City Water Works
For Madras

The Madras Pioneer of last
week says that the city is to
have a city water works system
to cost in the neighborhood of
\$10,000. A reservoir with a ca-
pacity of about 200,000 gallons
is to be constructed. The fall
from the reservoir to the city
will be 150 feet, and give ample
pressure for all purposes. It is
estimated that two miles of pipe
will be necessary to bring the
water from the reservoir to the
city. An 8-inch main will be
laid from the reservoir to the
city. An engine will be installed
to pump water into the reservoir
and run an electric light plant,
which it is contemplated to install
at a later date.
