Coyote Bounties.

A meeting of the Stockmen's Association of Curry county was held at Gold Beach, Oregon, on December 1st 1920. The meeting was called to order by the President, Delmar Colegrove, for the purpose of electing a Secretary-Treasurer to fill the vacancy caused by the passing of E. A. Bailey, deceased. Wm. Tolman was elected Secretary-Treasurer for the Association and instructed to get in touch with the County Courts of Coos Douglas and Josephine counties with the idea of getting the above named counties to co-operate with Curry regarding bounties on coyotes, as most of the members of the Association present were of the opinion that a good many of the coyotes come in from our neighboring counties and unless we can induce the adjoining counties to take up the fight it would seem that it would be an everlasting job to ever rid the county of these pests.

Sheep men of Jackson county recently met at Medford and formed an organization to clean up the coyote pest. WM. TOLMAN.

Illinois gave Warren G. Harding, republican president-elect, a majority of 536,055 votes over James M. Cox, according to official figures. Harding's vote was 1,430,480 and Cox's 539,394. Debs received 74,747 and Watkins 11,216.

About Postage, Etc.

Now that the Christmas holidays are approaching the following information regarding postage etc., might be of interest to the public:

All sealed matter (except drop letters) require a postage of 2 cents per ounce or fraction thereof. Drop letters are those mailed and delivered from the same office, but where letters are delivered by carrier a 2 cent postage is required. 4th class matter such as parcels etc., require 1 cent per oz. if the weight does not exceed 4 oz to any zone. Parcels weighing more than 4 oz require the zone rate which is according to the following table:

1st and 2nd zones add 1 to weight
3rd zone weight times 2 plus 4
4th zone weight times 4 plus 8
5th zone weight times 6 plus 2
6th zone weight times 8 plus 1
7th zone weight times 10 plus 1
8th zone weight times 12.

Any parcel weighing a fraction of an ounce over 1 pound takes the 2 pound rate over 2 pounds the 3 pound rate and so on.

When the postage is 25 cents 1 cent must be added for internal revenue, over 25 cents and up to 50 cents 2 cents internal revenue over 50 and up to 75 cents 3 cents internal revenue and so on. Internal revenue cannot be paid by ordinary stamps but requires an internal revenue stamp.

Insurance on a package does not insure safe delivery but rather protects sender against financial loss hence it is necessary to place a value on such parcels. This postage is not considered when determining the internal revenue charge.

Be careful to see that your packages are securely packed, wrapped and tied and that they are plainly marked, and that they bear the name of the sender.

Insurance rates are as follows:
Covered by a 3 cent fee value to \$5.
Covered by a 5 cent fee value to \$25.
Covered by a 10 cent fee value to \$50.
Covered by a 25 cent fee value to \$100.

By complying with these instructions much annoyance and delay will be avoided.

All articles easily breakable must be marked Fragile. When Fragile matter is not marked "Fragile" because of failure to acquaint postal employees with the contents of parcels, the persons there handling it thus failing to give the special treatment required by articles of that character, resulting in damage thereto, no indemnity will be paid. Senders of all insured and C. O. D. parcels must state what articles are contained therein. All matter of a perishable nature must be marked "Perishable." All parcels must be securely packed, and wrapped to withstand transmission without breakage or injuring mail bags, their contents or the persons handling them. Parcels known to be improperly or unsufficiently wrapped must not be accepted. Senders addresses and postal employees are all anxious that parcels reach their destinations safely hence it is unwise to poorly prepare them for mailing in order to save labor or a few cents in postage and trusting to luck that they will go through unharmed.

President Wilson, in response to an invitation from the League of Nations council, has agreed to use his good offices and to proffer his "personal mediation," through a representative he may designate, "to end the hostilities that are now being waged against the Armenian people."

In accepting the league's invitation, the president, writing to President Paul Hymans, says he makes his offer upon assurances of "the moral and diplomatic support of the principal powers" and relies upon the league council to suggest to him the avenues through which his proffer should be conveyed and the parties to whom it should be addressed.

