To Improve Cheese in Coos And Curry.

To bring Coos and Curry cheese up to the Tillamook standard within two years is the aim of the Oregon Dairywomen's League, according to Albert S. Hall of Portland, manager of the league, who was in Bandon on business yesterday. Foundation is being laid for the standardization of the local product as well as the improvement of the quality generally so that it will command the preferred price that has in the past been received by the Tillamook producers. There is opportunity, he states, to develop an unlimited market for cheese in this country as the average consumption per capita at the present time is only about one fifth of what it is in some of the European countries.

Another aim of the league is to induce the dairymen of Coos and Curry counties to establish all-year-round producing herds, to more or less equalize the production throughout the year. By having a part of their herds freshen dairymen can take advantage of the higher milk prices during the season when the supply is low and the demand strong. Cheese factories, Mr. Hall states, could also be operated twelve months in the year, thus reducing overhead costs.

Mr. Hall was accompanied by N. A. Loucks, who has been appointed district agent for the league in Coos and Curry counties. His headquarters will be with the cheese and dairy inspector at Coquille. Mr. Loucks comes from Medford where he has been a manager of a creamery.

The Dew Valley cheese factory opened for business Tuesday of this week with W. R. Pohl of Myrtle Point in charge. The first day it received 4500 pounds of milk. The factory has been thoroughly overhauled by W. W. Felter and some new equipment has been added.

A. W. Britton, who until recently had charge of the Myrtle wood plant at Myrtle Point, has been transferred to the Langlois plant. He takes the place of H. T. Miller. The latter has gone to Parkersburg where he will this week open the plant formerly conducted by him at that place.—Western World.
