Better shake the multitudinous hand of the giant good-naturedly, than unnecessarily provoke his wrath. Despite the world if it so please you—though to do so is a proof of arrogance conceit and egotism—but as you have to live in the world, to lean on the world, it is just as well to treat it civilly. Shrewd men who understand their race, never seek a quarrel with Society. They understand that it is possible for an individual to persuade lead and quietly control a community, but not to fight it down. If you desire to reform evils or to disabuse your fellow-men of their prejudice, the surest way not to succeed is to resort to denunciation and abuse. Kindness, conciliation, the influence of good example—these are the true and effective means and appliances of reform.

### BE BROAD MINDED

No town in this state or any other place for that matter, can expect to thrive and prosper without the concentrated effort of its citizens and the judicious expenditure of money.

The towns and cities in Oregon today that are prosperous are the ones that have donated liberally to enterprises that will help their locality. Thus it is and always will be that the liberal and broad gauged town will thrive while the tight fist ed ones are struggling for the necessities of life.

It is within the province of every town to increase her population. With which class do you desire to be rated? Do you wish it to go out to the world that you lack the energy necessary to protect your own interest, and that you are continually throwing stones at your town and community and villifying the people in it? If not, get to work and do something that will increase your own wealth and show to the people outside that you are trying to help make your town grow.

### BENEFITS THE COMMUNITY

The late Hon. David Davis once said: "Each year every local paper gives from \$100 to \$5,000 in free lines for the benefit of the community in which it is located. No other agency

can or will do this. The local editor, in proportion to his means, does more for his town than any other ten men, and in fairness, man with man, he ought to be supported, not because you happen to like him or admire his writings, but because a local paper is the best investment a community can make. It may not be brilliant or crowded with great thoughts, but financially it is more of a benefit to a community than a preacher or a teacher. Understand us now, we do not mean morally or intellectually but financially, and yet on the moral question you will find the majority of local papers are on the right side of the question. It's news that makes a newspaper, and every man, woman and child can be associate editor if they only will. Never apologize when you give this bit of information to an editor, for if there lives one so dead that he has lost his appreciation of such favors he is dead, indeed, to every virtue that imparts value to a paper.

Isn't it better to be boosting your town all the time and saying good things about it than throwing rocks at the town and community every time you get a chance? It looks as if the former was the better plan. Still there are people who think the right way to build up a town is to villify it.