The president says he is without authorization to "offer or employ the military forces of the United States in any project for the relief of Armenia," and that any material contribution would require the authorization of congress which is not now in session and whose action I could not forecast.

At the present time the farm-labor organization is the third party in the United States, as it polled more votes than were cast by the socialists.

Child Welfare Conference a Success.

The baby clinic or child welfare conference held in Langlois Friday and Saturday was well attended in spite of wind and rain and the ladies of the Northern Curry Com. Club, under whose management this work is being brought into the county, felt their efforts were well worth while when the Mothers began to arrive from all over the surrounding country with their babies and small children, and were not only willing but anxious to avail themselves of all the knowledge concerning their child's present physical condition, but also to receive advice and suggestions as to their future development.

Miss Lane, who is connected with the extension work of the Oregon Agriculture College and whose specialty is child welfare work along the line of nutrition, came in Wednesday afternoon and was met by a delegation of ladies and plans made to make the most of her three days in our midst. Miss Lane has had quite a wide experience in this work, having spent some months in different cities, among them Chicago and New York where she worked with the mothers and children of the slums. Therefore we felt we were indeed fortunate in procuring her services. Thursday morning she paid a visit to the Denmark school and gave a short talk to the boys and girls in which they were encouraged to practice the everyday rules of good health. In the afternoon visits were made to the Langlois schools and they also were urged to co-operate with teachers and mothers in the development of their physical as well as mental welfare. Friday morning Miss Kalbus, the Coos County Dem. Agent arrived on the early stage and by ten o'clock three long tables that had been prepared in the Woodman hall by our very able lunch committee, was loaded with good things to eat. The meeting was called to order by our Club chairman Mrs. J. S. Capps. Miss Kalbus and Miss Lane were introduced and each gave an outline of the days work. Miss Kalbus extended an invitation to the Club to send one or two delegates to Bandon Monday and Tuesday to receive instructions in home dress making demonstrated by the extension department of O. A. C. In turn they will impart this knowledge to the remaining Club members who are interested in that work. It was decided to send Mrs. Kent.

Dr. Leep kindly accepted the invitation to be present and conduct the physical examinations of the children. After lunch we repaired to the home of Mrs. Upton where preparations had been made to conduct the work, Miss Lane having appointed several local ladies to help, thereby, increasing their interest in the work. Twenty eight babies were weighed measured and examined and a complete record made of each child's condition. Advice given by the Doctor, consultations held between mothers and Miss Lane who has a system where by she is able to keep in touch with mothers of children who need special attention. Twenty nine school children received the same attention which completed the days work along that line. Miss Kalbus also gave the ladies a number of good ideas and suggestions which were very much enjoyed and appreciated.

Saturday afternoon Dr. Gale, by special invitation, came down from Bandon and continued the examination of school children from Denmark and Langlois. With the assistance of Mrs. Kent, Miss Emma Sydnam and Mrs. Kenworthy Dr. Gale and Miss Lane were able to extend this favor to the mothers of thirty two more of our young people making in all eighty nine children. Miss Lane mentioned that she found the majority of our boys and girls above the average. Several of the mothers signified their willingness to become members of the Community Club thereby showing their appreciation of the good work we are trying to carry on in behalf of the children especially.

The Italian Chamber of deputies have adopted the electoral reform bill providing for woman suffrage.



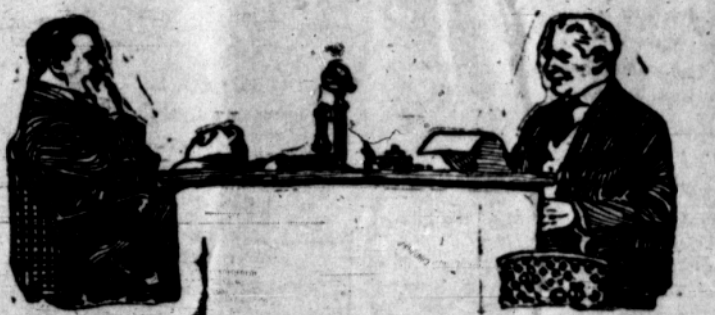
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
