CITIZEN TICKET IS NOMINATED

At Big Mass Meeting Held Monday Night

OLD OFFICERS ARE RE-ELECTED

H. F. Jones Heads Ticket ---Phoenix and Mills Nominated

At the mass meeting held at the Commercial Club Room Monday night for the purpose of putting in nomination a full set of city officers to be voted for December 6th, the citizens turned out in force.

The meeting was called to order by President H. F. Jones of the Commercial Club, who stated the object of the meeting. The first nomination was for mayor, and H. F. Jones was nominated by acclamation.

Two hold-ups occurred here within 2 days and Marshal Mills thought it was the proper time to call a halt on the strong arm gentry, tin horn gamblers and parasites.

VOTED \$5,000 SCHOOL BONDS

Redmond to Have High School Department

FIVE MILL TAX ON DOLLAR IS LEVIED

Four Additional Rooms Will Be Added to School Building

At the special school election held here the 19th the question of issuing \$5000 of school bonds was carried by a vote of 24 to 1. The same vote obtained for establishing a high school here and to levy a five mill on the dollar tax for general school purposes.

As soon as the bonds are disposed of it is the intention of the school directors to build on an addition of four rooms to the present school building to take care of the different grades. This will give the school six rooms with ample accommodation for all.

Recently the 9th and 10th grades were added to the course of study here, and under the direction of Prof. Thompson, the principal, the Redmond school is gaining a reputation second to none in the county.
