"In the main there is much that cannot be disputed in the article of the Tribune. The radical socialists undoubtedly go too far, but there is no doubt that socialism is in fact almost everyone of us have more or less socialistic ideas, but that is neither here nor there. Eugene V. Debs has been simply punished for what he has done and, be he socialist or be he republican or democrat, the spirit of exact justice is not being observed when his incarceration is continued."

The above is from the Marshfield Evening Record of the 7th and followed the republication of the editorial in last week's Tribune on Mr. Debs.

While there is no excuse for Debs doing things that endangered the success of the allied cause in the late war with Germany, yet in view of the fact that he was advocating what he believed was right, and of the further fact that little effort has been made to bring to justice thousands of profiteers who preyed upon this government utterly regardless of the effect their actions had in the successful prosecution of the war, we concur with the Record in that Eugene V. Debs has been sufficiently punished for what he did. Justice has been done, and longer confinement will raise the cry of persecution and strengthen the radical element in the socialist party represented by Mr. Debs.

The Tribune takes pleasure in commending the stand the Record makes in behalf of the working people. Since its advent on Coos Bay that paper has ever fearlessly advocated, without going to extremes, those things it believed would better the condition of the working man.

THAT HIGH SCHOOL.

If the people of northern Curry defeat the union high school plan tomorrow, the TRIBUNE believes they will make one of the colossal blunders of their lives.

There is no use to argue on the value of education; the only question there can be, is, how best to attain it.

At the present time many of our children are deprived of high school advantages. The districts are small, and the cost of each maintaining a high school is prohibitive. This is illustrated in southern Curry where the tax for the district high school last year at Brookings was 10 mills while the tax for the union high school at Gold Beach was less than 2 mills.

Don't shirk your duty to your children. Go out tomorrow afternoon and vote to give them a better chance to become useful citizens and to prosper.

Indications are that this will be a Republican year. It is well that it should be—an occasional change is beneficial. One Democrat, however, because of his ability, his honesty, his fearlessness, and his close touch with the common people, who may be expected to weather the storm is Oregon's senior Senator, George E. Chamberlain.
