Harding Wins The Nomination.

Senator Warren G. Harding, of Ohio, won the Republican nomination for President on the 10th ballot in the Chicago convention last Saturday.

The convention developed one of the biggest fights in the history of the country, with the situation developed between the big names—Wood, Lowden and Johnson, and about a dozen dark horses in the background. Of the latter, Harding was the one that drew the lucky straw.

Senator Harding has a good record, and he will undoubtedly be elected. The only objection to his nomination is that it makes a farce out of the people voting for their choice. His name has been mentioned for months, but he is "spoiled" by the people was very "meager" in comparison with that given to Wood, Lowden and Johnson, but nevertheless he receives the nomination. The will of the people did not receive consideration at the hands of the convention.

President Has To Meet At Crescent City.

The TRIBUNE is in receipt of a letter from Hon. John L. Childress, secretary and manager of the Del Norte Chamber of Commerce, relative to a big roads meeting that will be held in Crescent City June 27th. Among the prominent visitors that will be there are: Wm. D. Stephens, governor of California; Thos. H. MacDonald, Director of Public Roads; Paul C. Reddington, United States District Forester; George C. Pardee, Solon H. Williams, and R. E. Danaher members of the State board of Forestry; C. H. Sweater District engineer, Office of Public Roads; N. D. Darlington; Chas. A. Whitmore and Geo. C. Mansfield, California Highway Commission; T. A. Bedford and F. G. Sumner, Division Engineers; Noel E. Graves; N. J. McGarry; A. B. Fletcher, Highway Engineer.

An invitation has been extended to governor Olcott and the Highway Commissioners of Oregon to attend the meeting, and it is expected at least some of them will do so. The big question at this meeting will be the coast highway.

Hubbard-Bush-Creek Highway Will Be Rocked.

County Judge C. R. Wade, who attended the meeting of the state highway commission at Portland last week, brings encouraging reports regarding the settlement of the commission and the action taken at the meeting in behalf of the Coos and Curry highways.

The Oregonian in reporting the meeting said:

"To insure all year roads and not lose the grades, the state highway commission in the third day of its session, ordered ready for contracting at the July meeting approximately 190 miles. Of this mileage, 45.4 miles are on Pacific Highway Rocking will be carried on also on the highway to Tillamook, the Old Oregon trail, the coast highway, the Dallas California highway, the Coos Bay-Roseburg highway and the Newburg road.

By the time the winter rains set in all of these highways will be in condition to carry traffic. When these grades, with their rock or gravel surface, have been down a year they will be in better condition for hard surfacing than they would be if paved immediately following marking of the grade. Also, by the time the roads have been pounded down by traffic, the bond market and the labor market may be such that the commission may feel justified in resuming the program of hard surfacing. Not all the highway sections ordered rocked are in the program for hard surface pavement, however.

"The 14 mile section from the Coos valley to Remote, on the Roseburg-Coos Bay highway, will have the grade finished shortly and this is to be rocked immediately following. Rocking also has been ordered on this highway for the grade between Myrtle Point and Coquille and the two and a half miles uncompleted section has been ordered paved by state force account. This Coquille Marshfield pavement is of concrete.

In Curry county, the Brush creek Hubbards creek section of the coast highway has been ordered rocked. This new grade eliminates the worst part of the road in Curry county in between Gold Beach and Port Orford and shortens the distance."

Our local blacksmith, R. Leutwyler, received a severe kick last Saturday while shoeing a large draft horse belonging to Dave McKensie. The animal had not been shod before and had to be thrown. He was knocked unconscious and Dr. Holland was called and dressed the wound. Mr. Leutwyler, however is again back on the job.

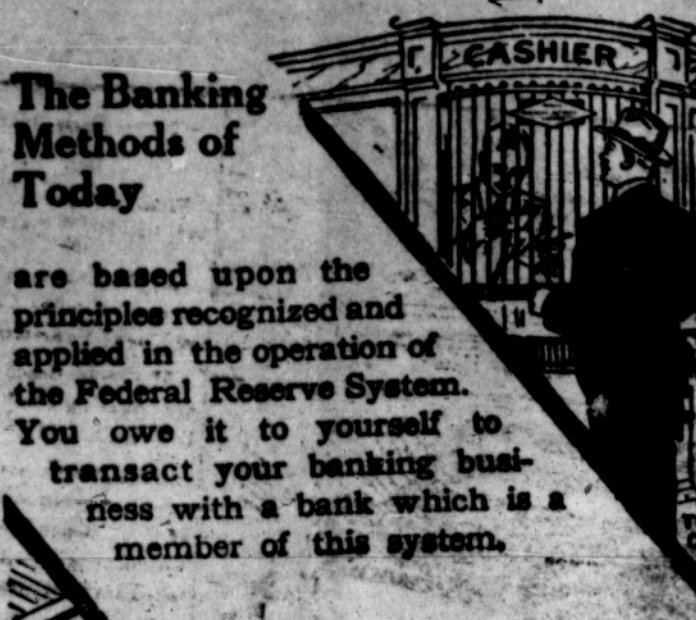

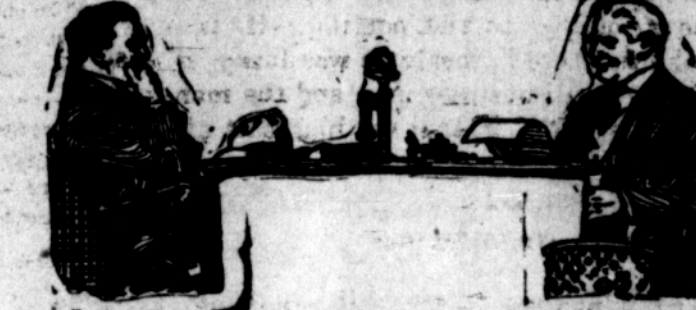
