



WILL OF PEOPLE IGNORED.

Wallace McCamant, one of the delegates elected to the Republican national convention at Chicago, says he will not vote for Hiram Johnson for President even though the voters of Oregon expressed their preference for Mr. Johnson by a majority of over 2,000 above his nearest opponent. Mr. McCamant attempts to excuse this over-riding of the expressed wishes of the people he will represent by saying that he stated before the primaries he would not vote for Johnson even though instructed to do so. While this may be true and a few voters may have known it, yet with the state going for Johnson and with the only delegate announcing himself for Johnson elected, Mr. McCamant well knows that had he announced himself on the ballot as unalterably opposed to the California Senator he would have been defeated at the polls.

The assumption that Johnson is not the choice of the majority of the voters of Oregon; that Wood would have beaten him had Lowden and Hoover been eliminated, is a contention unsupported by fact and used as a subterfuge to justify a flagrant disregard for the wishes of the people.

The TRIBUNE is not surprised to see the Oregonian, which did all it could to defeat Johnson in this state, endorse the stand taken by Mr. McCamant, and also advocate repealing the act that obligates such delegates to support the candidate receiving a plurality of votes and making it obligatory only where a majority vote was received. We are surprised, however, to see the Oregon Voter, which is credited with advising the people fairly and impartially on political matters, endorse such a change.

Sending delegates to a convention as free lances, as would almost invariably be the case when several candidates were contesting for honors under a majority vote rule, would be returning to corrupt politics—the days of the political boss with the long sack. The tendency of the times is to get closer to a direct vote of the people, rather than away from it.

The voters of Oregon should remember Wallace McCamant, and what he stands for, and treat him accordingly should he ever again seek political honors in this state.

SAVE NOW.

The fall in the price of shoes and clothing and the tightening of the money market is but a fore-runner of a reaction that is coming all over the country as a result of the abnormal conditions which are and have been prevailing.

For this state of affairs the Wilson administration is directly to blame in that it did not check the profiteer, and prevent prices from rising so high that readjustment threatens to have a paralyzing effect upon what would otherwise be a prosperous era.

Now is the time that the working man should be making provision for the future. There never was a time when the laborer in this country could lay up money as he can now, that is, the man without a large family to support. This money, as compared with other times, is not worth fifty cents on the dollar, but the day is not far distant when it will be worth one hundred cents on the dollar.

Within the next few years many people will wish they had saved some of the money that is now slipping through their fingers so easily.

Why Oregon Fire Should Be Controlled.

Why burning without permit is prohibited from June 1st to October 1st—burning of log piles, stumps and brush heaps in small quantities excepted: Oregon has more standing timber than any other State in the Union—approximately four hundred and fifty billion feet. When manufactured into lumber Oregon's timber will bring in at least six billion of outside money, eighty per cent of which will be spent for labor and supplies. Oregon is receiving sixty million annually for lumber and other timber products. The industry is developing rapidly. Oregon's timber and lumber industry pays one third of the taxes of the state. When timber is destroyed by fire, the state loses directly the taxes which the property would yield until cut, and indirectly at least eighty per cent of its manufactured value. For every one thousand feet of timber burned the owner loses the value of the stumpage; about two dollars, and the State the amount expended for labor and supplies in manufacturing it into lumber; about \$8. The last census showed 34,722 people to be engaged in manufacturing industries in Oregon, of which 16,533 or fifty per cent are employed by the lumber industry. The last census shows that out of 36 manufacturing establishments in Oregon employing over one hundred wage earners 33 were engaged in the lumber industry. Eighty per cent of our out going freight is lumber. The 1920 census shows the value of all farm products in Oregon including land, buildings, implements, machinery, livestock, poultry and bees, to be \$528,244,000.00. The stumpage value of our timber is conservatively placed at six hundred and eighty million, and when manufactured, six billion eight hundred million. Over seventy thousand dollars of outside money is each day brought into Oregon by the lumber industry.

Miller of Parkersburg as cheese maker. The company expects a heavy season's output.

Ray Langlois, son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Langlois arrived home a few days ago from Manila, Philippine island, to spend a two month's furlough. He is serving his second enlistment in the U. S. army, and had been in the islands for over four years. He still has about three years to serve. Mr. Langlois says that the islands are wonderful until the newness wears off, and then one begins to realize how much more wonderful the good old U. S. A. proper really is. He is with headquarters and is stationed at Manila. His first two years' service was on Corregidor island, the big fortifications protecting the harbor of Manila. Enroute to Bandon he visited with his brother, Ira, at Napa, Cal. Ira was in an automobile accident last December in which he nearly lost his life being badly injured about the head. He is now out of the hospital, but is still feeling the effects of his injuries.

Starmer Wins in Sheriff Race.

Two errors in transportation in the unofficial returns giving Quine a lead of 14 votes, were discovered by the official canvass completed last night, and the final account gives Sam Starmer the nomination by six votes. In order to be sure of the result, the sheriff vote was checked over twice and there is little possibility of there being any mistake. The totals give Starmer 1753 votes and Quine 1748, a difference of six votes in Starmer's favor.

The race for the republican nomination for the position of sheriff is unparalleled in the history of the county. Early returns gave Quine a lead of a few votes, Starmer then forged ahead and with complete unofficial returns it looked as if Quine had been nominated by 14 votes. Early in the canvass an error of one vote was found, cutting Quine's vote to 13. Then the count developed another error where a person furnishing a report from a precinct had credited Starmer's votes to Quine. This also occurred again and with the canvass complete and an adding machine called into use, it developed that Starmer had won the election by a plurality of six votes.

It is possible that recount will be called for by Sheriff Quine, who today states that he has not decided whether or not he will endeavor to have a new count made. He stated that he will investigate thoroughly and in the event there is a question he will call another count. As yet he has taken no action.—Roseburg Review.
