to provide some sort of instruction for thousands of children, but as is now becoming increasingly apparent, there is an appalling insufficiency of teachers of any kind, good or poor.

To ascertain how serious the conditions are the National Education Association sent out in January a brief questionnaire asking of the State departments of education these questions: (1) How many schools are now closed for lack of teachers? (2) How many children are deprived of instruction?

From the figures thus tabulated we find an actual shortage of 18,000 teachers; and a more serious fact, that the number of subnormal teachers is 40,000. One million pupils in the rural schools of our country at the present time are being taught by young girls who have themselves no more than Eighth grade training. One hundred thousand of the rural teachers of this country sixteen, seventeen and eighteen years of age.

I quote at random from tabulated figures showing, in different states, the number of schools closed for want of teachers: New York schools closed for want of teachers 1000. Means of transportation from closed schools to those in session provided. In Illinois 100 schools closed for want of teachers, 1,500 children out of school. Alabama 450 schools without teachers, 1,950 children out of school. Texas 2,000

schools closed for want of teachers, 60,000 children out of school.

Our Oregon has 130 schools without teachers and 2,230 children out of school.

To meet this emergency, many districts have consolidated their schools with the result that fewer children are actually deprived of instruction.

The present conditions of shortage in the teaching profession are obviously due to the unsatisfactory economic and social prospects confronting those who otherwise might be inclined to take up teaching.

I have at hand the 1920 salary figures for teachers in rural schools. They show that the average salary for men teachers of the rural schools including men teachers of the high schools, is \$711 per school year for the entire United States. The salary for the white woman teacher is \$630.

Considering the cost of living this average is but enough, but we do not live on averages. 60 per cent of the teachers are getting less than \$700; 40 per cent are getting less than \$400; 15 per cent are getting less than \$300; and there are any number getting from \$93 to \$300.

I am not giving you these figures to appear sensational at all; I am furnishing you these figures so that you may see that it is a national problem.

The present teaching staff of our secondary schools and colleges should be actively engaged in direct ing the youth best qualified by nature and training to enter the teaching profession.

The teachers now in service recognizing their restricted economic conditions, their restricted outlook on life and the limited facilities for growth and advancement, with the best of intentions turn young people from the teaching profession. The state must make the teaching profession sufficiently attractive from the economic, social and political points of view to encourage those entering upon a life work to enter the teaching profession.

I think no worker of any kind ought to be allowed to stay in business that does not grant him enough to live on and support a family on, and in the case of the teacher there should be something above that. We all realize that teacher's wages have not risen in proportion to the advance in the cost of living, and for that reason should favor the adoption of the teachers millage measure which will be on the ballot at the primary May 21.
