The local Masonic Lodge held a regular monthly meeting Saturday evening.

Miss Ellen Bailey, of Wedderburn, has been visiting friends in northern Curry for the past two weeks.

Rev. W. R. Smith and family of Bandon have been enjoying an outing for the past two weeks camped at Floras creek.

Joseph A. Cox and wife, of Langlois, passed down the coast Monday on a camping trip in their Ford to California points.

Mr. and Mrs. Klepper, of Bandon, have been visiting with their daughter, Mrs. W. J. Sablin, at Port Orford, during the past week.

County Surveyor Dennis Cunniff, after spending about three weeks surveying in Port Orford and vicinity, returned to Gold Beach one day last week.

Mr. and Mrs. Henry Johnston are enjoying a visit from their daughter and her husband who arrived in Port Orford a few days ago from Canada.

County Clerk Arthur G. Walker and Len Deino, superintendent of the Coos & Curry telephone company at Gold Beach, were visitors in Port Orford from the county seat Saturday evening.

Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Turner and three daughters, Mary, Lenora and Leona, of Gold Beach, spent several days last week visiting with Mrs. Turner's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Sutton, at Port Orford.

Edward L. Wells, meteorologist from the Weather Bureau at Port Land, was in town yesterday on a tour of inspection of the instruments of the various cooperative observers throughout this part of the state.

Lucy Dan, an Indian woman who has some white blood in her veins and who is a pioneer resident of the Rogue river section, passed up the coast last week to spend the rest of her life in the Indian home at Chumawa.

Contractor C. H. Pearce was in town from his Middle Elk home yesterday conferring with the lower Sixes school board, and as a result he took a contract to build a school house in that district for \$2,800. He will have the building completed not later than November 1st.

The picnic held at Floras creek, Sunday, by the Eastern Star order was a very enjoyable occasion. About 100 persons were present, coming from Coquille, Bandon, Langlois and Port Orford. The dinner was one of those for which the women of Coos and Curry counties are noted, and there was an abundance of good things left after the appetite of all had been satisfied.

Raymond Chenoweth, the 12 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. John H. Chenoweth, of Denmark, died in Bandon last Wednesday with appendicitis and was buried Friday in the Denmark cemetery. He had been sick with the disease for about two weeks, and was beyond aid when taken to the hospital. Raymond was a bright, manly boy and his parents have the sympathy of many friends in their bereavement.

Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Loney and Mr. and Mrs. Fred Powers, of Powers and Dr. Dix and wife, of Marshfield, arrived in Port Orford Sunday, Mr. Loney returning home that evening and the rest of the party remaining over until yesterday. It is understood that Messrs. Powers and Dix, who are interested in large timber holdings here, were looking over the ground with a view of building a mill here in the near future.

As we go to press we learn that J. A. Cox of Langlois went off the grade near the Abe Hardentbrook place south of Pistol river. The machine rolled down the bank about 150 feet and both Mr. Cox and his wife were considerably bruised, the former having one of his ears nearly torn off. The Ford, which Mr. Cox was driving, was not badly damaged and the trip to Crescent City, Grants Pass and home via Eugene, may be continued with Supt. W. M. Kent, who went to the scene from Gold Beach this morning as chauffeur.

There will be another big dance in Port Orford Aug. 28th.

Max and Taylor Dement, with their families, spent several days last week camped at Agate beach. The gentlemen came down from Myrtle Point, where the former is Mayor of that town.

The official count at Gold Beach, yesterday, showed 49 votes for the union high school and none against it in the Port Orford community, and 39 for and 12 against in the Langlois neighborhood.

Airplanes were seen over Langlois on two occasions last week. They were so high, however, that they resembled a large bird, and would not have been discovered but for the whir of their motors.

Henry Schroeder and family and Mrs. Mary Albree and children, of Myrtle Point, and Chas. Schroeder of Norway, were in Port Orford, Monday, enroute on a camping trip as far south as Eureka. Henry Schroeder is secretary of the Coos and Curry Fair association, and is advertising the fair which will be held in Myrtle Point Sept. 15th to 18th inclusive.

## Black Leg Appears In Northern Curry.

Jas. Culver, who resides in the Hare district in northern Curry, recently lost three head of cattle with black leg. This disease caused a considerable loss among the cattle of that section several years ago. It attacks stock regardless of the condition they are in, and is usually fatal. The Oregon Agricultural College, however, has developed a serum with which cattle can be inoculated that will prevent them taking the disease. This serum is comparatively inexpensive, and farmers of northern Curry would do well to have some of it on hand at this time.

## Big Salmon Run Continues.

The big run of salmon in Rogue river has continued throughout the past week. The three canneries on the river have been over-run with fish and commenced the first of last week limiting the catch of each to 25 a day. Due to the shortage of cans at two of the canneries there were a few nights when the fishermen were not allowed to go at all.

Last Wednesday night, after turning in their 25 at the cannery, Geo. Sutton and Ezra Turner brought 60 salmon to Port Orford in a Ford truck arriving here about daylight Thursday morning. They sold the fish at 10c a pound and found a ready market for them. It was probably the biggest salmon day Port Orford ever had.

## Great Country For Poultry And Bees.

Major J. C. Johnson, of Gold Beach, spent a few days last week in northern Curry. Saturday he met his daughter, Mrs. W. E. Lebow, of Tillamook, at Bandon, who accompanied him home on a visit.

