THIS IS THE FAVORED SECTION

Redmond is not the only section that has been experiencing a continued period of dry, hot weather. Over in the Willamette Valley there has been more hot weather this year than has been experienced there for many years, and in Portland especially, the people have been sweltering in the heat. All over the United States the weather this summer has been extremely warm, and many deaths have resulted. While in the eastern and middle western states the nights are nearly as warm as the days, in Oregon and the coast states, the nights are cool, and this fact, together with other favorable conditions that prevail throughout the year, will have a tendency to bring a large number of people to Central Oregon and the Redmond District this year.

CLEAN UP NOW

A general clean up of the streets and alleys should be begun at once in Redmond so as to have a clean, neat appearing city to show the many new comers that will soon arrive here. Now is the time to do this. A small individual effort on each one's part in cleaning up their premises will add greatly to the attractiveness of the city.
