CARS BE IN MADRAS ABOUT FIRST OF FEB.

Track Layers Are Now Only
About 50 Miles
North of There

The people of Madras expect to see the locomotive puffing into that place about the first of February, says the last issue of the Madras Pioneer. The tracklaying crew is now within 50 miles of the city, and as they are laying rails at the rate of two miles a day it is presumed the rails will reach the city by the above date. All of the grading is practically completed between Madras and the end of the track now. At Trout Creek there is a trestle that is not quite completed, but that is expected to be finished by the time the steel gang reaches that point. The construction camps in the vicinity north of Madras have nearly all laid off their men.

Ordinance No. 12

An ordinance providing for the holding of a special election for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of the City of Redmond, Oregon, a proposition to enact a charter for said city.

Whereas, the general laws of the State of Oregon relative to the powers conferred upon municipalities incorporated under the general laws of the state are vague, indefinite and uncertain, and whereas, the powers so conferred on such municipalities are inadequate to properly protect the peace, health and safety of such municipalities and the inhabitants thereof, and whereas, under the terms and provisions of Section 2, of Article 11, of the constitution of said state power and authority is given to the electors of such municipalities to enact for themselves such a charter as they may deem advisable, subject to the Constitution and criminal laws of the State of Oregon, and whereas, in the judgment of the Common Council of the City of Redmond, it is advisable to enact such charter as soon as possible without delaying action thereon until the next general election and whereas, such a charter has been presented to and approved by said Common Council and is now on file in the office of the City Recorder, now, therefore,

Be it Ordained by the Common Council of the City of Redmond, Oregon,

Sec. 1. That a special election be held on the 14th day of March 1911, for the purpose of submitting the aforesaid charter to the qualified electors of the City of Redmond, Oregon, for their adoption or rejection. That the polls of said election be opened at Eight o'clock in the forenoon and closed at Six o'clock in the afternoon of said day.

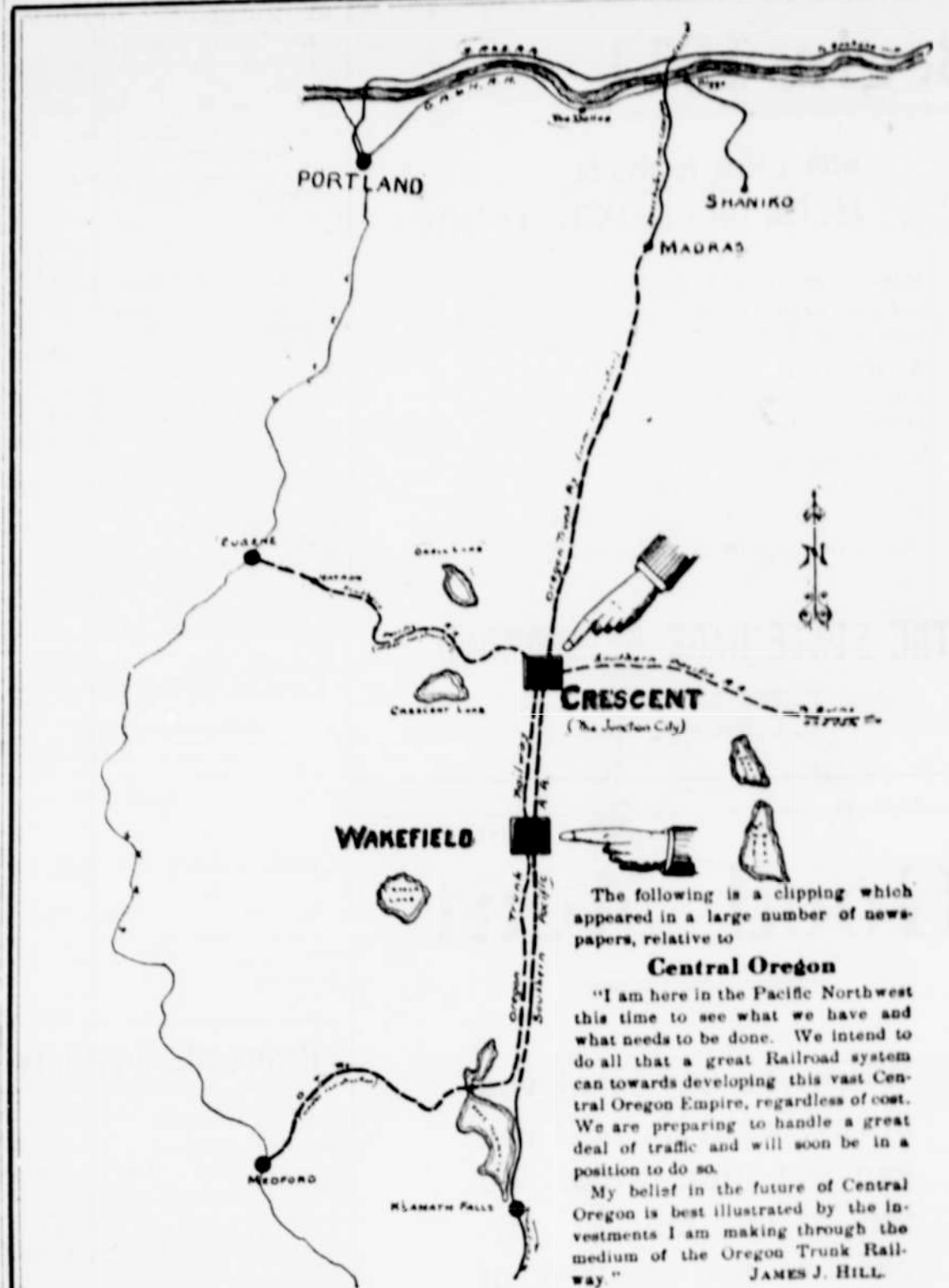
Sec. 2. Arguments in favor of the adoption of said charter may be filed with the City Recorder not later than thirty days and those opposing its adoption not later than twenty days before said election.

Sec. 3. The City Recorder shall cause the said charter and all arguments submitted as herein provided to be printed and bound in pamphlet form and shall also cause, so far as practicable, one copy of such pamphlet to be delivered, either by carrier or mail, to each elector within the City of Redmond, not less than eight days before said election.

Sec. 4. The council shall at their last regular meeting prior to said election appoint three judges and two clerks of said election who shall, before entering upon their duties, take and subscribe to the oath required of judges and clerks of election by the general laws of this state and who shall, immediately after the close of the polls of such election proceed to canvass the votes cast at said election and declare the result thereof and report such result, duly certified to by them, to the Council within three days thereafter.

Sec. 5. The laws of the State of Oregon regulating and relative to the manner of holding and conducting elections shall apply to said election, except that no registration shall be required and no person who is not a bona fide elector under such laws and a resident of the City of Redmond shall be allowed to vote thereat.

Sec. 6. The recorder shall prepare the proper ballots and shall also provide the necessary poll books, paper, pencils, polling place, and all other things required to properly conduct said election. The ballots shall be in the form required by the laws of this state relative to measures submitted to the electors by the State Legislature and the rules, regulations and statutes of the state relative to such measures and elections shall obtain and be

In case the said charter is approved by a majority of all those voting thereon at such election it shall by the duty of the Mayor to issue his proclamation announcing the results thereof which proclamation shall be published for one week in some newspaper, published in the city and thereafter the said charter shall become effective.

Passed at a regular meeting of the common council of the City of Redmond, Oregon, held on the 10th day of January, 1911.