Major Johnson, who is an independent candidate for the office of County Attorney, has been experimenting for the past year in the poultry and bee industries, and is enthusiastic over the opportunities offered in Curry county for their development. In commenting up on these facts he said:

"When I learned that \$400. a month was being shipped out of the Gold Beach section during the summer season for eggs, I decided to try out the poultry business. The results have been highly gratifying, and I find Curry county a wonderful place for the poultry business. The climate is ideal, and the fatality among the little chicks is exceptionally small. My hens are a cross between the Oregon and White Leg-horn and are the best laying strain developed at O. A. C. From 24 hens that were laying Feb. 15th, the least number of eggs I have gathered any day has been 15, and often the number ran up to 24."

Mr. Johnson now has 300 pullets and intends to increase the number until he has at least 1000 laying hens.

Another industry that appeals to Mr. Johnson as adapted to Curry county is bees. Last year he started with 10 stands and now has 30. He has sold over 1,000 pounds of honey this year, having taken 250 pounds from one stand.

Mr. Johnson is confident there are greater opportunities in this section than most people realize in these two industries.

## Dying With Cancer.

O. Lenoire is in receipt of a letter from T. J. Stitt who for years resided in northern Curry and at Bandon. Mr. Stitt writes that he is with one of his daughters in the state of Washington, and has been confined to his bed since last May with cancer of the stomach and that there is no hope for his recovery. He says he is waiting patiently for the final summons, which he hopes will not long be delayed. The many old friends of Mr. Stitt in this section will be grieved to learn of his condition.

## Airplanes Patrolling Forests.

An illustration of the efficiency of the forest airplane patrol was given when deputy fire warden E. L. White received a wire from Medford Monday, telling him of the location of a fire that had broken out that day near Lobb's camp on the county road near Sixes.

The first of these airplane patrols to be sighted in this community was seen about 4 o'clock yesterday evening by Ranger Colvin flying over the Middle Elk station at an elevation of 4,000 to 5,000 feet.

This patrol is going to be of inestimable value in keeping down for est fires.

## Auto Accidents Numerous.

Several auto accidents happened in this vicinity during the past week, but fortunately no one was hurt.

Orris Knapp was the first one to have trouble by running his car off the grade on the mountain when trying to turn around. The machine went down the hill 50 or 60 feet, but did nothing worse than smash up the radiator. The following day a Studebaker roadster went off the grade on the mountain, but was stopped by a log before it had gotten fairly started, and was pulled back into the road by block and tackle. A day or two later Will Whitworth turned his Ford truck over with a load of hogs just north of Sixes. The hogs scattered, but were rounded up next day and no damage was done. The following night the lights of a Buick car went wrong and it turned over in the same spot. It also, was righted the following day with but little damage.

## Union High Schools Curry.

The proposition to organize two union high schools in northern Curry, which was voted upon last Thursday, carried by a large majority.

In the Port Orford and three surrounding districts, the vote for a high school was unanimous. In this district there were 25 votes for it, and upper Sixes gave it 16 votes, while in lower Sixes and Elk river the vote was also unanimous. At Langlois the vote was 28 to 9, while in Floras Creek district it was also unanimous, Hare being the only district to go against it by a vote of 3 to 2.

Commissioner Ralph Cope and Supt. W. M. Kent went to Gold Beach, Monday, where a special session of the county court made provision for the organization of the union high schools at Port Orford and Langlois immediately. Both schools will be opened this fall.

## Heart Failure Cause Of Death.

CALIXICO, Aug. 5.—Four hours after he was taken to his room last night suffering from a severe attack of heart failure, J. O. French, agent here for the San Diego Union, was found dead in his room by another roomer.

French complained of being seriously sick about 9 o'clock last night and was taken to his room by H. C. Stubbs, a taxi driver.

Other roomers in the building are said to have gone to his room and found him dead not long after midnight. The coroner took charge of the body, and took it to El Centro.

Police Officer Hollingworth of Calixico was called into the room upon the discovery of French and because of the natural posture he was in, it was thought that he might possibly be alive.

Upon investigation it has been found that French has been associated with the San Diego Union for some time in the circulation department, and that he is the brother of one of the greatest cotton paper managers in the south. His body is being sent back to his former home in the south.

J. C. French was a resident of Port Orford and vicinity for 8 or 10 years, leaving here about a year and a half ago. He was well acquainted throughout northern Curry, and was a member of the local Masonic lodge. The above notice of his death was sent to the TRIBUNE by Bert True a former resident of Langlois, who accompanied it by the following letter:

El Centro, Calif., Aug. 6, 1920.

Editor TRIBUNE:

I am enclosing a clipping out of the El Centro paper of Jeff French's death. He died very suddenly at Calixico, where he had a paper agency and was doing well. I saw him every few days and he seemed to be in perfect health.

Believe me it is some hot place here. It often goes to 120 in the shade, and is 116 now. It is 96 some nights when I close up at 10 o'clock. I am standing the climate fine, however, and never felt better and am doing well in the soft drink business.

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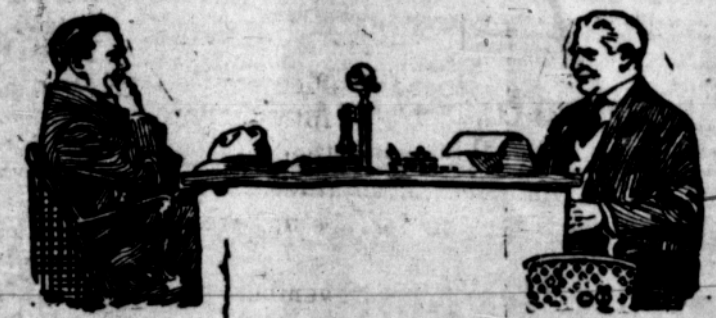
