HIGH SCHOOL NEEDED

In voting down the consolidation of the grade schools in the vicinities of Port Orford and Taholah at the late school election, the Tribune believes the parents of northern Curry made a mistake.

The consolidation of schools is proving a success wherever tried, and the leading educators of our state are practically unanimous in favor of it, however, be this as it may, more important still is the organizing of union high school districts.

The vote in the territory affected as a whole, not in each district embraced, decides the organization of a union high school, but the districts retain their individuality in the grammar grades and one does not assume the liabilities another further than in the expense incurred in teaching the high school branches.

It is useless to argue the necessity of, or the good that would be derived from such a high school—it must be apparent to everyone, and the Tribune is confident that if the question of a union high school, despite the defeat of the consolidation of the grades, is put to a vote it will carry, for we cannot countenance the thought that the people of northern Curry are actually opposed to giving their children a decent education.

Talk the matter over in your district and help bring it to a decision if you want your community to be a fit place to raise your children.

IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF OREGON, you are hereby required to appear and answer the amended complaint filed against you in the above entitled court and cause on or before the expiration of six weeks from and after the date of the first publication of this summons, to-wit: on or before the 15th day of August, 1922, and if you fail to so answer, for want thereof the plaintiff will apply to the court for the relief prayed for in his complaint on file herein, and all persons claiming under them or any of them, whether as purchasers, mortgagees or otherwise, be barred and foreclosed of all estate, right, title and interest or claim, or equity of redemption in or to the real property of any kind, heretofore described, and still remaining subject to the lien of plaintiff's mortgage, except only the statutory right of redemption.

First: That the plaintiff do have and recover of and from the defendant, Pacific City Improvement Company, the sum of \$10,000.00, together with interest thereon from the 30th day of April, 1912, at the rate of 10 per cent per annum, and the further sum of \$1,000.00 as attorneys fees, together with the costs and disbursements of this suit.

Second: That the plaintiff do have and recover of and from the defendant, Pacific City Improvement Company, the sum of \$194.22, together with interest thereon at the rate of 6 per cent per annum from May 15, 1915; the sum of \$38.25, together with interest thereon at the rate of 6 per cent per annum from September 27, 1916; the sum of \$18.68, together with interest thereon at the rate of 6 per cent per annum from April 30th, 1917; the sum of \$18.50, together with interest thereon at the rate of 6 per cent per annum from October 5, 1917; the sum of \$43.26, together with interest thereon at the rate of 6 per cent per annum from September 28, 1918.

Third: That plaintiff's mortgage heretofore described be declared to be a first lien on said lot number one (1) and the Southeast quarter (SE 1/4) of the Southeast quarter (SE 1/4) of Section eight (8), in Township Thirty-one (31) South of Range fifteen (15), West of the Willamette Meridian, and superior to any claim, estate, right, title and interest therein owned or claimed by the defendant or any of them; that said mortgage be foreclosed and said real property above described be sold in the manner prescribed by law, and the proceeds of said sale applied towards the payment of the expenses of said sale and the costs and disbursements of this suit, and the payment of such judgment as shall be rendered in favor of the plaintiff, including attorney fees, and the balance, if any, paid into the court for the benefit of whomsoever shall be decreed to be entitled thereto.

Fourth: That the defendants and each of them, and all persons claiming under them or any of them, whether as purchasers, mortgagees or otherwise, be barred and foreclosed of all estate, right, title and interest or claim, or equity of redemption in or to the real property of any kind, heretofore described, and still remaining subject to the lien of plaintiff's mortgage, except only the statutory right of redemption.

Fifth: That the plaintiff may become a purchaser at said sale, and for such other and further relief as to the court may seem just and equitable.

Service of this summons is made by publication pursuant to an order made herein by the Hon. W. A. Wood, Judge of the County Court for Curry county, State of Oregon, which bears the date of June 21st, 1922, and prescribes that defendants above named be required to appear and answer within six weeks from the date of the first publication hereof, and that this summons be published once a week for six successive weeks commencing on June 30th, 1922, to and including the 11th, 1922.
