There is deep satisfaction in the knowledge that in our newspaper work we have won the confidence of a great majority of the citizens of our county, and there is still a deeper satisfaction in the knowledge of the fact that we have earned a right to this confidence insofar as the editorial columns have never been prostituted by hire—the opinions expressed were honest, and there was a conscientious belief that the things advocated were for the best interests of the public.

During this past 16 years it is a pleasure to know that the TRIBUNE has been of some benefit to its community and to Curry county, but the one thing that is a creature of its production, in which we take peculiar pride, is the Port of Port Orford. We are confident the next few years will prove this to be the best investment ever made for Port Orford and for northern Curry.

And, there is yet another gratifying thought, and that is that in selling the TRIBUNE we know that it passes into hands of men who have the best interests of Curry county at heart, who will run a clean, honest and fearless newspaper, and who are in a position to give the public better service than it has had in the past.

ELK PRESERVE WANTED.

Deputy Game Warden John Adams is working in conjunction with some of our local residents in an endeavor to have a band of Elk brought to Curry and turned loose in the upper Elk river county. Mr. Adams says it would be no trouble to secure the Elk if a game preserve, for their protection, were set aside running from Salal Springs along the divide to Panther and Iron mountains and thence returning west on the divide between Elk and Sixes. This scope of country is not needed as a hunting ground, and thrown into a preserve would not only protect the Elk, but would give a breeding ground for deer and other game animals.

Those interested should back Mr. Adams in this matter before the Game Commission and at the coming session of the legislature.

Another game regulation recommended by Mr. Adams that Curry county citizens, who are interested in our game, should take up with their representative and try to get enacted into law, is an act increasing the license fees of non-resident hunters.

The out-going editor of the Tribune wonders if the result of the election in Curry yesterday causes the Gold Beach Reporter to realize that its most effective way of defeating a candidate is to advocate his election.
