### Change Must Come

The following article taken from the Portland Journal is right to the point as regard reforms to be made in the liquor traffic:

"The more reforms the Home Rule people inaugurate, the wiser they will be. They can err more easily on the side of laxity than in thoroughness. They made promises in the campaign, and are on trial as to those promises now.

"Many of those who voted for the Home Rule bill did so on the assurance that there was to be a change and that it was to be a change wrought by Home Rule people. The point has been reached when the conditions of the past will not be tolerated. The low dive with its evasions and violations of laws has had its day. The mining camp standards in the saloon business have passed. A saloon must be a place where liquor is sold within the requirements of the law, and not be an asylum and rendezvous for road agents, footpads and other enemies of society. The standard that has long been maintained by the respectable dealers is the standard that must be adopted by all.

"Even with the reforms, the business is under constant menace. The great social mass is constantly purging itself of follies and futility. A reckoning is taking place in which accounts are being cast up and balances struck. Great corporations are refusing to employ those who use intoxicants. Vast belts of territory are going dry. Reform of the traffic is not a mere episode but a nation wide movement. It is not a fleeting flurry, but a widespread change that is constantly gathering strength.

"Reform has to come. Changes have to be made. Abuses have to be abolished. If it is not done by the dealers, it will be done for the dealers."

### SCHOOL NOTES

Reported for The Spokesman.

School enrollment to date is 120. Ninth and tenth grades are now at work, and we can take care of anyone who wishes to enter these grades.

Tenth grade is working in advanced agriculture, the same course as the County High School.

Principal Thompson has been supplementing the geography and history work with morning talks and readings. This week the work was "Travels Through Sweden." Last week a lecture on "The Merchant of Venice."

Several eighth graders are reading Shakespeare now, instead of the light reading as formerly

read, and are calling for more.

The eighth grade is studying budding and grafting now, and will take up plant disease next week.

The walls in Mrs. Hopley's rooms are showing much neat and profitable work done by the pupils.

The roll of honor in both Mrs. Hopley's and Mrs. Jarrett's rooms show splendid results.

Mrs. Jarrett has 52 pupils now, and the seating capacity is over-taxed, as is that of all the rooms. The new seats are here and will be in place when school opens next Monday after a short recess as a precautionary measure to prevent the chance of a spread of diphtheria, of which we have had two cases in one family. It is believed there will be no more cases, and by Monday there will be no more danger, and Dr. Hosch is doing what he can to prevent any spread of the disease.

### \$1,000 License At Bend

The Bend city council at its last meeting raised the liquor license to \$1,000 a year and limited the number of saloons to ten. Saloon keepers must be citizens of the United States, and must furnish bond from a surety company in the sum of \$1,000 for term of license. A tax of 15 mills on the dollar was levied for 1910 as against 10 mills for 1909.

### Mail Arrives in Bad Condition

The three days' overdue mail that arrived here last Wednesday night was received in bad condition. Some of the sacks looked as if they had been used for brake blocks, the sacks being torn and the mail covered with mud and cut up. When the sacks were emptied into the distributing box at the postoffice enough mud came out of the sacks to make a flower bed. Some of the mail sacks were improperly labeled and were carried by to Sisters. Verily the mail service between Redmond and Shaniko is a serious problem during the winter months.

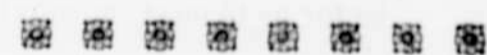

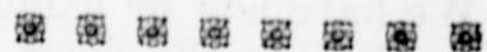
